Happy Listening

THESE words may be a bit too late to do any good, but we want it known that we are sorry we ever uttered kind words about the broadcasting of fights. But unhappy as we were at these fatalities, we were made unhappier when Tommy Farr himself was presented to the radio audience on the Rudy Vallee program. Tommy spoke remarkably well for a fighter, but our pain was derived from our bewilderment at hearing Farr's simple remarks succeeded by thunderous waves of laughter that shook the innards of our loudspeaker. Why such laughter? Was he dressed as Baby Bunting or was he performing Ritz Brother nip-ups on Rudy Vallee's prostrate form? But no one ever told us.

Now we've learned the reason, and we're opposed forever to fights being broadcast if this sort of thing is to be a regular consequence. Tommy Farr was making faces. Like a big silly, he was standing behind the mike, twisting his lips around his battered nose, ogling the studio audiences, mugging until they howled. Well, it was nice of Mr. Vallee's sponsors to allow Mr. Farr to turn his lips into a pretzel for the laughs he got

from the studio audience, but it was stupid of them to forget that umpteen millions of us were waiting for something to drift out of our loudspeaker that would enable us to have just half as much fun as the belly-laughers in the studio.

As we said, we don't mind the fights themselves, but we wonder if they are worth the by-products.

Unfortunately, our indignation over Mr. Farr's facial-muscle dance has taken too much space to allow the old fellow his just dues. COME TO THE CONVENTION



Legionnaires by the thousands will descend upon New York Monday to join in the greatest reunion in history—their 19th Annual Convention!

IT'S going to be the biggest convention in history!

It will bring to New York the hugest army of visitors that even that great metropolis, long accustomed to counting its people in the millions, has ever known!

There'll be a parade that will take 24 hours to pass any given point! In this, probably the greatest of all peacetime parades, there'll be no less than 600 bands, bugle and fife-and-drum corps!

From all over the country, 500,000 men, women and children will descend on New York, by bus and car, by train and plane—some of them in motorcades originating hundreds of miles away—to join in the greatest reunion of its citizens this country has ever known!

It's the American Legion Convention of 1937 in New York City, scheduled this year for the four days from September 20 to September 23, and it will be on the air over National Broadcasting Company, Columbia and Mutual Coast-to-Coast networks!

UP FIFTH Avenue Again in 1937!"—that's the slogan of the American Legion Convention. It's a slogan reminiscent of the wartime days twenty years ago, when these same men marched up Fifth Avenue on their way to France. They marched on Fifth Avenue when the war was over, too, with screaming, joyous throngs of people jamming the sidewalks, hanging out of windows for miles along their triumphant route, to cheer them to the echo!

And not only the Legionnaires themselves are coming to the convention this year. The American Legion Aux-

iliary, boasting a membership roll of 430,000—it's the largest women's organization in the world—will stage its own convention meeting in New York, and the Sons of the American Legion, the children's auxiliary, will of course be represented. Beginning at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday, September 19, and concluding finally with a meeting of

the National Executive Committee at 2 p.m. on Thursday, September 23, the Legion Auxiliary has laid out for itself a program of the widest scope.

THE Auxiliary is composed of the wives and daughters of veterans, a unit separate from the several thousand women who are actually mem-

bers of the Legion itself, in recognition of their service as wartime nurses and in other non-combatant capacities.

Meeting with the Auxiliary, and in New York as their guests, will be the Gold Star mothers, women whose sons gave up their lives for their country. They'll be royally entertained during their stay in the metropolis. There'll be trips around Manhattan Island, up the Hudson to West Point, visits to museums, to the Statue of Liberty, Governor's Island, Coney Island. For the Sons of the American Legion, an extensive educational program has been arranged. They'll see everything in town worth seeing!

PREPARATIONS for handling the convention crowd—some estimate of its size can be gathered by reflection on the fact that visitors to the convention could populate a city the size of Washington, D. C.—were begun early last fall. The monumental task of providing for the housing, feeding and entertainment of 500,000 persons over a period of four days was centered on one man: Major Robert E. Condon. Major Condon's task began at the Cleveland convention of last year, when New York was decided upon as the meeting place for Legionnaires attending the 19th annual convention, and it won't be finished until the last Legionnaire has left New York!

WHAT a job! Remember, this is the biggest thing of its kind that has ever happened. Hotel men—who have had their houses solidly reserved for months—anticipate they'll need two million additional pillow-cases, three million sheets, two million bath-

In an editorial published several months ago, Dr. John R. Brinkley, who broadcasts nightly from Mexico, was mentioned as one of those responsible for programs of a type to which many readers have objected. Doctor Brinkley is a national figure. He has been written about exhaustively. He has been praised by some people and he has been damned by others. Only rarely, however, has anything which he has written himself been published. The public knows the man as a fighter and as a broadcaster. His patients know him as a physician. Now, in the accompanying story, RADIO GUIDE is pleased to present him as a writer. Although we remain out of sympathy with any project to broadcast to American listeners from Mexican stations, we are happy to present Doctor Brinkley's side of a question which should be settled promptly and fairly between the authorities of our two great nations.—THE EDITORS.

AN ARTICLE entitled "Spooks that Speak," decrying activities of radio broadcasting stations along the Mexican border, published in RADIO GUIDE in November, 1936, was resented by me as an unwarranted attack upon my personal and professional character, quite contrary to the facts. RADIO GUIDE, in consequence, generously offered to publish in turn what I might wish to say. This article results. A critic who, however faulty or unfair his criticism, not only allows time out for rebuttal, but who affords to the "accused" facility for equal publicity, cannot be a wholly bad fellow.

Criticism, by the way—and this is not intended to be critical other than of criticism—is always apt to exceed bounds, once one acquires the habit. Critical speech, like any other bad habit, feeds on indulgence. Like ill temper, or a spirited steed, it requires a stiff curb. Certainly unkind and acrimonious criticism, which may tend to injure, partakes of a choleric temper,—may indicate a disordered digestion. I am by no means convinced I should not institute a Doctor Brinkley hospital for the cure of this ailment. The disease, if it be such, is certainly

too prevalent. I cannot fail to wonder how far I might have gotten in the way of realizing a life's ambition to cure or curtail human ills, and in useful research to that end, if all the printers' ink consumed in censure of me had been expended instead in generous and helpful cooperation. Ouida's once popular toast is right:

"There is so much good in the worst of us, and so much bad in the best of us that it hardly becomes any of us to criticize the rest of us."

I apprehend, however, the aim of the editor, in the article, was not so much to censure individuals, as to correct an inequality,—to effect uniformity—in distribution of "time on the air" among North American radio broadcasting stations. But this, too, has another side. Mexico's claim appears not to have been recognized in the latest distribution. I understand heretofore there have been in all only eighty-nine wave lengths available for commercial ra-

dio broadcasting. It is said every tenth band between the numerals 550 and 1500—ninety-five in all—are used commercially, and a limited number additionally may soon be made available to bring the total to 105. The remainder are appropriated for short wave and other various governmental and essentially public uses. This covers all the Western hemisphere. Of the 89 wave lengths available for commercial use at last distribution, 83 were appropriated by the United States, the remaining 6 by Canada, leaving none for Mexico. The result is, Mexico, so long as the inequality remains uncorrected, may range where it will. Its sovereign rights are certainly no less than those of other nations. It occupies a large part of North America. Its area of over three-quarters of a million square miles is nearly one-third that of our own country, nearly one-third that of Canada, while its population of over fifteen millions is nearly a third larger than that of Can-

ada and approximately one-eighth that of the United States.

We who live near the Mexican border, and who have interests in Mexico, have come to know something of that sister Republic, and to feel not only a genuine affection for its long suffering, sweet tempered people, but an ambitious hope for its continued educational, agricultural, industrial and general national advancement. Some of us feel we are contributing to that end. We are happy to note, since the opening of the International Highway to Mexico City, an ever-increasing stream of visitors from our own States to that Republic, and we earnestly hope for the early opening of other highways to enter Mexico farther to her north, further exposing her varied beauties and natural resources to popular inspection. In brief, we are anxious to see popular Mexican life assume all the airs of the modern cosmopolite. But it requires neither proximity nor personal interest to know that, in distribution of radio wave lengths, no less than in every other sovereign right, Mexico ought to be graciously accorded its equal right among the nations. No blame is asserted, perhaps none is due, for the fact Mexico did not receive her just part in existing distribution of radio time among the nations. It may have been occasioned by excusable remissness on her own part; but certainly the inequality calls for correction.

THE article in question was, therefore, peculiarly in error in assuming that Mexican stations operate "regardless of the codes which—keep one nation from interfering with another." And it was in error, too, in asserting that "sooner or later" Mexican broadcasters, or Mexicans, "will have to abide by American laws." America holds no notion of interference with the sovereign rights of any neighbor nation; neither do our people desire any international injustice. It cannot be doubted, however, the existing situation, in reference to radio time, is one which should find amicable and appropriate adjustment among the na-

Dr. Brinkley ANSWERS —AND FINDS MEXICAN BORDER BROADCASTERS NOT AT FAULT

RADIO is just like Aladdin's lamp. Rub it—and wish—and wait—and presto, you've got something! Maybe it's a kite-flying contest in Hongkong, or an Eskimo concert broadcast from an air-cooled Arctic igloo, or maybe—it's the hog editor of the Oolagah Oozings!

Nonsense, you may be thinking. I've never listened to a Hongkong kite competition or tuned in on any Eskimo chamber music. Well, maybe you haven't, but some day you might, because the way I feel now, anything in the world can happen.

In fact, it already has happened—which is by way of saying that the hog editor of the Oolagah Oozings really is on the air! Furthermore, he's on the air as master of ceremonies for one of the National Broadcasting Company's biggest and best-known sponsors—the same fellow who gives you the First Nighter program.

But how can a barnyard artist, a rough and uncouth hog editor, sell hand lotion to a boudoir clientele, you'll undoubtedly ask. Well, I've interviewed this particular hog editor, and after talking with him half an hour, I'm convinced that he can sell anything.

At any rate, he certainly sold me.

HIS name is Cal Tinney, and item by item, here's his bill of goods. Listen while he remembers what his sales have been . . .

The PLACE is a musty, dusty cross-roads country store in Pontotoc County, Oklahoma. The TIME is a mid-summer noon some 18 years ago. The SCENE, a fly-blown counter in the store.

It's the height of the mail-order season and a ten-year-old boy plays at storekeeper while his dad takes a mid-day siesta in the shadow of a near-by oil derrick. "Ya' got any saws, Calvin?" a customer inquires.

"Yep," his tousled head shakes vigorously.

"How much?"

"Dollar twenty."

"'Stoo much. I can get the same from a mail-order house in Chicago for only ninety cents."

The boy calculates quickly, adding on his grimy fingers—"All right, give me the money you'd have to spend at the mail-order house."

The customer hands over ninety cents to the young salesman.

on his luck and certainly hungry, is attempting to hide beneath two adjoining seats, when suddenly two sisters of mercy enter. They are garbed in black and they scream when they see the intruder. "Please," he says to their

they suspect that he'll never be famous for anything except making trouble for good people whose wills are too weak to resist him.

But Calvin Laurence Tinney knows better. Subconsciously, he realizes that he's just sold two more customers on the item of himself.

The PLACE is again Oklahoma. More specifically, it's a bump in the road near Tulsa, a bump that has been christened Oolagah for reasons long since forgotten. The TIME is 1930.

A group of worried businessmen are talking it over at their weekly luncheon meeting in Oolagah's only cafeteria. There's Bill Hoge, the town barber, Joe Killam, a rancher, and his nearest neighbor, Old Man Johnson.

WHAT we need," Bill bangs his fist on the table, "is a real live wire to make this town over."

At the next table, Cal Tinney, an itinerant newspaperman with an eye for customers, pricks up his ears. "Pardon me, gentlemen," he calls across his ham and eggs, "but I think I'm just the fellow you're looking for."

Two months later, the once-dead town of Oolagah, Oklahoma, is a thriving little city. It boasts of a Chamber of Commerce, *Cal Tinney, secretary*; a weekly newspaper, the *Oolagah Oozings, Cal Tinney, publisher*; a public relations department, *Cal Tinney, counselor*. Two years later, in 1932, the town is as widely known as Van Buren or Pine Ridge, Arkansas, because in the interim Cal Tinney has become a syndicated columnist for the august *New York Post*, a job which keeps him so busy in Manhattan that he has had to resign as publisher of the *Oozings* and be content with just the title of hog editor.

HE HAS also published a best-seller, "Is It True What They Say About Landon?" with an introduction by Lowell Thomas, and has become the author of "Man of the Week" column, which keeps him in Washington more than half of his time.

Five years elapse. The PLACE is Chicago. The TIME, September 20, (Continued on Page 16)

THE PLACE is Germany. The TIME, about 1925. The SCENE, a compartment on a crack international express, bound from Berlin to Paris.



An unkempt youth, obviously down



NEW YORK'S NO. ONE GANG-BUSTER FIGHTS CRIME OVER THE AIRWAVES THIS SATURDAY

WHEN CBS picked Thomas E. Dewey for its "Fighting Crime" series this Saturday night (EDT), it picked the right man. For this 35-year-old attorney is Public Enemy No. 1 to the New York racketeers.

In the two years he has been acting as special prosecutor in New York City, upon appointment by the governor, he has literally cleaned up the city. First he went after the loan sharks who had been shaking down poor people to the tune of \$1,000,000 a week. He got twenty-one convictions. Then he smashed the most notorious vice ring in the country, headed by Charles "Lucky" Luciano, whose specialty was wholesale prostitution. "Lucky" is now in a prison cell with forty years to go.



His lieutenants are also playing solitaire behind bars. The restaurant racket was next to fall under the Dewey ax. Seven persons were convicted and now face a total of 2,400 years in prison for extortion of some \$2,000,000 a year from restaurant owners, including Jack Dempsey and others equally prominent. The fourth advance busted the trucking racket. Then followed the poultry, the policy and the baking rackets, with nineteen convictions and more to go. The latest victory for the youthful fighting prosecutor was the indictment of Louis Buch-

halter and Jacob Shapiro as the heads of the great garment-industry shakedown racket. Both these men skipped town before the indictments were handed down and are still fugitives from justice. They're afraid to face Dewey.

Because he has always been a winner, Dewey now finds himself a candidate on the Republican ticket for district attorney of New York City. He didn't want to run for the office. In fact he had to be begged, and didn't finally make up his mind until after the entire ticket had been filed and only a few hours remained for withdrawals and additions. It was the fiery little mayor of New York City, F. H. La Guardia, and his followers who were instrumental in drafting Mr. Dewey. They knew that such a man as Thomas E. Dewey would do much to strengthen their ticket, headed by Mayor La Guardia. There is no doubt but that their assumption is true. Many political seers are already predicting that the Mayor and Mr. Dewey will be swept into office.

But regardless of the outcome of the city election, Thomas E. Dewey remains the nation's No. 1 organized crime fighter. That is why the Columbia Broadcasting System believes his talk over the airwaves this Saturday will be of great help to crime-fighting agencies throughout the country.

Born in Owosso, Michigan, Mr. Dewey attended the University of Michigan, where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1923. He then went to New York to attend Columbia University, where he received his law degree in 1925, and was admitted to the bar the following year. He practised with several firms until 1931, when he became chief assistant United States attorney under George Z. Medalie, the man whom he succeeded in the middle of the "Waxey" Gordon trial. He resigned in 1934 to permit President Roosevelt to appoint a Democrat to the post, and again entered private practise until his appointment by Governor Herbert Lehman in 1935 as a special prosecutor to clean up rackets and vice in New York City. He is married and has two children.

Unusual is the fact that Mr. Dewey could not, for a time, decide between the law and the stage. In Michigan he studied music and dramatics, and upon going to New York became soloist at the Protestant Episcopal Church of St. Matthew's and St. Timothy's. He decided that while his baritone voice was sufficient, it was not distinguished enough to put him in the top ranks. He did, on the other hand, feel he could succeed in the legal profession. His record has many times proved that.

FIERY GENIUS JOSE ITURBI IS AT HIS BEST ON CBS' "FORD SUNDAY EVENING HOUR"

MUSIC-LOVERS are rejoicing that his new "Ford Sunday Evening Hour" contract is giving them an opportunity of becoming better acquainted with one of broadcasting's most colorful artists, Senor Jose Iturbi. Of all top-notch musical celebrities, Jose Iturbi is our most consistent prima donna. He alone lets his temper get out of control—on or off the air. Other well-known artists repress flare-ups for fear of the consequences, but in the life of this dynamic, fiery pianist-composer emotional explosions are astonishingly regular.

Far famed, for example, is his most recent outburst during a broadcast at Philadelphia's Robin Hood Dell, where, upon learning that Lucy Monroe and Jan Peerce would sing songs by George Gershwin, Victor Herbert, Oley Speaks, Jerome Kern, and other outstanding American composers, he flew into a rage, refused to continue unless the "I-love-you stuff" were removed from the program. While worried Dell officials conferred, Iturbi began to substitute selections other than those on the schedule. But the radio audience didn't hear them. Growing apprehensive at the way things were going, NBC cut off the program entirely, substituted an impromptu organ recital from one of its studios.

While this incident proved to be the most far-reaching display of temper Iturbi had shown, it was far from the first. Last year he became enraged when his Cleveland audiences ate hot-dogs while he conducted, and soon after he was infuriated when photographers' flashlight bulbs annoyed him in Philadelphia. In fact, Iturbi has averaged at least one newsworthy flare-up each year, and on most occasions he has been firm, seen the annoyances put to end.

BORN in Valencia, Spain, Iturbi showed evidence of incredible musical talent at an early age. In fact, by the time the child prodigy was 7, he was giving concerts to amazed Spanish audiences and teaching pupils three and four times his age. After his graduation from the Paris Conservatory with honors at the age of 17, he went to the Conservatory of Geneva as head of the piano faculty, a position once held by the immortal Liszt. Here he remained until 1929, when he resigned to begin his brilliant career as an international concert soloist. Indicative of his popularity in America is the fact that he has played more concerts in this country than any other pianist except Paderewski. And his distinction as a pianist is almost equaled by his reputation as a conductor.

Although he's often been heard on the air, Iturbi's new "Ford Sunday Evening Hour" is by far the most important radio assignment he's ever had. Now, for the first time, Americans who have heard him only on brief concert tours, or who have not been fortunate enough to hear him at all, will be able to hear him at his best. With his new program, the temperamental genius has become a regular radio fixture.

THRILL TO "FEAST OF ORTOLANS." IT'S MAXWELL ANDERSON'S FIRST DRAMA FOR RADIO

IN 1924, Maxwell Anderson, then 36, was a New York newspaperman and free-lance writer. Today he's a top-notch dramatist, one of the leaders of the American stage, a man whose name on a play is a hall-mark of merit—and latest to join the line of front-rank dramatic writers parading before radio's microphones!

For presentation by the National Broadcasting Company on Monday evening, September 20, Anderson has written a special one-act play, "The Feast of Ortolans." It has never been performed before, will most likely not be performed again for some time.

"The Feast of Ortolans" is the first play Anderson has written exclusively for radio. In it he has experimented extensively, and, in the opinion of those who have read the play, most successfully.

The drama is set at the dinner table in the chateau of a great French noble on the eve of the outbreak of the French Revolution in 1789. Here are gathered a brilliant group of famous writers, artists, intellectuals and nobles, including such personalities as Lafayette, Beaumarchais, Condorcet, La Harpe, Philippe of Orleans, Chenier, and the Duchess of Gramont. These are great minds, all of them, and they are concerned with one great subject: the impending Revolution. Some of them believe it must come, some of them consider such a notion ludicrous—and none of them can visualize the horrors it will bring to them.

MAXWELL ANDERSON is a dramatic poet—probably the greatest dramatic poet writing in the English language today—and of course "The Feast of Ortolans" is set in verse. It is verse of a high order: penetrating, keen, laying bare with surgical thoroughness the workings of the minds of Anderson's characters as they move with dazzling speed and lucidity through and around the question of the Revolution. They tend to dismiss it. Thus it has always been, in times of great social stress. Always, history has shown, when revolution comes, it comes with horrid brutality, lightning speed. And so does Anderson bring it on the scene.

The guests have gathered at the chateau of the Duke of Pompignan, about twenty miles outside of Paris, for their annual feast. When the talk is at its most brilliant, when the possibility of a great rising of the down-trodden people is being shot through with the quickest and sharpest barbs, there is a sudden and inexplicable delay in the service. The Duke himself goes to the kitchen to investigate—and does not come back! The rest of the guests soon learn why. The Revolution has begun!

Anderson has the habit of success, and "The Feast of Ortolans" is likely to take rank with the Eugene O'Neill and Shakespeare master works aired this summer. Since bursting into prominence in 1924 with "What Price Glory?", written in collaboration with Laurence Stallings, Anderson has earned honors with such plays as "Saturday's Children," "Mary of Scotland," "Winterset," and "High Tor."

IRELAND'S FAMOUS ABBEY PLAYERS BRING DRAMA—STARK AND TRAGIC—SUNDAY NIGHT

BACK in 1911, when every dramatic presentation had two titles and a happy ending, a robust troupe of actors came to New York and virtually stood that surprised city on end. Coming from Dublin, Ireland, they disregarded the American stage tradition that called for happy heroines and love fulfilled, threw discretion to the winds, gave New Yorkers the most shocking drama they had ever seen.

It didn't take. It was too harsh, too realistic, too nerve-wracking for the most sophisticated city in America. The troupe performed—to the accompaniment of boos, cat-calls, and stamping feet. A lone critic praised the Abbey Players for their "freedom from self-consciousness, exaggeration, and staginess." Others remained silent, non-committal. But most frowned on the whole devastating performance and the company that dared to give it.

The Abbey Players returned to Dublin. But they were not dismayed, for they realized that theirs was a great departure from the usual form of stage presentation. In fact, they had expected an unfavorable reception. Their experience did not keep them from returning, moreover. Their most recent trip was two years ago.

Over a quarter of a century has passed since the Abbey Players first enraged Americans with their brutally frank, true-to-life dramatic presentations. And during that time, many things have changed. No longer do realistic stage plays disturb us. Still, the Abbey Players are so extremely frank, so openly candid, so given to portraying life as it is, sweet only when it is sweet, and bitter, cruel and harsh when it is that way, that even today they are apt to shock Americans.

Whether America has developed to a degree where it can listen to the Abbey Players will be proved this Sunday night (EDT). At that time the Columbia network will reach across the sea to present these world-famous players on the Columbia Workshop program. From Dublin they will bring J. M. Sayre's "Riders to the Sea," a grim tale of futility and heartbreak on the bleak Irish seacoast. Here is a story that begins with tragedy and death, that ends in tragedy and death. Yet stark as this bit of realism is, it is also so vivid, so sympathetic, that attentive listeners probably will find it a high-spot on the dial this week. At any rate, it will serve admirably as a test to reveal whether or not America is ripe for the kind of drama that calls a spade a spade.

It was during an after-luncheon talk between Lady Gregory and William Butler Yeats, both well-known Irish playwrights, that the astonishing Abbey Players were born. Lady Gregory put up a twenty-five-pound guarantee and a group was formed for the production of plays by Irish writers. They called themselves the Irish Literary Theatre, and opened on May 8, 1899, with Mr. Yeats' "Countess Kathleen."

But the road for the group was hard. For five years they struggled along, playing in the back of a butcher-shop and provision store-house, where the audience squeezed among the boxes and packing-cases.

In 1904, Miss Annie E. F. Horniman, who had seen some of the plays, leased the Mechanics Institute Theatre in Dublin's lower Abbey Street, rechristened it the Abbey Theatre, and presented it to the players, along with a small annual subsidy. Thus the Abbey Players became the first endowed theater in any English-speaking country.

With that impetus, the group forged ahead, presented the works of such world-famous names as W. B. Yeats, Lady Gregory, Sean O'Casey, John Millington Synge and George William Russell, better known by his pen name, "A. E.," and produced some excellent actors, names well known to theater-goers. Among them are Ann Cleary, Josephine Fitzgerald, Shela Ward and W. O'Gorman—all of whom will be heard Sunday in "Riders to the Sea."



"Dar-ling, I am grow-ing old,
Sil-ver threads a-mong the gold . . ."

IT'S AN old sentimental ballad. The haunting melody and the theme of love never dying have made of "Silver Threads Among the Gold" one of the best-loved romantic songs of all time. And on Wednesday night of this week, when Tenor Jack Fulton sings it on his "Poetic Melodies" program, its words will be full of meaning for America's millions. To young lovers it envisions love's bulwark against loneliness; to older ones, yesterday's yearnings fulfilled. To many, its sound will be sweet; to some it must call sadness from the past. But the saddest of memories in the minds of listeners Wednesday night will not be as tragic as the story of this song itself.

For behind this sentimental ballad, this sweetest of all love songs, there is an appalling and heart-rending story. It is a story that has never before been told in its entirety. From dusty newspaper files, faded newspaper clippings, and musty court records, the writer uncovered the details of this beautiful but sad and bitter story.

TO GET to the beginning, we must go back 65 years. It is the spring of 1872. Reconstruction throughout the land is in process, following the upheaval of the Civil War. The mills are humming again and factory wheels spinning. It is a prosperous era and the vaudeville houses and cabarets are filled to the brim with rollicking, singing men and women.

Ballads are in the vogue, helped into prominence by the "Negro" minstrels, those black-faced choristers then at the height of their popularity. Stephen Foster had been dead eight years, but his melodies were still being sung.

In New York City, Hart Pease Danks was gaining renown as a composer of great merit. Danks was a religious man, honest and sincere to the core. He led a righteous life and gave freely of his time to Grace Church, where he sang bass in the choir. In outward appearance he was dignified and stern, helped no doubt by the heavy mustache and side-whiskers he wore. He was a total abstainer.

But there was a sentimental side to Danks that found an outlet in the romantic ballads he was writing. The man had music in his soul and, like Schubert, no amount of privation, no obstacles, could stem its flow. As a lad in his father's carpentry shop, Hart used to plane off a board, write a musical staff, and jot down his musical musings. One day Danks senior searched high and low for his drawing-board and finally found it on Hart's bench, entirely covered on both sides with these embryonic compositions.

This early inclination for music continued to manifest itself when the lad came into his teens. As a regular member of a Chicago church choir, Hart was taught sacred music, and his first original compositions were naturally psalm tunes.

Before he was twenty-four, Hart fell deeply in love with Hattie Colahan, a Cleveland girl. To this idealistic composer of religious music, love was a sacred thing and marriage an everlasting pact. After thoughtful consideration, he proposed to Hattie and was accepted. And when he repeated the marriage vow after the minister, the words, ". . . until death do us part," burned themselves into his soul. He was never to forget them.

Because he was so deeply in love and lighter music bubbled inside him, Danks turned now and then from his

religious tunes to dash off a romantic melody. These were the melodies that were gaining him fame. Among them were such popular hits of the day as "The Old Love," "Anna Lee," and "Don't Be Angry with Me, Darling."

And so we find Hart Pease Danks, this spring of 1872, in his thirty-eighth year, living in the happiness of a full-filled love and seeing in the future only tranquil years with Harriet and the children—for there were children,

three of them, Albertha, Albert, and Gertrude, the youngest.

Some weeks previous, Danks had run across a charming poem in a Wisconsin newspaper and had purchased it from its author, Eben E. Rexford, for \$3. In grateful acknowledgment, the poet sent Danks a miscellaneous assortment of his output—all for the same three dollars.

One among these poems had caught the composer's attention. In simple

words, the verses expressed his own outlook on life.

"Darling, I am growing old;
Silver threads among the gold,
Shine upon my brow today,
Life is fading fast away;
But, my darling, you will be
Always young and fair to me.

"Love can never more grow old
Locks may lose their brown and gold,
Cheeks may fade and hollow grow.
But the hearts that love will know
Never, never, winter's frost and chill,
Summer warmth is in them still."

He couldn't put the poem aside. And as he kept musing over it, softly repeating the verses to himself, a melody slowly formed itself around the words. Minutes passed as the music unwound itself in his inner ear. Then, frantically, he seized a pen and on a stray sheet of music dashed off the tune.

It was not just another tune. For he had created a musical mood and struck a chord of haunting wistfulness. What the words suggested, the music bore out: a sincere affirmation of fidelity between two lovers, ". . . until death do us part."

The song was sold to a Philadelphia publisher. Realizing his good fortune, this publisher immediately rushed several copies to the Negro minstrels in Chicago who, in that era, launched new compositions and brought them to the ears of the public, serving in a similar capacity to radio today.

THE ballad proved to be a sensational success and grew more popular each year. Oldsters and youngsters whistled, hummed, and sang it everywhere. The loveliness of its melody simply could not be denied. Love-stricken youths serenaded the girls of their choice with renditions of "Silver Threads Among the Gold." The stages of theaters and cabarets resounded to the song, and boisterous men subsided into a state of dreamy peacefulness and, in many cases, into tears. Toil-worn husbands and wives clasped hands and, dewy-eyed, thanked God for having preserved their love through years of hardship. In the early hours of the morning, barber-shop quartets, in city and country, were to be heard softly harmonizing to its strains. It had touched the hearts of the people as had few songs.

But what was happening to the composer and to the woman who had inspired this tender melody? The story from this point on is a sad one.

Prosperity came to the Danks. As the royalty money began to flow in, new uses were immediately found for it. Their cozy little home became a luxurious apartment with all the trappings. We can imagine the simple composer tugging at his sideburns, bewildered at the change.

Then, like a bolt of lightning, the first tragedy struck. Mrs. Harriet Danks left her composer-husband!

There is none alive to tell us what caused the sudden break. No records exist, no correspondence is available. All we know is that in 1872 Hart Pease Danks was living a quiet, happy existence. In 1873, he was a heart-broken man. The grim irony of the situation is appalling. Lovers everywhere were finding happiness in a song inspired by love—while its composer was plunged in bitter grief!

It is perhaps futile, but still interesting, to speculate what might have happened had Danks not written the melody to "Silver Threads Among the Gold." Would the course of his life have been different? Most likely . . .

The years passed. Danks wandered from city to city, desperately writing his romantic ballads like a man trying to recapture some precious feeling that eludes him. But his songs lacked fire, some were even downright pathetic.

The turn of the century came amidst wild jubilation. Three years later, in 1903, a grumpy landlady in a cheap lodging-house in Philadelphia knocked at the door of one of her lodgers. Her knocks were unanswered. Puzzled, she forced the door.

For a moment she was reassured, for she saw her lodger kneeling by the side of the bed. He seemed to have fallen asleep while writing. In one hand he held a copy of a song. In the other, he held a pen.

He hadn't fallen asleep. He was dead. Death had overtaken him in the act of inscribing a note above the title of the song.

The inscription read: "It is hard to grow old alone and . . ."

The poverty-stricken lodger was Hart Pease Danks. The song clutched in his hand was "Silver Threads Among the Gold."

In this fashion, the composer who had dreamed of living to a ripe old age in the company of his beloved wife met a forlorn, lonely end. No greater irony could be imagined!

The death of the composer, far from bringing this strange story to an end, proved to be the beginning of a chapter filled with still stranger events. For his death set off a series of legal squabbles that was to drag out for almost a quarter of a century. And the success of "Silver Threads" was to alienate a mother from her children and brother from sister—surely as strange a role as ever was played by a ballad of sentiment.

The song sold widely, even after the miserable death of its composer was made public. In 1907 Richard Jose, a famous tenor of the day, making a concert tour of the country, included it in his program. The song, it was noted by critics, affected the listeners of that generation as it had the previous one.


Meanwhile, the composer's will had been probated and it was found that he had left two-thirds of his estate to the three children and the remaining one-third to his wife, though she had parted from him thirty years prior to his death. His eldest daughter, Albertha, was appointed executrix.

ROYALTIES were still pouring in and each member of the family was greedily determined to get as much as he or she could. More and more, inter-family disputes were breaking out, punctuated intermittently by legalistic pot-shots at the song publisher in an effort to extract a greater share.

The result of these inter-family disputes was to kill the goose laying the golden egg. In desperation, the badgered publisher refused to pay out any more money to the Danks until they had settled their own quarrels. That was in 1915, the year Albertha died.

When Albert became executor, he again brought suit against the publisher, claiming only \$23,500 had been paid the Danks estate and insisting it was only a small portion of what should have been paid.

During the next five years, Albert apparently was once again receiving royalties—but keeping the money to himself. This state of affairs led Sister Gertrude in 1921 to demand an accounting of her brother. Albert's reply was that he had received only \$310.96. Not satisfied with the truth of this report, Gertrude forced her brother to



CHECKING UP ON JACK FULTON

A direct descendant of the steamboat inventor, Robert, Jack Fulton also put his city on the map. The famous romantic tenor was born in Phillipsburg, Pa., in 1903. His first experience singing in the public eye was in his home-town church at the age of 8. Then he drove the neighbors wild when he took up the trombone at 17. It was 6 years later when he had his first chance at Broadway with George Olsen. Paul Whiteman offered him a place in his band, but Bing Crosby told him to give up the trombone for a vocal career. He has since been on the stage and in pictures—hit the big-time when he became star of "Poetic Melodies" last November. He hums when he mows the lawn, averages 72 holes of golf a week. Jack is five-feet-eleven, has brown hair, blue eyes

file a supplementary report.

The truth was that Albert had really received \$24,306 and this he was forced to disclose. In the end, a surrogate's court ordered Albert to pay his sister her share of \$5,094.

Meanwhile, another suit against the publisher was filed—this time by Mrs. Danks, who alleged she was entitled to all the royalties herself! According to her statement, more than two million

copies of "Silver Threads" had been sold, and between 1915 and 1920 the royalties amounted to \$50,000!

And so the legalistic fireworks continued to explode. And even though Albert confessed to receiving more than \$24,000 and was ordered to pay his sister \$5,094, he never did so. Pursuing her legal rights, Gertrude thereupon appealed to Supreme Court Justice Colahan, who directed the Sheriff

of Kings County in Brooklyn to arrest Albert Danks. But the sheriff was unable to serve the warrant. Albert had disappeared.

Two years passed. It is the first day of spring, but the season holds no bright promise for a little woman of 82, who is gasping out her last breath in a decrepit Brooklyn lodging-house. Hours later, in circumstances strangely similar to those which surrounded her husband's death, Mrs. Harriet Danks passed away.

And in this miserable fashion, the woman who had inspired "Silver Threads Among the Gold" came to the end of a long trail of unhappiness which stemmed from the writing of that beautiful love song.

Three days passed before newspapers awoke to the identification of the 82-year-old woman who had died alone. Through these news reports, Albert Danks learned where and when funeral services for his mother were to be held. Thus it came about that, as he was entering the funeral chapel, a sheriff detached himself from a group of mourners and served him with the warrant that had been drawn several years previous. Sitting in the chapel was his sister Gertrude, who had caused the warrant to be served.

Weeks later, Albert appeared before a judge and was given a few days to prepare an answer to a contempt of court charge for disregarding the court's order to pay his sister \$5,094.

AND with that decision, the records in this strange story come to an end, with the final chapter still to be told. Only from persons connected with the Danks could we secure this final chapter, and a search finally led to Roderick Begg, an attorney who for ten years had this case on his calendar. Mr. Begg supplies the last links.

"Albert appeared with his answer," he says, "and again he was ordered to pay his sister the money. But he never did. To this day, he's avoided paying."

"It was a sad affair, all around," Begg recalls. "I knew the Danks, all of them, except the old man. They fought each other, in court and out. Money, money! They all wanted more money. I tried bringing them together amicably, having them sit around a table and talk things over. But it was useless. They seemed to know just one thing: sue!"

"Where are they now? The Lord knows, I don't. Albert used to be a detective, employed by one of the private agencies. Maybe he still is, I don't know. He dropped out of sight after the last court decision."

"As for Gertrude, I believe she's dead. Several years ago, I heard she was seriously ill in a city hospital. I was never able to discover which hospital. That is all I know."


Thus ends the story behind the most sentimental of all songs, "Silver Threads Among the Gold." Some will think of the sadness of that story Wednesday night as Jack Fulton sings; but most will think only of the beautiful sentiment which Danks described when he wrote . . .

*"Life is fading fast away;
But, my darling, you will be
Always young and fair to me."*

More notes on the illustrious Charlie McCarthy: Charlie is insured by Lloyds for \$1,000, but he has a double in Edgar Bergen's closet (skeleton in the closet, huh?). However, the double somehow hasn't the personality of Charlie. He misses fire in the face, just a twinkle—but enough. Frequently cameramen are fooled by the double; are told the dummy they are photographing is Charlie—but it isn't. By careful examination of the pictures, you'll be able to tell the real Charlie from his twin! Incidentally, Bergen is at work on a female dummy to be Charlie's girl, but so far is not satisfied with the results.

THE Sunday Night Party will die a peaceful death October 10. This, you will recall, is the show that started out with Walter O'Keefe last September, made radical changes nearly every week until James Melton became its master of ceremonies this past winter. No plans for a substitute program have been announced.

The above news came just after James Melton had been named in a separation suit brought by Theodore Weicker, chairman of the board of E. R. Squibb & Sons, against Mrs. Weicker. Papers on file in the Supreme Court of New York accuse the tenor of "usurping the home" of the Weickers. Answering the charges, Mrs. Weicker said her friendship with the singer was innocent and sanctioned by Mrs. Melton. This had nothing to do with the death of Melton's program. The program change was due to the fact that the sponsor has changed advertising agencies.

Does anybody know where there is a little red schoolhouse? Parks Johnson and Wally Butterworth, Vox Pop-

pers, have heard an awful lot about little red schoolhouses and want to put on a broadcast from one. But they can't locate any. When they hunted for covered bridges they found 1,243 still in use. They've also found wooden cigar-store Indians, one-armed paper-hangers and the like, but so far, no little red schoolhouses.

For some reason, we love figures. We've found that CBS has 104 stations on its network while NBC has 138. An hour at night on the entire CBS chain costs \$21,770, while an hour at night over the entire NBC network would cost \$35,000.

For more figures, we found that 8,296 persons paid 40 cents each to take a tour through the NBC studios on Sunday, September 5, which will give you an idea of how popular Radio City is with the tourists. The 3-day Labor Day week-end saw 17,476 tour visitors. This number is, of course, in addition to those who came to attend broadcasts.

The Jack Fultons of Chicago have a new baby boy, their fourth child. George Thorndyke, CBS announcer, is the papa of a new 7½-pound girl. A baby girl was also recently born to Dorothy Shideler, dramatic actress.

A 3½-year-old South Dakota boy becomes the youngest winner of prizes offered via radio. The prize was \$250 and came as a result of the dramatization of his story on Floyd Gibbons' program. The boy, James Biedenfufer, of Aberdeen, was only 18 months old when he opened a door and summoned help for his mother, who was overcome by coal gas. Gibbons always gives a \$250 prize for the best true-adventure story of the month.

In case anyone wondered what happened to the George Bernard Shaw drama, "Back to Methuselah," it will be heard on Thursday, September 30, over the NBC-Blue network. The

Louis-Farr fight made the postponement necessary.





tions of North America; and the writer has no doubt such adjustment can, and will, be reached.

So far as the article was accusatory of me, I have, of course, never sanctioned any form of lawlessness, much less banditry, neither of the air or otherwise. But my service to ailing man could by no possibility have been one-half what the record stands at had I not resorted to the radio to explain my discovery.

SON, as I am, of a pioneer physician whose life was spent in unselfish, often uncompensated, ministry to the sick, in the rugged and sparsely settled Appalachian mountain region of North Carolina, it is natural I should have imbibed, from earliest childhood, the inspiration to serve my fellow man,—and to do this as a physician. Neither, perhaps, is it unnatural, in view of the very genuine privation I suffered in childhood and youth after the early loss of my father, that a sense of property should spur me toward financial independence. But I am nevertheless quite sure the primary urge which has inspired me to unusual research and experimentation in the fields of medicine and medical surgery has been the innate, inalienable, perhaps undue, ambition to serve my race,—to render outstanding service in the relief of human ills. I was driven to the air, that is, to radio, by the knowledge I had something of peculiar service to men, and by the fact my brethren of the profession were reluctant to accept and apply what I had discovered. I just had to demonstrate it. With the more than 10,000 operative patients who have, since I began radio talks, found relief in my hospitals, I think I may say the radio has been of peculiar service both to myself and to my patients. I regard as my greatest service, wherein I may say I pioneer, the hastening of acceptance by the profession, the world over, of the idea of treatment for, rather than removal of, the troublesome prostate gland. Yet just here is wherein I have come in for no end of undeserved criticism. Pioneering is a hazardous undertaking. This is no less true in surgery. If you doubt it, try it.

Man is amazingly uninformed outside the realm of his own business or profession. Technical information and skill not in his line of work is, quite naturally, "Greek" to him. Otherwise stated, each is but an uninformed layman in the other's profession. The most skilled medical doctor is but the most uninformed layman in the realm of law; the lawyer equally a layman where medicine or surgery is concerned. Outside our own craft, our business, our profession, we must rely on our expert. This seems emphatically so in the matter of human ailment,—the layman himself knows nothing of diagnosis. When illness befalls him he must rely on his doctor. Hence, it is that among elderly men, in their inability to judge symptomatic manifestations, little indeed is known of the extent to which prostate gland enlargement affects human health and life. Certainly unaffected lay youth can know nothing of its appalling toll among aged men. But the skilled and experienced surgical expert, specializing in that subject, knows, and hence cannot fail to feel deeply concerned, if he but has a heart attuned to human suffering. And if he has found, and demonstrated, a process to alleviate that suffering, he certainly owes the obligation to apprise the sufferer of the discovery. So it was I resorted to radio.

I now broadcast nightly over two Mexican stations, XERA at 840 kilocycles and XEAW at 960 kilocycles; and I invite all to listen in. If criti-

cism be due, say it, or write it, to me. XERA is located in Villa Acuna, Mexico, opposite Del Rio, Texas, where my family and I live. Del Rio is a thriving little city of 14,000 people—none finer. There are few more prosperous, certainly no more healthful, communities. We are happy, and homelike, and patients from all over the continent like our city, and like us. I have been recently honored by my fellow Rotarians, who have elected me President, and who are sending me to Nice, France, as their delegate. I believe in and try to live by the mottoes, "Service above Self", and "He

profits most who serves best"; so why should I allow an article such as the one I am answering, or any other critic of a successful man, to make me

feel unhappy? Let anyone who cares to do so criticize me,—my patients and friends speak for me; and they are the ones with whom I am happy to live.



mats, and twelve million towels! Telephone operators expect to handle four million extra calls, while grocers and restaurateurs will provide eleven tons of butter, two million quarts of milk, five million cups of coffee, 333,000 dozens of oranges and five million eggs! Legionnaires will smoke a mere forty million cigarettes while they're in New York. Even shoe-shine boys are slated to take a fair share of the \$30,000,000 Legion members will bring into town. They'll be a total of six million shines richer when it's all over!

Traditionally the amusement center of the United States, New York plans to outdo itself during the Legion Convention. Coney Island, extending its regular season one full week, will offer several mammoth shows exclusively for Legion members. 
But it won't all be fun and frolic for American Legion members in New York. There's a serious side to the American Legion; it's a serious organization.

1937. The SCENE, an elaborate studio in NBC's famed Merchandise Mart headquarters.

Cal Tinney, high-topped shoes, mushroom haircut and all, stands at a black-and-silver microphone. Out in Hollywood, famed syndicated Columnist Sheila Graham stands at her microphone waiting to be piped in with the latest of Hollywood film gossip. Like Cal Tinney, she, too, is a part of Campana's new variety show.

"I've just got back from Oolagah, where I've been reruralizin' myself," Cal is apt to draw into the mike. "My folks have always lived in Oklahoma—fact is, I was born there shortly after Oklahoma ceased to be Indian Territory. I wasn't born in a log cabin, but my folks moved me into one, just as soon as they learned to live indoors."

He pauses. He looks out over the studio audience in much the same way that he looked up over the fly-blown counter when he made his first sale down in the oil fields many years before. The expression around his eyes

MUSIC of the MASTERS

BY CARLETON SMITH

IN SALZBURG this summer many hard words were directed at the absent Charles Kullmann. Breathless European connoisseurs were saying that he had heard the jangle of money-bags and left the temple. They could not understand, they said, how any serious young artist would prefer to be a radio warbler rather than be Mr. Toscanini's favorite.

One answer was on every gossip's tongue. Mr. Kullmann is only beginning his career in America. He may need money and, if he wants to "cash in" on his European reputation, he must work in America. Salzburg fees are notoriously low. Artists are expected to sing there for the honor, which is agreeable enough but which doesn't pay the rent.

"Ach! Ya! Like all Americans, he is chasing the dollar," the Austrians shook their heads knowingly.

Was it wise for Charles Kullmann not to go to Salzburg this summer? Not to be *Walter von Stolzing* when Toscanini conducted "Die Meistersinger"? Not to restudy and sing the *Tamino* in Toscanini's performances of Mozart's "Magic Flute"? Not to be the tenor in the surpassing performance of the Verdi "Requiem"?

These are questions only Mr. Kullmann and time can answer.

No doubt about it, the young Metropolitan tenor was sorely missed in Salzburg. His voice may not be ideal for the part of the young Franconian knight, but it is far superior to that of the singer who substituted for him.

Salzburg authorities knew that tenors were hard birds to catch. They waited until the last moment, hoping against hope that Kullmann would finally come. They cabled. For weeks no answer came.

Mr. Kullmann told the New York press: "It would be a tremendous disappointment to me not to go. A singer enjoys doing something really worth while without considering the financial remuneration. I'd gladly sacrifice high radio fees to appear with Toscanini. Not only is he tops, but his overwhelming sincerity does things to a singer."

So it does. No one knows better what it does than Charles Kullmann, who has had many hours of training with the greatest performing artist. He has known the penetrating knowledge, the vitalizing force, the painstaking effort that makes a Toscanini performance what it is. He can testify that the Italian maestro is the practical musician and teacher *par excellence*—achieving the maximum results with the minimum of effort.

In spite of all this, Mr. Kullmann decided it was better to remain here, sing his broadcasts, and make his American movie debut in a new Technicolor film. Artistic glory is necessary, but so is cash. Furthermore, Toscanini is hard on a voice, demanding the utmost from it... sometimes, when it is in a role for which it is not suited, he wants more than it can give. He does make some concessions to the artist's gifts, but more he strives to attain the composer's intention.

The role of *Walter*, for example, was slightly too big for Mr. Kullmann's voice and, though Toscanini occasionally shaded down his orchestra, the voice showed the effects of having striven too much, especially by the fourth "Meistersinger" performance last year.

Perhaps it is as well for Mr. Kullmann that he didn't run the risk of overdoing and tiring his voice. It will be all to the good if he doesn't lose his high artistic standards and if he keeps up a rigorous training. It is easy enough for a handsome young

tenor to sink back into the routine of doing the least that an adoring public demands, of repeating his best tricks *ad infinitum*, and of reaping the harvest that luscious tones will bring. Should Mr. Kullmann do that, he will have excellent precedent for it. He will be following the traditions of his breed. Let's hope that he doesn't.

He came to his present fame by a long and circuitous route, beginning as a choir boy in New Haven, where he was born. He was graduated from Yale with a Bachelor of Science degree preparatory for medicine. He sang with the Yale Glee Club as soloist and had odd jobs with Rotary Clubs, minstrel shows, and even in vaudeville.

A three-year scholarship at the Juilliard School brought Mr. Kullmann to Fontainebleau, and he returned from there to sing with the ill-fated American Opera Company. He made his debut as *Faust* in Chicago, and later joined a light-opera company there.

The chance, however, that was to lead eventually to the Metropolitan and to prominence among the world's star tenors came in Germany. He went there, finally, to study at the *Hochschule* and won an audition with Otto Klemperer, who cast him as the leading tenor in "Boheme," "Butterfly," "Rigoletto," and "Traviata." The way to Salzburg was opened up when he "guested" successfully in Vienna.

In addition to operatic work, he made films in Vienna. His first excursion was "La Paloma," with setting in the Basque country, in which Leo Slezak, the famous old Czech tenor, now a ponderous mass of a man, still standing 6 feet 5 inches, did a donkey cart duet with him.

"One day the poor fellow slipped and fell between the donkey and the cart, and it took six men heaving and tugging to haul him out." Mr. Kullmann said.

It was worth it, Slezak felt. He didn't mind being a comedian, and he told the young tenor: "You know something, Kullmann? I earn more money without a voice than I ever did with one." And perhaps Charles Kullmann thought of that when he decided not to go to Salzburg.

CHARLES Guilbert of Paris, France, writes that broadcasts describing life aboard the S.S. *Normandie*, will be radiated by FNSK, the ship's transmitter, from 12 noon to 12:30 p.m. EDT (11 to 11:30 a.m. EST), on September 22, 23, October 2, 6, 7 and November 3, and from 7 to 7:30 a.m. EDT (6 to 6:30 a.m. EST), on September 20, October 4, and 18. The liner will be heard on one of the following frequencies: 4.545, 8.823 or 13.275 megs, while the shore end of the phone circuit at Pointoise, France, will be audible on one of the following frequencies: 4.225, 7.7, 9.04, 12.22 or 13 megs. . . . A new Montevideo, Uruguay, station, CXA8 (9.505), is now relaying the programs of Broadcast Station LR3 of Buenos Aires, daily. Starting about the beginning of next year, CXA2 (6.00), also of Montevideo, will relay the programs of LR2 of Buenos Aires. . . . ZP14, "Radio Cultura," a new short-wave station at Villarica, Paraguay, transmitting on approximately 6.38 megs, whose main purpose is to broadcast horse races direct from the track in Buenos Aires (the Argentina stations being forbidden to do this), is now operating Saturdays and Sundays from 12 noon to 6 p.m. EDT (11 a.m. to 5 p.m. EST), and other days from 5:30 to 7 p.m. EDT (4:30 to 6 p.m. EST). The present power of the station is 3000 watts, but will soon be boosted to 5000 watts.

The Soviet icebreaker *Krasin*, at present engaged in searching for the lost arctic flyers transmitting on a power of 400 watts and using the call UNZM "Krasin ledokol," may be heard on one of the following frequencies: 4.14, 6.18, 6.21 or 8.287 megs.

Many new and interesting amateur stations are being heard at present on the 20-meter band. James G. Shock, Jr., of Philadelphia, Penn., reports reception of Hungarian station HA8N (14.1) at 9:35 p.m. EDT (8:35 p.m. EST). YL2BC (14.09) in Latvia, was heard on August 25, at 6:38 p.m. EDT (5:38 p.m. EST). The call was given as Y—Yesterday, L—London, Number Two, B—Boston, and C—Canada. . . . Irving Goodeve of Kalamazoo, Mich., has recently logged South African amateurs ZT6Y, ZU6AF, ZU6N, ZU6E, ZS6AJ, ZU6P and ZS5AB, between 9 and 10 a.m. EDT (8 and 9 a.m. EST). . . . Starting at 11:25 p.m. EDT (10:25 p.m. EST), just after the Farr-Louis fight on Monday night, August 30, I tuned in amateurs in Argentina, British Guiana, Venezuela, Peru, Ecuador, Canada, Mexico, and Cuba, within a space of twenty minutes. Australian and Dutch East Indies "hams" may be heard in abundance these days from approximately 8 to 9 a.m. EDT (7 to 8 a.m. EST).

In addition to the war news in English and Japanese, Nazaki stations JZJ (11.8) and JZK (15.16), are now broadcasting a bulletin in Chinese, daily 9:35 a.m. EDT (8:35 a.m. EST).

Ray Shaffar of Waterloo, Ia., reports hearing YSD (7.89) of San Salvador, El Salvador, broadcasting a musical program, from 11:35 p.m. to 12

mid. EDT (10:35 to 11 p.m. EST). The announcer promised an air-mail verification to those reporting the program and requested that letters be sent to the Director General of Communications at San Salvador. . . . EA9H, a new Spanish loyalist station on 14.01 megs, not to be confused with EA9AH, who was on at the same time with insurgent news but a little higher in frequency, has been heard recently near 1 a.m. EDT (12 mid. EST). The location of the station is not aired, for obvious reasons.

W3XAU of Philadelphia, Penn., is now operating on the following schedule: On 9.59 megs, Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 12 noon to 8 p.m. EDT (11 a.m. to 7 p.m. EST), on Wednesdays and Sundays from 7 p.m. EDT (6 p.m. EST) and on Thursdays from 10 to 11 p.m. EDT (9 to 10 p.m. EST); on 6.06 megs, from 8 to 11 p.m. EDT (7 to 10 p.m. EST) daily except Thursdays, and on Thursdays from 8 to 10 p.m. EDT (7 to 9 p.m. EST).

Collective listening to the Daventry programs will be made possible for the inhabitants of Tristan da Cunha, the world's loneliest island, as a result of a visit to London now being made by the Island's resident chaplain, the Rev. Harold Wilde. When he returns to the island towards the end of the year, he will take with him an all-wave receiving set with which he has been presented. He may also take along a small amateur-phone transmitter to be used for communication with Cape Town, South Africa.

Italian lessons for American listeners are now being broadcast over ZR04 (11.81) of Rome, Italy, on Mondays and Wednesdays at 8 p.m. EDT (7 p.m. EST).

W2XAD (15.33) of Schenectady, N. Y., uses a beam aerial directed towards Europe from 12 noon to 7 p.m. EDT (11 a.m. to 6 p.m. EST), and an aerial with Buenos Aires, Argentina, as the center point of its beam, from 7 to 10 p.m. EDT (6 to 9 p.m. EST). W2XAF (9.53), operates with a non-directional antenna from 5 to 7 p.m. EDT (4 to 6 p.m. EST) and with an aerial beamed on Buenos Aires, from 7 p.m. to 1 a.m. EDT (6 p.m. to 12 mid. EST).

W1XAL of Boston, Mass., has requested from the Federal Communications Commission, a modification of its license to permit the adoption of new frequencies of 9.55, 11.73, 15.13 and 21.5 megs, on a temporary provisional basis.






