

RHSA'S DEMISE?????

This letter is to outline what could possibly be the end of RADIO HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF AMERICA and its publication RADIO DIAL. After much thought and figuring I must pass on this message to ALL

MEMBERS, new and old.

INFLATION is one factor leading to the end of RHSA and RADIO DIAL. My health is another. Not many of the members know that I am a disabled veteran of World War II. Having recently retired with a disability retirement, I find living from day-to-day somewhat of a "guind. I have been told by my doctor's to take it as easy as I possibly can.

INFLATION has hit our SOCIETY point blank! Even though the paper used for RADIO DIAL is made right here in Cloquet, I cannot buy it directly from the mill. It must pass through several hands and be purchased in Duluth 20 miles away. The past year paper has tripled in price...ink has doubled in price...stencils the same. Also, there has been an increase in postage which I feel is way out of line for the service we get.

When I retired I had high hopes of issuing RADIO DIAL every other month. IT IS IMPOSSIBLE TO DO SO WITH THE PRESENT MEMBERSHIP DUES OF \$5.50 A YEAR! Since RHSA was started it has grown large and the larger it gets the more costly it is for me to put out with the

small dues asked.

WHAT ARE OUR PLANS? At a later date we will announce that we will stop taking NEW members and RENEWALS of membership. We will then publish RADIO DIAL until the membership is so small that it would not pay to publish just a few copies. Members who have joined for a two or three year period will have the balance of their dues returned to them. It will be a SLOW ending ... and a sad one for me.

have found that in the past when it was necessary to increase the dues 85% of the members put up a big SQUEAL! Most Historical Societies get the dues and forget about you. I have not operated RHSA that way! Once we get a member we give them individual personal service. We even answer all letters personally.

I am billing members who have membership due with this issue. This will perhaps be the last time that I will bill other members. (Those who come due with Summer 1974 issue). I have tried to be honest ... and will say again that members who have money coming to them after RADIO DIAL ceases publication will have it returned to

There are several reasons that I have set up this lending library. First and foremost to help beginning collectors get a good start without having to purchase shows to do so. Members will also be introduced to other members so they can begin trading. Also this

may take a load off of established collectors.

I have a catalog of shows for you to to select from. It will be added to as time and resources permit. Since there are costs for printing, tapes, mailers, postage, leader, mailing tape etc. I'm going to have to ask for a fee for each tape that is loaned from the library. I will also require a deposit from anyone subscribing to the service. The deposit is to protect against tapes being "lost" in the mail. The deposit will be \$4 and will be returned when you decide to discontinue service and all tapes have been returned. I am sure that you will agree that this is very liberal.

Here's the way it works. Any collector after making the deposit may borrow 1 or 2 tapes at a time from the catalog. There will be a service charge of \$1.50 per tape which must be paid at the time the order is placed. I will ship the tapes special 4th class with the special handling. The tapes must be shipped back to me within a week of the time they are received. They must be shipped back either 4th

class with special handling or 1st class.

Since the idea is to get people started trading there will be a limit of 30 tapes which can be borrowed from the library. By the time you have 30 reels you should be able to trade on your own. From time to time I will put out a list of members so that you can start trading with each other. You can even use the catalog as a reference to begin with.

I HAD A PLAY RADIO STATION TOO -- BY: HERBERT K. HOLMAN ----Mrs. Ingersoll's story about the radio station her son had reminded me of the play station my older brother and I built back about 1930. My brother became interested in radio when he was 15 and because we loved each other very much, I tagged along with him and became very interested in anything he did. Greg built a small transmitter and we set it up in his bedroom. Our transmitting antenna was a long piece of wire (about 200 feet) which we strung from the house to the barn. When the transmitter was completed we went on the air. To find out if we were being heard we called our nearest neighbor (about 5 miles away) and they reported we were coming in good. We played records on an old Edison upright phonograph with the cabon microphone standing in front of the phonograph speaker. We also read the news from the daily papers. Our little station was so well received that our neighbors suggested that when we went on the air to ring 10 short rings on the party line telephone. Our little radio station was very popular with the young folks and in the evening when we were on there were no less than 10 youngsters in our studio. We checked out our transmitting range to be about 10-15 miles, but were surprised to get a letter from someone that said they heard our station that lived about 100 miles away. Greg (my brother) became a radio engineer and held that position until his death in 1968. I have fond memories of our little station with the call letters KGHH. MUSIC INDUSTRY, LAWMEN GO AFTER TAPE BOOTLEGGERS --Music industry and law enforcement officials, attuned to the growing problem of tape piracy and its links with the underworld, have begun a rejuvenated flight against the multi-million dollar racket. Their efforts, aimed at impending an illegal business which has siphoned \$250 million in record industry profits last year took place last December in Nashville, Tennessee. Their crusade could result in a forum this spring of national music executives. Justice Department officials and members of the judic-Should the meeting materialize, it would focus on the clandestine tactics of illegal tape maufacturers and their efforts to circumvent the law. It also would concentrate on the foothold attained by the bootleg racket, especially in the Southeast where the country music market has been hit hardest. The opening round of the new fight was waged by a panel of some of Nashville's most prominent attorneys, music executives and law officials -- all of whom concede that organized crime is getting a firm grip on the racket, in existence for only several years.
"Organized crime has gotten heavily into this matter and is getting more heavily into it all the time," said Dick Frank, a well known attorney in music matters. He was one of 12 men on the antipiracy panel, sponsored by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences. At the present, 18 states have laws dealing with bootleg tape manufacturing, the practice of duplicating a performer's original recording without his or her record label. In some cases the tapes sell for half the legitimate price. Tennessee has the toughest antipiracy tape law, which makes it a felony to duplicate tapes. But there have been no convictions. "We're running up against a lot of money and the way I determine this is by the caiber of attorneys representing these tape pirates," said Bill Vest, head of the Tennessee Bureau of Criminal Identification probe into illegal tapes. "In Tennessee and other areas of the nation there is a large bootleg operation which we think is based in California and Las Vegas," said John Polk, agent-in-charge of the regional Anti-Piracy Intelligence Bureau of the Recording Industry Association of America. Many retail outlets, said Frank, purchase large supplies of pirated tapes "in good faith." "A great many of the retailers don't realize these tapes are pirated." said Frank. When you start hitting (arresting) relatively local people, you bring down enforcement to a level of people who are ignorant of what's happening. "You have to cut off the animal's head at the manufacturing and reproduction level." FROM OUR MEMBERS -- From California a letter says: "RADIO DIAL is great even if it is small.
