OU'LL agree with me that 1929 was not the

OU'LL agree with me that 1929 was not the most auspicious year to embark on a business venture of any kind, but it was that year, so help me, that I started to work on my five-year plan to become a national figure in the entertainment world—or else!

I was like dozens of other girls living in a medium-sized American city. Mine was Oakland, California. My parents were comfortably well-to-do, and they would have sent me on to college after I graduated from high school—only I wasn't partiduarly interested in going to college. I wasn't much of a student.

I surprised myself and everybody else by suddenly assuming a professional attitude. My ambition to succeed in a career was an almost overnight development.

Of course I had sung since I was knee-high to the proverbial grasshopper. But I had taken vocal instruction more for recreation than for anything else. Mother was proud of my voice—liked the idea that I actually could get through an aria without cracking up. Father approved of it, too, even worked up a little pride over my occasional recitals. But he was the sort of man who—bless his heart!—didn't want any daughter of his to work for a living. It never had occurred to me to do so, either!

a not-too-bad-looking young damsel with a not-too-bad voice, who sang fragments of Gilbert and Sullivan and Victor Herbert for any beaux who gathered around the family upright piano.

It was really Alice Eggers, my Oakland vocal teacher, who put the career bee in my bonnet. She who had trained my voice since I was fourteen, thought I could make a debut in the Metropolitan—and give all the prima donnas a pang of jealousy, at that. Her inordinate faith in my ability was appalling.

One sunny, lazy California day when i went to Miss Eggers for my lesson, she awaited me with her hat on, music under her arm, and a determined look on her face.

"Emil Pollack—the famous vocal teacher from New York—he's in San Francisco, and I have arranged for him to hear you sing!"

him to hear you sing!"

Miss Eggers and I took the ferry across the Bay to San Francisco. I stood staring across to the East and the Golden Gate, with both panic and excitement in

my eyes.

It was all well and good to talk about my voice having operatic qualities—but now an impress rio, an expert, was going to hear me sing! It was like something out of a novel, and peculiar shivers were creeping up and down my back. My singing never had caused me an uncomfortable or serious moment before that!

AT Emil Pollack's studio I sang A Kiss in the Dark and—as a sort of gentle hint, If I Were on the Stage, from Mademoiselle Modiste.

Emil Pollack liked my voice—even went so far as to say that if I came to New York I probably could get a job in musical comedy or light opera. Mr. Pollack coached me for several weeks, and when he returned to New York I was left to mull over the brand new idea of a career.

of a career.

I decided on it. I was not in love, not planning to be married. New York might be a "broadening" experience. I did not want to spend all my life in various choruses or night clubs, however. I decided to budget

home. Fhey made New York seem much less formidable than it otherwise might have been. So my story is not the usual one—I did not pound the pavements—did not go hungry. I drove to my first theatrical appointment in the Pollack's car, with Mr. Pollack at my side to champion me if necessary!

SANG my way into Max Hart's approval with It I Were on the Stage—my lucky audition song that I have used for the purpose ever since. Max Hart thought my voice would do, and he sent me right over to Schwab and Mandel who were casting the road company of

and Mandel who were casting the road company of Desert Song
At the moment I blew in—and there's so much in blowing in at the right moment!—Messrs. Schwab and Mandel were looking for somebody to step into Vivienne Segal's shoes in the lead. Again I sang If I Were on the Stage, and they said, "You are!"

Alex Gray was my leading man. He helped me rehearse the role. I hired a pianist, who went over the score with me time and again. Alex Gray taught me the elementaries of stage presence—and the whole company took the train West with one of the greenest leading ladies in history. Luck was "Continued on Page 28"

And of all people, Don McNeill, that matutinal wise-cracker, used to be one of those breakfast-hour savages. Today he's the laugh starter in countless American homes, His reformation is complete as will be attested by innumerable listeners to the NBC Breakfast

Club program on which Don is master-of-

McNeill used to think that anyone who McNeill used to think that anyone who could laugh before 10 a. m. was a bit on the off-side, with perhaps a strain of the hyena, that weird savage skulker which guffaws brutally but mirthlessly. Now he is crestfallen if every listener doesn't break down and chuckle at his every sally.

His own about-face was a purely economic one. Anyone could be good natured if he was paid for it and since Don is teeming with humor it wasn't difficult, once he put his mind to the task and his signature to the contract, to set back the clock on

to the contract, to set back the clock on his sense of humor. It used to bloom around mid-morning. Now it's in full flower at the first tinkle of the alarm clock.

S PONTANEITY is the secret back of Don's infectious fun. It bubbles up clear and sparkling from a hidden but boundless spring. It is unhampered by the usual restrictions of script or censor—in other words, is delivered fresh from the source without the adulterating process of handling by a middle-man.

On his more serious broadcasts Don must abide by the dictates of the continuity writers—but on the Breakfast Club, which is his special province, he lives from moment to moment, untrammeled and free to leap from quip to quip with the abandon of a mountain goat. He seizes every minute by the shoulders and shakes out of it each possible opportunity for a wheeze. Associates in the studio, keyed to his mental tempo, catch the spirit of the semi-formal program, and, if for no other reason than the hope of catching him napping, leave him wide openings for his ready wit. So far he hasn't overlooked a single chance, but back in his mind is a lurking dread that one of the other fellows in the

is a lurking dread that one of the other fellows in the studio will catch him with his guard down.

A recent instance of his alert thinking was a concrete example of the case in point. One would hardly dare to go so far as to say it was all planned as part

of the good-natured bantering between members of the Breakfast Club cast—but it could hardly pass as anything less than co-incidence.

According to Don's program schedule Jack Owens was to sing Shelter From a Shower. He launched into one of his characteristic ad lib introductions and had just reached the point for the punch line when two of the musicians bore down on him waving the score of another song which they whispered was the one Owens

With his infectious calm and without a change in the tempo of his speech Don announced to listeners, "Well, that was a dandy continuity right up to there but it now appears Jack isn't going to sing Shelter From a Shower which is what I gave you all that build-up for. He's going to sing an entirely different number."

And he announced the title thus averting an avalanche of mail to Radio Guide's Bulls and Boners department and at the same time saving the point of his introduction to the wrong song.

McNeill, physically, gives a pointed impression of the wit and ability to meet any situation which might arise in broadcasting.

That's why he has been able to keep the Breakfast Club up to its high entertainment


That's why he has been able to keep the Breakfast Club up to its high entertainment level. He imparts to it a noticeable smoothness, a fluidity that keeps it moving without those low spots which infest many more carefully studied programs. Above all it is less a remote program than a literal visitation, right in your own breakfast room, of a group of cheerful, fun-loving friends.

It is the link between the stark "Hi, folks" type of independent station program, that teems with the false atmosphere of back slapping, and the strictly formal offerings which somehow fail to intrigue listeners in any vast numbers. Furthermore it brightens the morning without stooping bothe Pollyanna note or the soul-searing banality of the daily pep-talk.

In short, the Breakfast Club is just any family at breakfast. Listeners completely lose sight of the fact that it is just a broadcast and accept it as a bit of enjoyable daily routine originating in the household. That is the zenith of deception and with all of the credit that is due members of the program personnel, recognition must be made of McNeill's handling of the hour.

IUSTIFICATION for the statement leaps forth from

JUSTIFICATION for the statement leaps forth from the fact that before McNeill became its autocrat, the Breakfast Club drifted along on the NBC schedule like a balloon freed of its mooring. Scanty is a kindly word to use about the attention it received from listeners. One and another master-of-ceremonies tried his hand at steering the program to something approximating success but somehow the goal always was just around the corner. (Continued on Page 23)



HEN Easter dawns on April 21, the entire world, thanks to the marvel that is radio can worship, in unison the joyous festival of the Resurrection

From the scene of the Nativity, from the cloisters of the Vatican, from the Al tars of almost every locality on the globe where Christianity has pierced, will come

tars of almost every locality on the globe where Christianity has pierced, will come services of one sort or another in which devotees from the most remote corners can participate. To the shut-ins and those isolated from orthodox places of worship radio will bring the Word in many tongues, beginning with the seasonal observances which will start on Good Friday and continue through until the close of the festal day, Sunday. Out-of-door services will vie with the routine rites of the church so that all may celebrate in the way they deem most fitting. Probably of major interest to American worshippers will be the services in which Pope Piux XI will participate from historic St Peter's in Rome. Sunday April 21, at 6:30 a. m. EST (5:30 CST). For the first time in the history of the church the thrilling service from the loggia of St. Peter's will be heard outside of the ancient capital. This is the ceremony in which His Holiness imparts his blessings to the hordes which gather annually in this hallowed square.

In addition to the words of the Supreme Catholic Regent there will be short-waved across the sea, for rebroadcasting in America, the exalted music of the Benedictory Services at St. Peter's. The program will be of a half-hour's duration. Station EIAR, of the Italian broadcasting system, will co-operate in the history-making broadcast with the National Broadcasting.

FROM the very shadows of historic jaffa Gate is Jerusalem, ancient seat of Christianity, the Columbia Broadcasting System will bring the pealing of the bells in Christ Church.

The fifteen-minute broadcast which follows the

tolling of the bells to be heard in America at 11:15 a. m. EST (10:15 CST), will include descriptions, in English, of the various celebrations in this international shrine, and literally will carry the listeners across the ages to the birthplace of Christianity.

The broadcast was made possible by the joint efforts of Cesar Saerchinger, CBS foreign director, officials of the British Broadcasting Company, those of the Palestine Broadcasting Company and the Postmaster General of the country.

TWO impressive services of American origin also will be broadcast nationally by CBS. These will precede the foreign program and will include the inspiring tribute to the dead in the Arlington Cemetery amphiteater, and the equally famous and impressive surrise service from the Hollywood Bowl

Leading congressional figures, Cabinet members and

Leading congressional figures, Cabinet members and other Washington notables will participate in the Arlington rites which will be broadcast for the fifth consecutive year, to be heard at 7:30 a. m. EST (6:30 CST) over the full facilities of the CBS network.

The Hollywood sunrise services will follow immediately the conclusion of the rites at the Capital. Despite their religious character, these will not be quite so som ber as in the national burial grounds. In addition to the customary Easter observances, the services at the Bowl will have a typical Hollywood flavor with a reading by Mary Pickford music by a 100-piece orchestra under the direction of Maurice Kohler; a choir of 300 voices, and hymns by the 200 white-pobed juve

orchestra under the direction of Maurice Kohler; a choir of 300 voices, and hymns by the 200 white-robbed juve nile singers who will comprise a vast human cross. The invocation will be read by Doctor C. Klein nauser of the Hollywood-Beverly Christian Church, and the benediction by Doctor E. H. Longbrake of the Rosewood M. E. Church. The broadcast will be heard nationally via CBS networks from 8 to 8:30 a. m. EST (7 to 7:30 CST.)

A NOTHER vivid period of outdoor worship will be afforded listeners throughout the country by NBC when it brings to the microphone the ceremonies at the Grand Canvon

From the deep floor of this stupendous Colorado River gorge will come the voice of the Bishop of the Arizona diocese of the Episcopal Church as he conducts the Ante-Communal service in an amphitheater provided by Nature.

As 3,000 or more tourists and native citizens worship, the dignitary will be aided by three assistants and a mixed a capella choir of 40 voices from the Arizona State Teachers College. Students of the institution will give a brief program of Easter music under the direction of the musical supervisor of the school, Elden A Ardrey The program will be heard at 7:30 a. m. EST (6:30 CST) over an NBC-WEAF network.

LIGHTER note in the day's comprehensive program will be a narrator's description, via the NBC
WJZ network, of the brilliant holiday style pageants
on Fifth Avenue in Manhattan and on Michigan Boulevard, Chicago. Mobile transmitters will be used to provide announcers with a complete picture of the colorful parade. This broadcast will be at 2:15 p. m. EST (1:15

parade. This broadcast will be a compared to the CST).

Of particular interest to worshipers of Scandinavian origin will be the broadcast at 9:15 a. m. EST (8:15 CST) via NBC-WEAF, of the Norwegian Easter services in New York. These ceremonies will be featured by the singing of the Modern Male Chorus of Manhattan and the renowned St. Olaf Choir of Minneapolis led by Doctor I. A. Aasgard.

# Reviewing Radio

HE MOST worried people in the radio realm at the moment are the sponsors and agencies conducting shows which advertise laxatives. It is conceded in the headquarters of the net-

conducting shows which advertise laxatives. It is conceded in the headquarters of the networks that these are among the few unwelcome patrons of kilocycle entertainment. Not that the network gentlemen are suddenly gone æsthetic. They are just cautious, because they have had some strong hints from Washington that the advertising spiels regarding this type of patent medicine are objectionable—which may result in a general exodus of such sponsors from the air. Already, at NBC, the bars are down, and time unavailable for laxative ballyhoos.

For the first time in radio history a network cracked down on a sponsor last week. The incident, which has more than ordinary significance, occurred at CBS. Anticipating the Federal frown on distasteful spiels, the Columbia gents gently notified THE BIG SHOW sponsors that they must clean up their commercial announcements by removing the lately introduced jingles having to do with internal physical disorders, and by eliminating a character, MADAME X, who presented interviews with users of the product—interviews with users of the product—interviews with the entertainment. The sponsor was very decent about it, accepted the edict with good grace, and immediately revised the ballyhoo to a more conservative degree.

THE week also renewed interest in the perennial feuds among the radio artists, with GEORGE GIVOT following DAVID FREEDMAN into the offices of counsel. Freedman, who recently hung a suit on Cantor, for whom he used to write gags, was emulated by Givot, who is plotting injunctions against imitators. There was no improvement in the feeling between FRED WARING and WALTER O'KEEFE, who coyly advises the audience to "go to sleep" just before the Waring show comes on the air... A newer feud is that between Waring and PHIL SPITALNY, over chorus work. GUY LOMBARDO and JAN GARBER are still at daggers' points, because Lombardo says

Garber snitches his style . . . ABE LYMAN and WAYNE KING are hardly pals over that waltz tempo . . . As you may deduce, all is far from quiet on the radio front.

I became convinced, too, during the past week that all the amateur shows are slipping. Their quality may be okay, but the public displays unmistakable apathy.

The responses are dying down, and if you should wonder why, you might try to explain it in this way: The amateur shows are being rehearsed. Some of their masters of ceremony are ringing in plants—professionals, and under phoney names. They are making up comedy scripts, and the plants are so obvious. This gives an air of artificiality to the shows, and no public ever liked to be deceived, especially in a palpable manner. There are interesting reports on Radio Row which insist that in midsummer you will have heard the last, or nearly the last, of the simon pure sessions.

Another trend is that of opera singers to assume dramatic roles. Following MARIO CHAMLEE'S acceptance of a character bit in the forthcoming George Frame Brown series, Tony and Gus, we hear that JOHN CHARLES THOMAS is going to sing and act both, in Our Home on the Range, a dramatic serial at NBC-WJZ, in which John Charles will become himself in the plays, but will perform as the owner of a ranch. It will be a 45-minute session. as the owner of a a 45-minute session.

DURING the week the following curiosa were revealed:

The saxophone, which not long ago was regarded as a lowbrow, and actually banned in some countries, was shown by a survey to be in use on 75 percent of all radio programs.

DALE WIMBROW was authorized to present an episode of his own at NBC, called Country Fair. Twelve years ago at the same studios this act was barred because, said the station authorities, it used crowd noises "to which the public might object."

THE FOUR ACES, who explain bridge problems via CBS, showed by their fan mail that they thus far have averted 14 domestic estrangements arising out of disputes at cards.

socially prominent painter, is certainly a strong founda-tion upon which to build feminine loudspeaker interest. And while we are at it, we'd like to award plums to GALE PAGE, who so capably portrays in this series the dramatic as well as singing role of Gertrude Lamont.

And, balancing our generosity in the reverse direction, we consign carloads of wrinkled prunes to the sponsors who are getting off the radio bandwagon as the warmer months approach. Summer doesn't make us stop listening. Does it you?

LEAVE IT TO Virginia Payne, star of the Ma Perkins sketches aired from Chicago, to adapt radio and recording to a most unique method of studying dramatics under a great, if rather migratory, teacher—Engenie Leontovitch.

Mlle. Leontovitch, now touring, carries in her trunks a recording combination phonograph-radio. The celebrated Russian actress employs the machine to improve her own delivery of lines. Hearing of this, Miss Payne communicated with Leontovitch and arranged to have her record the Perkins programs and criticize them.

Imagine Miss Payne's surprise when, after receiving the first metal disc from the famous artiste of the stage without accompanying note, she placed it on her phonograph and heard, at the end of the program, Leontovitch's own voice offering suggestions and criticisms!

# Joe Cook-Forty Years a Clown

"Now That I am the Richest Man in the World I Often Sit Aboard One of My Yachts and Think of the Days When Money Was a Total Stranger to Me"

The boy who grew up to become the world's only one-man three-ring circus, was born Joseph Lopez. A tragic accident took his parents away when he still was very young. He and his brother thereupon were adopted by a kindly, sympathetic Mrs. Cook, who couldn't have taken better care of the orphans if they had been her own sons.

Joe early became fired with the idea of doing stunts in a circus. With a suit of his foster-father's underwear for tights, and with equipment from sundry sources, he put on a circus in a back yard at Evansville, Indiana—"Plesure Park" the place proudly was called—asked and obtained five cents admission for every juvemile attendant.

The death of his foster-father took the remnants of the family to New York. There a trip to a vaudeville house imbued him with the idea of imitating what he saw on the stage. And so he strove to master the juggling of five Indian clubs in the air at once.

Joe and two youthful companions, suspicious to a New York cop, were picked up on the Bowery late one night, and taken, along with the beavy suit case of bejeweled Indian clubs they carried—and a ten-dollar bill the custody of the bluecoat.

The policeman looked down at the small, squirming figure and asked for explanations. His two aides flanking him on either side, arms poised calmly behind their backs and knees bent at just the and knees bent at just the proper angle, Joe stepped forward and began to fling his clubs aloft. Faster and faster they twirled around. One seemed ready to hit the ground, but a swift left foot neatly caught it and

sent it spinning back in the air to join its fellows. Then the two aides sprang to attention. More clubs beat the air, and flying balls narrowly missed hair-tonic bottles. Then with a sweeping bow the performers finished their act.

The policeman leaped from his chair, shouted "bravo!" and clapped each one of them on the back. Before sending the boys home to bed he made them promise to see that he had tickets for their first real profes-

THOSE boys were good. They had to be to win their amateur prize that night in the face of such accomplished amateur performers as a young girl who goes by the name of Fannie Brice and a tiny dancing demon known as Georgie White—who has since made a fortune out of dancers and their constituents.

The other two members of that trio were Joe's brother, and Curly. Curly was the son of the head waiter at the Hoffman House. His father's dress shirt added the necessary bit of tone to the act. The glistening white of the shirt usually was marred by a scarlet dash of tomato sauce—but it never daunted the spirit of its wearer. These two were merely assistants—Joe constituted the real act. It was his inventive genius that won them prizes—the same inventive genius that dominates a star-studded show every Friday night when he steps into the sawdust ring of Circus Night in Silvertown.

# Not in the Script

Here Is a Rare Opportunity to Peep Behind Scenes and See What Happens off the Records

## By James Wallington

HERE always is something happening behind scenes in the studio, unknown to the audience of listeners, not to be found in the script. Broadcasting as the announcer sees it, is different even from what you would think it in visiting the studio. You never would realize that the no announcer ever sits through another's program without express permission. It's an unwritten rule. And you probably never would realize that the announcer is in complete charge of the studio—keeping in hand the audience as well as the players.

Any ordinary broadcast has its problems, but the broadcast of a special event—such as a Presidential inauguration, a football game, et cetera—always tests the wits of the announcer, and frequently even his agility—since we never know from what precarious spot we will have to broadcast. I remember having to traipse the eight-inch catwalk of the unfinished dirigible Akron at the time of its dedication. At a place where I had to walk in the open air sixty feet above the hanger floor, I suddenly grew dizzy and fell. I saved myselfourly by being fortunate enough to straddle the narrow metal plank, but it was close enough to show me what might happen.

BROADCASTING naturally has its share of practical jokers. I remember the time the final entry in an amateur singers' contest of a few years ago turned out to be the NBC announcer, John Young. The distinguished jury of famous singers—among whom were Reinald Werrenrath, Lawrence Tibbett and Mme. Frances Alda—had been listening for hours to the endless stream of bright young high school vocalists. With weary resignation they heard almost all of Young's startling "You Remind Me of My Mother" before they realized somebody was having fun.

Another thing nobody ever knew about was one of the best pieces of sports announcing Graham McNamee ever turned in. It wasn't broadcast, of course, but it represented superb work nonetheless. The occasion was a ping-pong game between announcers George Hicks and Alwyn Bach. Graham didn't know anything about ping-pong, but he knew tennis and he knows showmanship. He gave a play by play description of the amateur contest which made it sound as thrilling as a Dempsey-Tunney bout.

An announcer's job is split up into a number of specialties. He must be a stooge for comedians, able to broadcast "heavy" programs—opera, et cetera—and he must be able to ad lib on comedy programs, on special news events and on popular dance programs. In my opinion NBC's best all around announcer for all these assignments is Ben Grauer. And I think Columbia's best is Harry Von Zell.

The announcers have to have sharp wits. I really think that as a group of men they are more adroit in repartee and in carrying on a facile conversation than any other you might name. You will find them at their best—or worst—at one of the periodic after-hours dinners where the twenty talkers without an audience carry

on twenty brilliant and unheard monologues.

In such a society nicknames come and go quickly. but as of today, the chief of them are these: for Alwyn Bach, Moses; for Ford Bond, Shirley; for Nelson Case, Nellie; for Ben Grauer, Bunny; for Alois Havrilla, Little Chocolate Drop or The Bouncing Czech; for Howard Petrie, The Viking; for John Young, Champ; for Frank Singiser, who is bald, Herpicide, and for Don Wilson.

DERHAPS the pest tale in the annals of radio is that vouched for by C. J. Ingram, radio editor of a New Jersey newspaper. When a Fireman Off Duty Risks His Life to Save Another, Only Radio Could Be His Inspiration

HE glowing tip of that cigarette dropped closer and closer to the mattress. Old Ivan Reese was asleep.


As he lay there snoring, he looked much older than his 60 years. His cheeks hollowed and his chest heaved, alternately, with each noisy breath. He was all alone in the little frame cottage in which he lived.

The window in the bedroom was closed, the air filled with smoke. Between Reese's relaxing, bony fingers, the cigarette burned like the fuse of a bomb. It slid between those fingers—stopped—hung in mid-air above the mat-tress, while curls and ringlets of blue smoke ascended noiselessly—noiselessly . . . Ivan Reese still slept. He slept even when a crisp voice broke through the

He slept even when a crisp voice broke through the stillness of the room, saying:

"Calling Car 17... Car 17... A drunken man annoying people at ...

The voice of the Berkeley, California, police broadcaster did not disturb Reese. He was used to it. Through solitary hours, sitting in his little cottage, he used the medium of radio to keep himself in touch with the world of action and adventure—the world he had left behind with his youth. And better than any high-priced pro-

grams, he loved the police calls.

Now Ivan Reese was drawing very close to the last great adventure of all. For while lying on his bed, smoking and listening to the police broadcaster, he had gone to sleep. The cigarette was slipping from between his fingers...

The glowing tip fell upon the mattress. In a moment darker smoke mingled with the blue spiralling haze of tobacco. The mattress began to burn. A tiny glowing ball of fire, silent as death, ate its way into the ticking of the mattress. Ivan Reese slept on. Smoke, pungent and suffocating, unrolled in the room. It penetrated to Reese's lungs. It seeped through cracks, and darkened the clear air outside. That's how the neighbors came to know that Ivan Reese's house was a-fire, with Ivan inside, probably burning to death. There was a sudden clamor—a telephone call. And while excited people gathered on the little lot, upon which Reese's house was set well back from the street, this radio call flashed across the city of Berkeley:

street, this radio call flashed across the city of Berkeley:
"Call for Berkeley Fire Department Cars... Berkeley Fire Department Cars... Still alarm... Ninth Street between Camelia and Page... Call for..."

And Reese, sinking momentarily deeper and deeper into the sleep of suffocation, failed to hear the voice of the police broadcaster—even though that voice was sending help to him. All the rest of the city could hear that alarm—but Reese could not, even though his own loudspeaker uttered the words right there in the very room

speaker uttered the words right there in the very room in which the fires of death rapidly were kindling!

IEUTENANT Bert La Strange of the Berkeley Fire Department had two hobbies—first his job, and sec-

Department had two hobbies—first his job, and second, radio.

It is no exaggeration to say that La Strange made a hobby of his job. So much did he enjoy being a fireman that he worked at it 24 hours a day! And that's where radio fitted into the picture.

In the comfortable La Strange home at No. 1400 Cairns Street a large and powerful all-wave radio set stood, waiting to put its owner in touch with the four corners of the globe at any hour of the day or night. Yet the Lieutenant rarely cruised upon the ether waves beyond the confines of his own city. For he, like Ivan Reese, was a police-radio fan. But for a different reason. For while Reese liked to let his imagination carry him away to unlived adventure on the wings of police calls, La Strange used those same calls to direct himself into actual, physical danger! Like the postman who goes for a walk on his holiday, this fireman used his

days off as grand occasions to listen for fire calls. And whenever a fire broke out near his home, he used to fly out of the house and try to beat his buddies of the Department to the scene of action.

Of course, he didn't have to do this. Except in case

Of course, he didn't have to do this. Except in cases of emergency, a fireman is not expected to dash into smoke and flames on his day off. La Strange did it because he liked it! Perhaps that's one reason he became a Lieutenant

Now though La Strange never had met Ivan Reese, the older man lived only a couple of blocks away from the Lieutenant. And just about the time Reese was courting death by falling asleep with a lighted cigarette dropping above a straw mattress, La Strange was sitting in his home, talking to Fireman George Cook from his own station.

"I don't care much for that soprano," said the Lieutenant, twisting the dial. Almost instantly, the deep voice of the police broadcaster came through the loudspeaker:

"Calling Car 17 . . . Car 17 . . . A drunken man annoying people at . ."
"Well, he's no soprano!" said Cook with a chuckle.
"No." the Lieutenant agreed. "We've got a good bunch of coppers in this town," he went on. "But I'd rather be a fireman than a copper any day in the week."
"Why?" "Why?"

"Because I'd sooner pull people outta fires than put 'em in jail! Why, I wanted to be a fireman when I was a kid. Used to play at it all the time, climbing ladders and all. Even if I had a million dollars, I'd still be a fireman. Of course, it's no game for sissies

Again the voice of the police broadcaster broke in:
"Call for Berkeley Fire Department cars . . . Berkeley Fire Department cars . . . . . . . . . . . . Nintb
Street between Camelia and Page . . . Call for . . "

FOR an instant both firemen sat rigid. It was the same call which, even at that very instant, had spoken from the loudspeaker of Ivan Reese's radio, in the smoke-filled room in which he lay unconscious. "Come on!" La Strange leaped to his feet. Cook jumped up too, infected by his superior's zeal and onthysisem.

"That's just around the corner." the Lieutenant cried. "Let's go!" And they did go—like small boys racing out of the house to take part in a harmless childhood game. But this was a game with Death for an opponent. And no heedless boys, but two thoroughly brave men, ran from La Strange's house on that February day, intent on risking their lives.

And it wasn't even their duty.

Crowds had gathered around the little Reese cottage by then. They shouted in excitement. People milled about. Mothers cuffed little boys, and pulled them far back from the cottage. Smoke billowed above the roof. But from the house itself no (Continued on Page 28)

## Music in the Air

## By Carleton Smith

NLY once in a lifetime does there come such an artist as KIRSTEN FLAGSTAD. If you believe, the music reviewers, this is indisputably the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but... Coming unheralded with an unfamiliar name, on a small weekly salary, this woman now sells out the opera house by the mere mention that she will sing. She was the Metropolitan's second choice for the Wagnerian roles, another soprano having been imported for the first—and preferred nalf—of the season. At Bayreuth she had sung only minor roles, never once before naving been thought of as Brunnbilde or solde. Yet Lawrence Gilman found her folde one of the rarest, perhaps the rarest, of our time: "an embodiment so deepy sensitive in its imaginative truth or so exalted and enamoring a beauty, that the function of the critic becomes, in its presence, a mere opportunity to exercise his highest privilege—what Swinburne called the noble pleasure of praising."

The great Wagnerian critic attended each of her performances and nearly exausted his vocabulary in praising her. But he was not alone. Olin Downes found ners "a truly magnificent voice and a nature to feel profoundly and communicate with surpassing sincerity and vision the greatness of Wagner ... The effect was to restore certain gigantic manifestations of art to their proper proportions in the observer's consciousness, and these proportions, these rich and tremendous utterances, made a good deal of our contem-

poraneous expressions appear fussy, petty and pretentious."

W. J. Henderson, whose memory goes back to the days of Lilli Lehmann, wondered "how she acquired her excellent tone production and her perfectly equalized scale, her command of dynamics, her easy delivery of finely spun piano passages

command of dynamics, her easy delivery of finely spun piano passages which can be heard all over the house, and her equally facile flights into full-throated high tones."

Few were the cautious phrases. So overpowering was her youth, her sincerity, and the lyric beauty of her voice that many forgot that she has yet completely to ripen, that she is singing many of the Wagner roles for the first time.

Most sensible of all in the midst of the flurried excitement is Kirsten Flagstad. For there is nothing in the least sensational about her. She actually is surprised at America's reception.

She is pleased that a full season of concerts has been booked for her next Winter at a substantial fee. She is glad that she will sing all of her roles again at the Met next season. But she is not puffed up over the critics' enconiums, and she has no illusions about them. For she knows that she has yet to improve.

to improve.

She comes of a Nor-weglan family to whom music is not merely an avocation but the staff of life. Her father is a conductor. Her mother is a pianist and coach for individual singers and is a pianist and coach for individual singers and chorus; it was with her that Kirsten prepared her new Wagnerian roles for the Metropolitan, when she did not do the work herself. She has two brothers, one a conductor and the other a concert pianist. Her sister is a cellist.

And Mme. Flagstad admits that her own daughter by a previous marriage although only

14, is beginning to show signs of a gift

for singing.

Kirsten began to study the piano as a child. She remembers that her mother made it clear to her that there was no

But theory, harmony and counterpoint she would not master; no compulsion could force the child to pay attention to these aspects of music. To this day she has retained a distaste for them. But, on the credit side, she was born with one important gift—absolute pitch.

There is an air of graciousness about her, and a simplicity of movement that are indescribably effective, even on the stage, when she seems not to be acting at all but merely to be living. She has had no time to make friends or to see America. Her trip to Detroit will be her first visit westward, and she will sail shortly for her native Oslo to rest and prepare for next season. season.

season.



It is the spirit they catch as well as the letter thus revealing the fact that McNeill's broadcasts have ap-peal any hour of the day. But canny reasoning, the fruit of broadcasting ex-perience, has taught studio program exec-utives that it is at the breakfast hour that the greatest number of listeners is available. That's a pretty sweet bit of available. That's a pretty sweet bit of bait to offer the potential sponsor when you are trying to coax him into the com-mercial trap.

So it all simmers down to the issue; who is this guy, McNeill; whence came he and what of his background? To take them in their order, he's a Galena, Illinois, boy who bowed to the world, in the historic border town, December 23, 1907. His birthday so close to Christmas is said to have prompted for the first time, the now-threadbare gag, "It's a gift."

It was in 1933 that NBC lured him into the fold and the rest is public knowledge. Don's skill with the pencil is not his only asset. He's an accomplished musician, but with it all he loves best to draw—and make up those capital cracks that keep the listeners in stitches.

He is six feet, two inches tall and admits to 185 pounds. He has abundant dark hair which appears unruly but which is generally under control. He has that mental serenity which makes for facile thinking and unless all signs fail will continue for some time to come as the fellow who starts the day right for more than a million persons. It's quite a responsibil-ity—especially for a chap who started out in life as one of those early-hour unapproachables.



And Joe began to juggle his eight balls, Before Levy could stop him, he went into the rest of his act. He never knew into the rest of his act. He never knew whether the manager believed he was substantiating the evidence of the photograph. All he did know when he finally emerged from that office in a slightly dazed state was that he had been hired for one week to make his first professional appearance. to make his first professional appearance

to make his first professional appearance in vaudeville!

That started the career of Joe Cook. At first he did only his juggling, globe-rolling and tight-rope walking act. But in the course of his wanderings from one stage to another, he picked up every stunt he ever saw that depended on skillful hands and feet for their success. He learned to play every musical instrument—he could sing—and as a climax to every performance he would model a head of Lincoln out of clav or paint a beautiful landscape out of clay or paint a beautiful landscape wrong-side up! According to the way Joe describes it today, it must have been some act:

"In 1909 I produced an act carrying about 20 trunks and crates. In that act I had at least one bit or stunt from every style of current vaudeville act. The props style of current vaudeville act. The props and wardrobe alone cost me around \$5,000, which was considerable money in those

"I put the act on in Altoona, Pennsylthat the idea of one man doing a lot of things created a great deal of talk, and that the act would be a drawing card. I used the impressive title: 'Master of All Trades'"

His act rapidly was placing him in the top flight of stage performers when the Fate that had been so kind up until now turned away her smile. Joe had to lie in a hospital for seven weeks with a poisoned foot. a hospital for seven weeks with a poisoned foot. Just as he was able to get around, there came a hurry call to play Hammerstein's Roof, in New York, and a rush order to show his new act to the managers. But he was so weak from his long period in bed that his ankle turned when he tried to dance, walk on the wire or do any of his other stunts. The managers told the young man that he was trying to do too much, and refused to be convinced by Joe's explanation of his weak ankle. "Then," Joe continued, "followed a period of laying off, with the bank account getting lower and lower all the time. The diamonds which all actors in those days

diamonds which all actors in those days felt obliged to wear, began to find a resting place in the pawnshop vaults. I owed bills to the trade papers for advertising. I was down and out—what I mean, down

"Well, after my character had been built Well, after my character had been built way up by the courageous way in which I faced adversity, I was just about to apply to Mr. Macy for a job driving one of his wagons. Then the Sheedy Booking Office offered me five week's work. It was at such a low salary that I could not do the act I had tried to put over, as the transportation of props alone would have eaten up the entire salary. I did not know what to do. I looked over all the books that tell you how to succeed, but I could find no chapter that told me what to do when a salary offered me was not fat enough to pay the railroad to ship my stuff. So I threw the book away and be-

came a blackface comedian.

"And now, after the years have passed and I am probably the richest man in the world, I often sit aboard one of my yachts smoking three or four perfectoes at one time, thinking of the days when money was to me, like the King of England, a total stranger."

Of course, Joe did have to get that plug for his yachts in, but after I blushingly had turned down one of his perfectoes and a yacht, he went on with his story.

He told me more of his bad ankle's demanding rest—which misfortune eventu-ally led Joe to adopt the blackface juggling act and then a blackface single.

During the years that followed Joe built up his act into the longest single act ever presented on a vaudeville stage. The cli-max to the never-ending versatility of this daring young man on the flying trapeze (and anything else that happened to be handy) came when he was playing in Pittsburgh one Spring. He received a wire offering him a salary of \$150 a week to do a Summer show in New York if he could imitate Joe Frisco, the dancer.

He reached New York and found to his relief that somebody on and found to his relief that somebody on the same bill with him once had seen Frisco dance. The show opened—and Cook "panicked" them with the most skillful imitation of Frisco that ever had been seen around New York.

BECAUSE he was too frail for the job, Ben Bernie couldn't follow his father's trade, blacksmithing. Yet starting on an entirely opposite career, he has hammered away at it far more diligently than he ever would have had to at shaping iron footwear for horses. And of all the people in the theatrical world it safely can be said of the Old Maestro that the anvils never have resounded to the mention of his name.

Lucky fellow—many say. Lovely fellow is the real reason. Sweet is a dangerous word with which to toy in the description of any man, but it can be ascribed to Ben without so much as a chance for misunderstanding. Theatrical audiences note it; radio listeners sense it and those who meet him, even casually, come away completely swayed by that particular phase of his personality. More accurately, it's a pleasing graciousness of manner. It is obvious that Ben never in his life made a single motion calculated to win someone's approval or friendship, yet in every stratum of life through which he has passed he has left for posterity lasting imprints of his blazing magnetism.

Perhaps it is a merging of a ringing sincerity and a stout honesty, but most certainly something exists which draws a world to his circle; makes sycophants of those who are themselves accusated and the favoring of the mon. There is a ringent of the mon. There is a ring to the mon.

honesty, but most certainly something exists which draws a world to his circle; makes sycophants of those who are themselves accustomed to adulation and the fawning of the mob. There is a ring of inspiration in the voice of every guest star who appears on his programs, and it is doubtful if any one ever asked so to perform, has rejected the privilege for reasons within human control.

All of these characteristics lend to his enduring popularity in every field in which he is active. But they are not the basic elements. Back of the Bernie fund of humor and good-fellowship is a wealth of human understanding, the realization that even the most brilliant of the stars loses its luster if too persistently exposed. So Ben wisely does not hog the limelight. Like Rudy Vallee and Jack Benny, whose fame has lost any tinge of impermanency, he is thoroughly unselfish, averse to aggrandizing himself. Anybody who works with Ben gets more than an even break. He is no extrovert, but he has the confidence in himself to which

He is no extrovert, but he has the confidence in himself to which years of success have entitled him—and he fears not to share his plaudits with those with whom he surrounds himself professionally. A comparison to several artists who have reached the heights in radio only to drop to semi-obscurity, will reveal that while Ben was dividing the spoils, those ego-intoxicated luminaries were centering the spotlight exclusively on themselves.

That all-encompassing understanding of Ben's is the fruit of the struggle for achievement. The financially secure orchestra director of today presents no picture of the sordid beginning which was Ben's lot. There was grim irony for the Ancelewitz (Ben's surname) family of Bayonne, New Jersey, in the whimsical charm with which Longfellow invested the smith and his forge.

To Ben's father, with his wife and eleven children, it was a grim and battering trade devoid of anything save back-breaking and almost fruitless toil. As his son Benjamin reached the age where his future became an issue, it is not surprising that the labor-worn father found a ready alibi for shunting him off into another field of endeavor. Music seemed to be of his fiber, so sufficient funds were eked from the limited income to give Ben his start. The story of his eventual rise to a violinist of sufficient merit to earn him a place in the theater, has been repeated until it is fraved.
