And Nick Nardella says he still buys Coca Cola because of *The Coca Cola Spotlight Band* shows broadcast during the war years.



"At a BOD meeting it was proposed by the acquisitions chairman to acquire the Sherlock Holmes programs with Basil Rathbone



# Major Nostalgia Convention Set for September 18-20 in Maryland

Old-time radio sparks a return to Aberdeen, MD for the third annual Mid-Atlantic

Nostalgia Convention September 18-20. The three-day event offers attendees an opportunity to pose for photographs with their favorite actors of Hollywood and Broadway. The stars also sign autographs. This is will be the third year for this convention, which has been growing steady since the first offering in September of 2006. According to Martin Grams Jr., the events coordinator of M.A.N.C., the pre-registration is the largest to date. This will probably be the final year the Clarion Hotel in

Aberdeen will be host to the event, to make room for a larger hotel to handle the grow-

ing crowd.

Celebrities this year include Jon Provost (Timmy on Lassie), Edd Byrnes (Kookie from 77 Sunset Strip), Patty McCormack (Academy Award nominee of The Bad Seed), Larry Storch (F-Troop and Car 54, Where Are You?), Kathleen Hughes (It Came From Outer Space and The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet), Mickey Freeman (Sergeant Bilko and The Phil Silvers Show) and Margaret Kerry who modeled for Disney artists for Tinkerbell, and is one of the few remaining cast members of Our Gang / Little Rascals shorts.

Old-Time Radio related events include a recreation of a 1937 "lost" Lights Out! radio broadcast titled "The Pyramid," directed by Don Ramlow. Neal Ellis will be broadcasting live from the event over the Yesterday USA Network.

Presentations include: "A History of Sgt. Preston" by Terry Salomonson of Audio Classics who will also present an uncirculated episode of the radio program for attendees. Neal Ellis will present rare audio clips of Edward R. Murrow. Michael Hayde will discuss the genius of Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis on radio and in movies. Author/publisher Ben Ohmart will host a panel about voice actors such as Paul Frees and Mel Blanc. Paul Adomites, au-

thor of the wonderful McFarland book about baseball broadcasts, will offer a fascinating

panel about baseball during the golden age of radio. A panel presentation with film clips of spoofs related to the "War of the Worlds," in recognition to the 70th Anniversary of Welles' panic broadcast. Saturday morning will offer a presentation about MP3s -how the technology works, and how old-time radio shows are being brought to the digital age.

Other attendees include old-time radio authors Jack French (the award-winning Private Eyelashes), Martin

Grams Jr. (The Radio Adventures of Sam Spade), Derek Tague (contributor for Let's Pretend) and Ben Ohmart of BearManor Media, the largest publishing company to offer books about old-time radio shows. Mr. Ohmart will also be accepting submissions from anyone with a book proposal.

The movie room operates 24 hours a day for three-and-a-half days. Old-Time Radio related films include the "War of the Worlds" panic broadcast spoof titled Hullabaloo (1940), the 1952 CBS TV special marking the opening of "Television City" in Hollywood with Jack Benny, Rochester, Eve Arden as Miss Brooks, and the cast of Amos n' Andy, My Friend Irma and Life with Luigi. Groucho Marx bloopers from You Bet Your Life. The "lost" 1934 movie Gift of Gab about a radio announcer who gets himself into a high adventure is also being presented. An episode of television's Dragnet, never-beforeseen since its initial telecast and an episode of The Cavalcade of America with weekend guest Patty McCormack are among the many

#### Landslide Results

#### Membership Overwhelmingly Rejects Recall of Board Members



Spekovac president Bob Steinmetz retains seat on Board of Directors after membership rejects recall effort.

SPERDVAC membership overwhelmingly rejected a recall effort of four board members in voting results presented at the July 12 special meeting at the Hawthorne Library in Hawthorne, CA.

Dan Haefele, Bob Steinmetz, Dave Struthers and Ken Greenwald will retain their seats on the Board of Directors. The recall effort failed with 220 votes against and 131 votes for the recall resulting in a 63%

margin, considered a "landslide" in election results.

Similarly, membership overwhelmingly approved by a 299 to 51 margin with five abstentions the election reform proposal that stated: To compel reform of the election rules so that if any charges of misconduct by other candidates are implied, those persons have an opportunity to answer or rebut those charges before the candidates' statements are mailed to the members.

Of the 1067 ballots mailed 356 were returned showing a 33% voter turnout.


Elections chair Catherine Passarelli was called out of retirement to lead Joe Bine and Patricia Mueller in tallying the ballots.

During the late 1930s Edgar Bergen with his dummy Charlie McCarthy was an important radio star. His program, the Sunday night *Chase and Sanborn Hour* was at the top, and featured in the top ten of all radio shows. The program also featured Don Ameche, Dorothy Lamour and W.C. Fields.

The program originated at the new NBC studios at Sunset and Vine in Hollywood, but for a few weeks in 1938 Bergen moved to New York for a few broadcasts, several personal appearances and a holiday.

The New York World-Telegram, New York's leading newspaper, assigned it's amusement editor to cover Bergen and to do an in-depth story about his career. The amusement editor, Alton Cook, was very thorough in his background research, and found out, quite by accident, that there was only one Charlie McCarthy dummy. He also learned that Charlie cost \$125 to make and was not insured.

Therefore, if he pulled a publicity stunt he couldn't be prosecuted for grand larceny or become involved with an insurance company in the event of a problem.

Mr. Cook also found out that while Bergen was away from his hotel, Charlie was "put to bed" in a special designed suitcase and kept in a closet in his hotel room.

While Bergen was in New York he stayed at the prestigious Waldorf-Astoria hotel, and the enterprising Mr. Cook found out Bergen's room number.

The next step was to learn Bergen's schedule for the evening in order to pull of the heist.

The enterprising Mr. Cook then registered as E. Bergen at the Belmont Plaza hotel, which is across the street from the Waldorf-Astoria.

The offender who actually snatched the world famous dummy was Frank Farrell, columnist for *The New York World-Telegram*, who worked for Alton Cook. Farrell had been a newspaperman for four years, and feeling that he wanted to make a quick name for himself was happy to go along with the spectacular stunt.

About eight o'clock in the evening Farrell had the Belmont hotel telephone place a call to the Waldorf. Of course, the operator at the Belmont referred to the caller as Mr. Bergen.

The Waldorf switchboard operator was very respectful, while Farrell, posing as Bergen, explained to the operator that he was across the street at the Belmont Plaza and that some friends had prevailed upon him to do an impromptu bit with Charlie. Would the clerk be so kind as to enter his room, locate Charlie in his special suitcase and have him ready for pickup by the Belmont Plaza bellhop? Of course, the clerk would be most happy to oblige.

Here's what happened next, in Farrell's

"I met the bellhop in front of the Belmont Plaza as he crossed the street from the Waldorf, carrying the million-dollar dummy in his suitcase. I took the case from him, told him I was playing a joke on Edgar Bergen and I would get his picture in the papers and earn him an extra ten dollars if he would help me, provided of course, he played dumb when questioned by the police.

"The bellhop was game. We got into a cab and I told the driver to head for the west side, pick a dark, deserted street, and douse his lights. I then let the bellhop out of the cab, bound and gagged.

"The cab driver was also willing to go alone when I explained it was 'just a gag' and promised him an extra ten bucks for his trouble.

"A few minutes later the bellhop was picked up by the police. He played his part to perfection—and even when they located Bergen that evening he swore over and over again that he had no knowledge of the abduction."

Nonetheless, Bergen became almost hysterical at the thought of losing Charlie—after all, he was one of a kind, and that piece of carved wood was earning him over a half million dollars a year.


In the meantime, Farrell had taken Char-

lie—suitcase and all—to an office he shared. He planned to keep Charlie for a few days, taking pictures of him bound and gagged, with a ransom demand.

The whole thing unraveled when one of the other newspapermen found out about the "kidnapping" and exposed it.

In an interview I did with Mr. Bergen in 1974, he reveled to me, "If I wasn't such a tightwad I would have written a check for \$10,000 for all the free publicity. It really put Charlie and me on the map."

### **Board Members Express Thanks**


