

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

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
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UNMASKING W. J. CAMERON, SPOKESMAN FOR FORD

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
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

Father Barbour's Advice to Jack

One of those unforgettable broadcasts which radio occasionally produces was that presenting a letter from Father Barbour of "One Man's Family" (NBC, Thurs., 8 p.m. EST; 7 CST; 6 MST; 5 PST; Sun., 10:30 p.m. MST; 9:30 PST) to his son Jack three years ago. So sage was his advice—and so applicable to all American sons today—that RADIO GUIDE reproduces Father Barbour's letter for its readers on the third anniversary of its presentation.—Ed.

MY DEAR son: I hope this letter will reach you on the first day of your college experience, for that day marks your step upon the threshold of your manhood. I am more proud of you than it is possible for me to convey; proud of your splendid record to date; proud that by your own accomplishments you are able to enroll in the college which has been your choice since you were seven years old.

I wish every father might have the same feeling of confidence in his son that I hold for you at this minute; the confidence that your record so far is but an indication of nobler and more honorable accomplishments to follow.

There are a number of things of which I wish to write at this time. I do not do this with any thought of admonishing you, but rather as a counselor of older and more mature judgment.

Respect and revere those fine men and women who compose the faculty. Extend to them the same splendid cooperation you have given each of your teachers in the past. Learn to distinguish between the fundamentals of their subjects and the teacher's personal opinions about them. College experience should develop your analytical ability. Therefore, accept and reject, but avoid becoming opinionated and argumentative. Above all things do not develop the attitude that college train-

ing marks the end of learning.

Be democratic. Avoid snobs—rich or poor ones—and do not be snobbish yourself. The classification of a man is not his possessions or lack of them but his character. Leadership is never possible truly to a man who has no sympathetic understanding of his fellows.

Be generous but not foolish. Remember there is an adage that the best charity is to help one to be free from the need of charity.

Do not be a prude or a prig.

Avoid excesses in all things. Enter freely into the social life that is offered you but prove your mental strength by refusing any temptation of overindulgence. As you are well aware, I leave to your own judgment whether you use tobacco or liquor. I would prefer in any event that you indulge in neither during your formative years.

I hope your social life will give you contact with many of the fine men and

women in the student body. Your own natural friendliness and modesty will bring you the right companionship. Treat every woman with the utmost respect and courtesy—that is the hallmark of a gentleman. Accord to each woman the same respect you would ask for your sisters.

And remember this: Do not be swallowed by the stream or become influenced by mass or mob psychology. When you do, you surrender your capacity for clear thinking. Stand on the side-lines and study the stream. Keep your perspective. Think for yourself.

I hope you will preserve this letter and occasionally read it. It is written only after careful consideration and thought. I write it because of the great love I have for you, and out of the great hope I have in you. May all that we do—each of us—tend to strengthen the tie that binds us together.

IN THE PULPIT

Radio parson Bill Stidger,
writer, inventor, crusader,
"plays vaudeville for God"

THE highest-paid radio performer per minute of time spent on the air is a Methodist preacher named William L. Stidger. The Reverend Doctor Stidger to you. "Bill" Stidger to policemen, taxi-drivers, presidents, beach-combers and kings. There's nobody he doesn't know.

Each morning, Monday through Friday, he broadcasts on many of America's greatest stations his strangely appealing answer to the question, *Are You Getting the Most Out of Life?* For this, Fleischmann's Yeast pays him well over \$50,000. The exact figure is a secret. It makes him the most highly paid, most widely listened-to preacher in the world.

There is a great deal of "the mostest and the bestest" about Bill Stidger. Built like a prize-fighter, tall and weighing well over two hundred pounds, he fills every room he enters with the warmth and power of his personality. During the war he enlisted with the Y. M. C. A., but instead of sitting around selling chocolate bars to soldiers, he drove a truck and got up to the front where the shells were bursting.

The first series of sermons ever to be delivered over the air came from the mouth of Bill Stidger back in 1922 over a Detroit station. Radio was young in those days and a speaker had a great deal more leeway than he has today, and one night Bill was invited to a banquet and could not meet his wife as arranged. So, at the conclusion of his broadcast he said over the air to his wife, who was listening, "Awfully sorry, dear, but I won't be able to meet you. Would you mind going home alone?" For weeks after-

ward friends teased him about it, inquiring if his wife ever got home okay.

In Detroit he was not satisfied with his pulpit and radio preaching; he wrote a newspaper column and began to turn out books. One of these was the first biography of Henry Ford ever to be written. He has written an average of two books a year ever since, in addition to hundreds of magazine and newspaper articles, his sermons and his radio talks.

The acquaintance with Ford, begun almost twenty years ago, has continued. Periodically the manufacturer will telephone to Stidger to come out for a visit, and Bill will get on a train and spend a few days in Dearborn. He tells many stories about Henry. One of the best concerns a ride Ford was taking one day when he espied one of the factory guards leading a boy to the gate firmly if not tenderly by the ear.

The guard explained that the boy had slept all night in the barn, which was against the rules.

FORD turned to the boy and asked him his version of the story. The boy replied: "Well, I walked from Detroit to Dearborn looking for work and I couldn't find any. I had to sleep some place and the barn door was open and I went in. What would you have done, sir?"

"Have you had any breakfast?" the manufacturer inquired.

"No—nor have I had any supper yet," the boy grinned.

"All right, hop in the car with me and I'll get you something to eat."

Ford fed the boy, got him a job in a drug store and then lent him a dollar. All this time the boy did not even

suspect who his benefactor was.

A week later the boy got his first pay. Immediately he walked out to the barn near Dearborn, hunted up the guard and said to him, "Do you know that guy who picked me up here last week and took me to Dearborn?"

The guard cagily admitted he knew the man by sight and that he frequently passed that way.

"Well," continued the boy, "he loaned me a dollar that morning and I want to pay it back."

"Give it to me, I'll see that he gets it," said the guard.

To this day, Ford carries that dollar in his watch pocket as a pocket-piece. And the boy today is one of the chief executives of the Ford enterprises.

From Detroit, Stidger went to Kansas City, where a wealthy oil man paid his church \$1,000 a week for two years to enable Stidger to broadcast his Wednesday evening meetings. A West Virginian by birth, he arrived at his present home, Boston, by way of California and the aforementioned stops in Detroit and Kansas City. By the time he arrived, his writings and radio preaching had made of him a national figure.

His gift for making friends had made him a pal of such diverse personalities as Herbert Hoover and Jack Dempsey. He was on good terms with both the W. C. T. U. and the I. W. W. He called Ed Wynn, Fred Stone and Jack Benny by their first names. He gave Will Rogers some of his best jokes. To Sinclair Lewis he gave the idea for his book, "Elmer Gantry," although the central character hasn't the remotest resemblance to the expansive radio preacher.

No sooner arrived in Boston than Stidger was preaching Sunday morn-

ings to capacity audiences. In the evenings he did the same at the Church of All Nations. To sedate Boston, Stidger's free-hand delivery was accepted with delight by congregations, with uplifted hands by rival ministers. He called them "mama dolls" and described his rivals as "the milk-fed, hand-led preachers of Woodward Avenue." The Daughters of the American Revolution he labeled the "Daughters of Reaction." Long before Billy Sunday showed over the horizon, Stidger was describing a real man as one who "was able to spit over a box car."


NOT a week passed but Stidger made page one in one or another of the Boston newspapers. In one a wag wrote the following rhyme about him:

*Here's to old Boston,
The land of the bean and the cod,
Where the Cabots and Lowells are
silent
And Bill Stidger plays vaudeville for
God.*

The theological division of Boston University, however, thought enough of the Stidger style to appoint him professor of preaching, a job which he still holds in leave of absence.

His present program began some five years ago as a broadcast of fifteen minutes, a four-minute talk with four hymns, on the Yankee network. It was designed for older people. It spread to the entire nation. At this writing some seventy-odd stations are relaying the broadcast. His audience is one of the largest and most steadfast in radio.

Incidentally, he has discovered that the old hymns like "Rock of Ages" are

"Are You Getting the Most Out of Life?" Dr. William L. Stidger, most widely listened-to preacher in the world, gives listeners a four-minute answer to that question over NBC on Mondays through Fridays. Built like a prize-fighter, this unorthodox cleric pals with Jack Benny and Henry Ford

less popular. Listeners prefer songs with greater social significance. They are also tired of hymns that plod along musically te-dum, te-dum; they want real melody. Curious about this change, he questioned some ten thousand ministers of all faiths on the most popular hymns in their churches, and these were the seven most popular:

Dear Lord and Father.
O Master, Let Me Walk.
Oh Love That Wilt Not.
Where Cross the Ways.
Spirit of God Descend.
O God, Our Help.
A Mighty Fortress.

Stidger himself has written some twenty hymns in collaboration with Frank R. White, organist on his program. He writes copiously, both prose and poetry, and finds time for a dozen hobbies and side-lines. In Kansas City he tinkered in the basement of his home until he had invented a revolving electric cross to be placed atop the church. Wherever you happen to see one of these today, Bill Stidger has collected a royalty.

LOOKING naught like a preacher, he sallies forth in a battered car each summer to visit the men and women who listen to his program. One of these

was a seventy-year-old farmer who used to walk back to the house each day to listen to the Stidger broadcast. To the preacher the farmer said, "We're glad to live on this hilltop of ours because we're high enough to see things in their proper perspective. We are able to see things as they are."

Stidger used this remark as the theme of one of his broadcasts. "Somebody must give people a hilltop or a place of peace where they can go to think and pray," he said. "There must be quiet places for the souls of men and women after the turbulent life in which we are forced to live these days. I want this broadcast to be that hilltop."

A vital, dynamic personality, he has not hesitated to wade into politics. During the last presidential election he took charge of radio for the national Democratic Party, his special job being to interview on the air prominent ex-Republicans, those who had abandoned the G. O. P. for the New Deal.

"I have tried everything else on earth," he said to me, "but preaching is the most satisfying thing I do. To stand up before an audience, large or small, and deliver the Gospel of Good News, to feel you are changing men's thoughts and viewpoints—that is the greatest thrill that life has brought me.

"To be friends with people; to know and love babies, to baptize them; to marry people; to live with them in their troubles and help them solve their problems . . . to have influence in your city; to be inside looking out rather than outside looking in—that is the big 'kick' of the ministry to me."

One friendly critic of Bill Stidger said one day he felt about him the way Senator Jim Reed said he felt about Senator J. Ham Lewis.

"When I meet him," he said, "I don't know whether to kiss him or kick him."

But whatever your feeling, you cannot help respecting, admiring and loving this man. No other alive today, his friends say, has done quite as much good or inspired as many as this radio preacher Bill Stidger, who five mornings a week brings a message to millions.



By-the-Way-Line

Thank you for the welcome-back letters.

WHEN she had finished singing for Jan Sibelius, probably the greatest living composer, minutes passed before he could find words with which to express himself. At last he said, "My roof is too low for you."

At Salzburg, Arturo Toscanini, the most meticulous and exacting of living musicians, said to her, "A voice like yours is heard only once in a hundred years."

She sang her first concert when she was eight years old, for a fee of fifty cents.

Today, it is absolutely impossible to obtain her services before January, 1941. She is booked solidly until then.

She scrubbed porches for a nickel apiece to get the money for her first musical instrument, a four-dollar violin. Today she cheerfully spends fifty dollars to send a five-hundred-word cable from France to her mother.

That is the picture of Marian Anderson—tall, impassive Negro girl who is one of the greatest singers this old world has ever heard. Famous in concert circles for half a decade, Marian Anderson came to radio and nationwide prominence only a few months ago, and in an odd-enough way.

Radio listeners owe a great debt of gratitude to the Daughters of the American Revolution, for if it had not been for the D. A. R., millions of U. S. music-lovers might never have heard the voice of Marian Anderson in that heroic radio appearance.

What sort of person is Marian Anderson? Until the Daughters of the American Revolution tossed her onto the nation's front pages, very few people knew anything about her. Her private life, in startling contrast to the noisy hullabaloo featured by so many concert and operatic stars, was and is utterly modest.

Her father was a barber and her mother a school-teacher who was forced to become a washerwoman because of the destruction of her teacher's certificate in a fire. The Anderson family—the parents and three daughters—lived in a single room in a house on South Martin Street in Philadelphia's Negro quarter. They could afford nothing beyond the bare essentials and provided their own sole entertainment—singing. Someone was always singing, and in this atmosphere Marian Anderson grew up, the very marrow of her bones a mixture of hard work and music.

She made her first public appearance when she was six, singing a duet with another little girl at a concert in the Union Baptist Church. This church, still standing at Seventh and Fitzwater Streets in Philadelphia, was to be a vital factor in Marian Anderson's future.

At eight, Marian earned her first fee. It was fifty cents. By this time her voice had found its pitch, and she was being

introduced as the "baby contralto." As a matter of course, she joined the junior choir of the Union Baptist Church and soon graduated to the "grown-up" group.

By the time Marian Anderson was sixteen, she had inherited all of the responsibility for the support of her family. Her father had died, and the infrequent singing-engagements Marian was able to find had become doubly important.

Meanwhile she was studying voice with local teachers. But by her eighteenth birthday she had exceeded all that local tutoring could supply. The teachers that were available to her could teach her nothing; the teachers who could bring her genius to flower were beyond her means. It seemed a horrible, utterly hopeless dilemma—until the good parishioners of the Union Baptist Church came to the rescue. They banded together to collect a "Marian Anderson Fund." The response from those who had so often enjoyed Marian's singing was instantaneous. Nickels, dimes, quarters, half-dollars poured in, until finally there was enough to pay for instruction by

Giuseppe Boghetti, famous New York and Philadelphia voice teacher. She had not been long under his aegis before she was able to present herself on the concert platform of Philadelphia's Witherspoon Hall. The first shot in the battle for recognition had been fired.

New York's Town Hall, mecca of all musical artists, came next. Her recital there was a mild success, and Sr. Boghetti was sufficiently encouraged to groom her for a competition which Miss Anderson considers, to this day, as the keystone of her career. The prize was the privilege of singing at the Lewisohn Stadium with the New York Philharmonic Society. She sang "O Mio Fernando," from Donizetti's opera "La Favorita," and the critics who were lucky enough to hear her have never forgotten it. That was in 1925.

She studied, worked, practised endlessly for the next seven years, traveling back and forth between Europe and America, across western and central Europe.

Then came 1933.

Miss Anderson had planned a three-month European tour. From her first concert in London she traveled on the

wings of acclaim. And in August, 1935, she capped the incredible procession of triumphs with a program at the far-famed Salzburg Festival, which at that time had not yet been destroyed by the Nazis. It was on that occasion that Arturo Toscanini told her: "A voice like yours, Miss Anderson, is heard only once in a hundred years."

By this time, cabled reports of Marian Anderson's triumphs had sizzled into the American press, and a triumphal homecoming was planned. At the last moment, however, that triumph was almost lost. A few hours before the *Ile de France* docked in New York, Miss Anderson fell down a steel staircase, fractured a bone in her left foot. Even after the bone had been set and encased in plaster, she could not bear to touch it to the floor.

But she was determined that nothing should stop her, now that final acceptance by her own countrymen was just within reach. When the curtain rose on the platform of Town Hall in New York at 8:45 on December 30, 1935, Marian Anderson was standing in the curve of the grand piano, the cast hidden beneath her dress. The end of the concert was the signal for a frenzied ovation.

Her 1937 tour of the United States covered 26,000 miles, was the longest tour in concert history. For the first time, she went into the South, and the critic of the Houston (Tex.) *Post* observed, "Perhaps there was a dry cheek in the house. Perhaps they sold a seat to a stone man."

Whenever she is in the United States, Marian Anderson goes back to the little house on South Martin Street

in Philadelphia, where her mother and her two sisters still live. Mrs. Anderson has changed very little. She is proud of her daughter with a quiet pride. When she attended one of Marian's concerts a few years ago she sat next to a bejeweled dowager who was busily making quite sure that everyone within hearing range knew how thoroughly she appreciated Marian Anderson. Her applause was vociferous and prolonged. Mrs. Anderson, on the other hand, sat quietly throughout the concert. Finally the noisy patron turned to Mrs. Anderson. "What in the world is the matter with you, woman?" she asked. "You sit there like a bump on a log. Can't you recognize an artist when you hear one?"

"Madame," said Mrs. Anderson quietly, "I recognized my daughter as an artist when she was six years of age."

Marian Anderson's rise to popularity started in Europe, where she went because of lack of recognition in her own country. Returned here several years ago, she has since won America's regard as one of the ranking artists of our time, both in regard to voice and interpretation.

The colored contralto can easily be credited with understanding the characteristic music of her race, but to have penetrated the lofty spirit of Schubert and mastered the colorful brilliancies of Verdi is quite another and altogether astonishing matter. Those three phases of her art show in the present program.

"O Don Fatale" (Oh, Fatal Gift) is the aria sung by Princess Eboli in *"Don Carlos"* after she is given her choice between death and exile for betraying him to the king. Miss Anderson finds the required vocal breadth and sweeping delivery for the vivid music.

In *"Death and the Maiden,"* the Dread Spirit bids the Maiden follow him. She resists and pleads her youth and love of life. Death conquers, but in gentle mood, with the promise that extinction is only sleep. Note how eloquently Miss Anderson differentiates between the appealing tones of the Maiden and the hollow, awesome utterances of Death.

"Die Allmacht" (The Omnipotence) is Schubert at his dramatic tops as a song-creator. The text apostrophizes and hymns God as revealed through nature, its rivers, fields, firmament, flowers, sunshine and storms. The music calls for great tonal volume and the most fervid feeling. I have not heard Miss Anderson do the composition and shall be interested to see whether she can project tremendous power of voice without loss of fine quality.

Rubinstein the Romanticist

UNTIL this month, whenever Rubinstein had mention the historically uninformed music-lover of today assumed that the reference was to Arthur, the Polish pianist now touring America. However, while the subject of this essay indeed shone as a pianist, his parents baptized him in November, 1829, as Anton and added the middle name of Gregorovitch. Ten years later, in 1839, the Russian lad made his debut in Moscow and, until his death in 1894, enchanted the world with his performances on the keyboard and with his outstanding gifts as a composer.

Therefore this November brings the 110th birthday of the illustrious Anton; the one hundredth anniversary of his first playing in public; and the forty-fifth of his death. The triple events are having suitable commemoration through the efforts of a sympathetically and sentimentally understanding committee, including two pupils of Rubinstein, the pianists Josef Hofmann and Josef Lhevinne. The festivities, aside from concert performances of the celebrant's music, offered also a party given in New York by the house of Steinway and Sons, whose instrument Rubinstein played on his American tour in 1872-73; and the issuance by Random House of a new story of his life. It is called "Free Artist," authored by Catherine Drinker Bowen, collaborator of the Tchaikowsky biography "Beloved Friend." By "Free Artist" is meant one who no longer was dependent on the condescending patronage of rich individuals, as in the eighteenth century, but made his appeal to the public at large.

Rubinstein's playing enthused audiences with its artistic authority, its poetry, and flaming sweep of temperament. His tone, in volume, variety and emotional warmth, still is a tradition in the world of pianism. Rubinstein's achievements are the more remarkable when it is remembered that he flourished as a contemporary of the phenomenal, all-conquering Franz Liszt.

Strangely enough, despite his triumphs as a virtuoso, conductor, teacher and founder of the St. Petersburg Conservatory, Rubinstein's one insatiable ambition was to be recognized as a great composer. He wrote innumerable

piano pieces, of course, including the D Minor Concerto, which still lives actively; but he also created operas, oratorios, symphonies, suites, choral opuses, chamber-works and songs. Nearly all of that romantic output now is forgotten music, though undeservedly so, for it is rich in melody and masterful in construction. Posterity honors him chiefly as a pianist, a premonition that came home to him before his death and saddened him tragically.

As a man, Rubinstein was glorious to look upon. Stocky, broad-shouldered, with leonine head, rugged features and great shock of tumbled hair, he bore a striking resemblance to Beethoven. He had a great, ardent, generous soul, never better proved than when he was given a banquet in Leipsic after one of his recitals there. Liszt was present and offered a toast to "Rubinstein, king of pianists." The guest of honor rose, his glass on high, and responded a bit angrily with, "Why pay homage to the king when we are in the presence of Liszt, the emperor?" Where are such giants now?

Speaking Up

NBC reports the purchase of Weinberger's new opera, "The Outcasts of Poker Flat," based on the famous Bret Harte story. It will be premiered on the air in the near future. Recalling "Schwanda" and the recent "Variations on Under the Spreading Chestnut Tree," one can be sure that the composer will infuse the theme with all the lustiness and warmth that the subject demands, although the music may be more reminiscent of "The Outcasts of Czechoslovakia" than those of Poker Flat.

The rediscovery of music by a great master is always news. On Friday CBS broadcasts a Sonata for Piano and Clarinet by Felix Mendelssohn, which has been in obscurity for half a century. The two artists who will perform it, Eric Simon, Viennese clarinetist, and Dr. Felix Gunther, head of the music department of Queens College, are also responsible for its forthcoming publication.

A broadcast that gave this reporter a thrill was the "Pursuit of Happiness" on November 5, featuring Paul Robeson, magnificent Negro baritone in an oratorio by a young American, Earle Robinson. The work, called "Ballad for Americans," was vital and stimulating, with a thoroughly American feeling.

These rumors that Toscanini may become an American citizen seem strengthened by the fact that for the first time in his many American visits he has rented a house for the winter instead of a hotel suite. It is in Riverdale, New York.

A charming Toscanini story is told by Samuel Chotzinoff. Last year he took the maestro to the International Casino, at that time the gaudiest, giddiest and most popular night-club in New York. The maestro, enchanted, stayed until three in the morning. When they left, Toscanini sighed with delight. "What a wonderful place," he said, turning to Chotzinoff in wide-eyed awe. "How did you ever find it?"

Men Behind the Music

This Week: Deems Taylor—Samuel Chotzinoff


OVER at NBC and CBS there are two men who rejoice in high-sounding, if slightly nebulous titles. At NBC Samuel Chotzinoff stoops under the burden of "Director of Serious Music" and at CBS Deems Taylor tries to escape the medical implications of "Music Consultant." Both are slightly puzzled as to what their titles mean exactly, but neither of them is in any doubt about their work. However, although both have definite jobs with their respective companies, they are best known to the radio public through their music commentary, Chotzinoff with the NBC Symphony and Taylor

piano; that he was supporting his entire family at thirteen. Today, in addition to his critical work and his NBC job, he directs the Chatham Square Music School in New York and teaches music criticism at the Curtis Institute. Only occasionally does he get time for his favorite relaxation of playing chamber-music.

Taylor has been in radio considerably longer than Chotzinoff. He made his first air bow the day Columbia made its debut as a network in 1929. He has spoken on any number of programs since, and for the last four seasons has won wide attention as Philharmonic

with the New York Philharmonic.

Both Chotzinoff and Taylor function chiefly as advisers to their networks. Taylor is consulted on any complex musical point which might come up, gives his opinions on programs, artists and general musical policy. Chotzinoff, rather more definitely, engages the conductors who replace Toscanini during his vacations, confers with them on their programs, and also passes on most questions relating to serious music.

Chotzinoff first entered the radio scene when he was sent by David Sarnoff on a diplomatic mission extraordinary, the luring of Toscanini back to America and, more particularly, into the NBC fold. Chotzinoff, called "Chotzi" by most of his intimates, was already a well-known musical figure in New York, first as accompanist for Zimbalist and then for Heifetz (whose sister he married); later as music critic for the old New York World (strangely enough, as Deems Taylor's successor); and finally as critic for the New York Post, where he still is.

His career is all the more remarkable when one considers that he arrived here as an immigrant from Russia at the age of six; that he taught himself

commentator. The career that led up to that included architecture, reporting, composing and music criticism. Born in New York, he attended New York University, and his first job after leaving college was in an encyclopedia publishing office. His two operas, "The King's Henchman" and "Peter Ibbetson," were both performed at the Metropolitan, and his book "Of Men and Music" was one of last year's best sellers.

The most outstanding feature of both Taylor and Chotzinoff is a robust and completely hard-boiled sense of humor. Music having been their profession for most of their lives, it holds no illusions for them. Both men have been extraordinarily successful in debunking the old "touch me not" idea of music. In fact, in the preface of his book, "Of Men and Music," Taylor says: "Many a potential music-lover is frightened away by the solemnity of music's devotees. They would make more converts if they would rise from their knees."

With two such aids and adjudicators to guide them, CBS and NBC are not likely to go wrong in good music, or to swing too strongly toward swing.

Young Man With a Band

A DANCE-BAND leader is a "property." He and similar other properties are the backbone of an industry that grossed ninety million dollars last year. That's the amount of money the American people paid out in one year for the privilege of listening and dancing to "Three Little Fishies," "Hold Tight!" (Want some sea food, Momma?), "Ti Pi Tin," "Ain't What You Do," and similar tunes of the hour.

Unmasking the secret deals which are a part of the fascinating name-band business

Ninety million dollars is "big business." And it rests squarely on the well-tailored shoulders of the fellow with a nervous baton in his hand, a great big smile on his face, and an instrument slung over his shoulder or under his arm. He is the fountainhead of the golden stream, which has more tributaries than the Mississippi river. From him flows the music for which manufacturers of soap, cigarettes, shoe-polish and other sundries pay in five- and six-figure checks; music which brings thousands to dance-floors; which is impressed on platters and sold in the millions; and which brings long queues to box-office windows.

The average popular dance-band leader has an earning capacity of from \$125,000 to a quarter of a million dollars annually. Headline attractions, who draw checks from sponsors of radio programs and film companies in addition to the usual income from recordings and personal-appearance engagements, may easily gross from half a million to a million dollars yearly.

Looking at the average upper-bracket baton-waver—the fellow who is definitely "box-office"—he receives about \$2,500 a week for a hotel engagement; \$5,000 for a week's stand at a theater; from \$1,000 to \$2,000 for a one-night date; and royalties from sales of recordings. Still another, but less regular, source of income is from film-musical shorts.

The select top-notchers, stickmen like Kay Kyser, Benny Goodman, Rudy Vallee, Paul Whiteman, and Tommy Dorsey, will ask for—and get—\$3,500 for a week's hotel engagement; \$10,000 for a week of vaudeville; from \$5,000 to \$10,000 weekly for a commercial radio program; and a guarantee of something like \$100,000 annually from recordings.

These, to be sure, are amazing figures. The point to be remembered, however, is that a goodly chunk of this money, certainly more than half, merely passes through the hands of the bandleader or his agent. There is a tremendous pay-off involved, with at least two ten-percents going to booking

agency and manager and a fairly large portion to the musicians and vocalists in the band, not to mention another slice to sundry other members of his large entourage—arrangers, orchestrators, press-agent, secretary, and plain stooges.

Cut a melon so many ways, and there won't be much left. At the end of the year, the average bandleader can count on a net profit of \$50,000 or more. Which, in the parlance of the trade, is not tin.

Since he is no great shakes as a businessman (a condition which, incidentally, was virtually forced on him), the bandleader is handled as any other valuable "property"—a baseball player, a prize-fighter, or a hotel. He is practically (and in some cases literally) a corporation with participating stockholders. He may even be "owned" outright by one or more persons. These people have a "piece" in the maestro.

SEVERAL years ago, when the mobsters were running things to suit themselves in the night-club business, a couple of Dutch Schultz's boys, their right hands apparently gripping revolvers in their jacket pockets, dropped into the office of the manager of a Negro bandleader. Having nursed this musician along through several lean years, and having finally succeeded in pushing him into the big money, this man stood prepared to cash in handsomely on his investment by virtue of his iron-bound contract.

"We want ———'s contract," said the gangsters. "Here's \$500. Let's see you tear it up."

The beleaguered manager was helpless. He tore up his contract and the Negro bandleader became one of Schultz's money-making enterprises. He was turned over to a booking agency for managing purposes and the Dutch man received his cut every week.

While the colored bandleader, with one or two exceptions, can little more than call his name his own (and manager-owners will tell you this is for his own good), the average white baton-

waver is only to a slightly greater degree master of his own destiny. His professional life is in the hands of one of four powerful booking corporations which, together, negotiate about ninety-eight percent of the ninety million dollars spent on popular music.

He came into big-time existence only through the ministrations of the agency which, because of its potent connections in radio, theater, and hotel circles, was able to pluck him from obscurity and nurse him into prominence. Of course the fellow had to have something which made him a fairly safe risk; he was merely an investment. In promoting its investment, the agency groomed the bandleader as carefully as a thoroughbred is prepared for the Derby. He was taken in hand and given expert advice; his band was built up around him; he was placed in the proper locations, good hotel or night-club spots, invariably at a financial loss; and then he was fed to the listening and dancing public through the advantageous half-hour spots on the networks bought and controlled by the agency. All that was required of him was to play his particular brand of music at the appointed time and place.

Three trends in types of bandleaders can be distinctly traced—the personality man, the college graduate, and the instrumental virtuoso, who is in vogue today.

A decade or more ago, the stock in trade of a popular bandleader was his personality. He waved a baton before his band but he knew no more about music than a first-year student—even less. If he knew enough to give the downbeat which started the boys off together, that was sufficient.

For many years he had toured the country's variety houses. He was an old-line comedian who changed his gag routine perhaps every five years. He delivered a slightly risqué song with a bellow and a sock finish. His banter with the "Professor" in the pit brought him laughs, so he kept that routine in. In time, he learned to scrape a fiddle or toot a saxophone to punctuate his

gags. That made him a musician.

In the course of years he exhausted his routines and booking agents intimated that the paying public was growing weary of him as a solo act. A veteran trouper, he was smart enough to realize that he needed something new, he had to give the customers more for their money than moth-eaten gags. His name was potentially good at the box-office. The booking agency went to work and in a short time organized an orchestra, complete to a good-looking vocalist as "dressing." The comedian was now in the band business, and in place of his instrument substituted a baton. To his manager went the task of hiring a substitute leader who actually did all the work of whipping the band into shape and developing its style. The personality bandleader was strictly "front."

The collegiate bandleader started in his high-school band. He was born in a small town of middle-class parents who believed each of their children should play some instrument.

His parents were none too wealthy, and so he entered the state university to prepare for a practical career. His education was to reap him a "money crop." Vaguely, he thought of one of the professions.

At the beginning of his second year, his parents explained they couldn't afford to keep him in school and that if he wished to continue he would have to find part-time work. In looking about for a job, he found he could wait on tables or tend furnaces. Disinclined to do either, he bethought himself of his instrument, with which he had been entertaining his fraternity brothers and on which he was now passably adept. Two of his fraternity brothers also played instruments, and he knew others. One evening he called five of these boys together and proposed that they form a dance-band, with himself as leader.

ONCE launched, he managed to wangle a fair share of the campus business, which brought him about \$15 a week. In his third year, he entered the school of music. Having played together for a year, his band had improved considerably and even boasted a "style." His brass section blew low, throaty notes and his clarinets started each number with a drawn-out wail. This supplied him with a musical signature and a name for his music: "Moanin' Low Rhythm."

Graduation found him with a bachelor-of-arts degree in music and no

plans for the future. He returned to his home town, where several jobs were available. But any of these meant work, which did not jibe with his previous experiences at money-making. He had tasted the pleasures of mob attention, in a small way, and he had found it good. It was far easier and pleasanter to lead a band. He looked up his fellow bandsmen and found them similarly disposed.

That fall the ambitious maestro brought his "Moanin' Low" music back to the college town, where they played fraternity dances, proms and dance dates. He averaged perhaps \$35 a week, his boys even less. He went after other college dates. In the summer he toured the amusement parks. A smart proprietor of a ballroom, hoping to attract the college trade, installed the bandleader in his walk-up establishment.

Meanwhile he had acquired a manager. The struggle for engagements was by no means an easy one. So far as comparatively unknown bandleaders are concerned, the dancing public can take them or leave them. It's only when they get to the top that the public decides they are indispensable. The big break for the young maestro came when a scout for one of the national booking agencies "caught" the lad at work and reported on his possibilities.

Several weeks later the maestro opened at a fairly good hotel, whose band-booking contract was held by an agency. In those weeks, a transformation had taken place. The band had been increased to twelve men, all attired in spanking new dress suits, a vocalist had been added, and a lad had been brought in to write special arrangements. Behind the transformation was the agency, working its miracles with a lavish hand against the time it would make its newest acquisition a dividend-paying proposition. Because the band was unknown, the agency could demand only a small price from the hotel, and its commission was negligible. Week after week, the agency was content to lose money on the bandleader. Meanwhile, he was being popularized through devious publicity channels. A powerful factor was the radio. Several times a week he went on the air, the wire charges for which were paid by the agency. Newspapers and trade magazines carried his name at frequent intervals.

In time, such pump-priming tactics produced the desired results. As the bandleader grew in popularity, he was booked into better spots at higher prices. Not that he had become a bet-

ter musician but simply because he was affluent enough to hire top-ranking instrumentalists in the business. Moreover, he had added entertainment features—a girl trio, a "blues" singer, and a male who specialized in novelty numbers.

The bandleader who rose to prominence from the campus is not, in the strictest sense, a thorough musician. Completely wrapped up in his own band, and believing that his music is the best thing this side of heaven, he is inclined to bother not at all with any other brand of music.

The latest trend in bandleaders, however, finds a thorough and competent musician on the stand. He is an instrumental virtuoso and he sprang into prominence with the popularity of swing music—the crux of which is inspired solo work. When the jitterbugs demanded to see and hear these instrumentalists, the booking agencies realized it was the beginning of a new trend in bandleaders. The trend, incidentally, was the first which was not manufactured by the agencies but which they were forced to adopt, willingly enough, to be sure.

OF THE three types of bandleaders, the instrumentalist alone possesses a rich musical talent. He took to his instrument because he loved to play it and because he was crazy about music. He was born into a household crowded with brothers and sisters.

Somehow, at the age of ten, he had managed to lay his hands on an instrument. It was battered and worn and the valves worked none too smoothly. But he was fascinated by its sounds and spent many hours fooling around with it. Note by note, he mastered the simpler tunes he knew.

At night he took to hanging out at a near-by dance-hall, absorbing the music and making friends with the boys in the band. Afternoons, while the other kids were out playing ball, he stayed at home, blowing into the instrument and fingering the valves in an effort to re-create the music still ringing in his ears. When he had absorbed all that his neighborhood instructor was able to teach him, he went looking for a job and finally landed one in a small dance-band. The band played at weddings in neighborhood banquet halls, usually over the week-ends, but it brought him ten dollars. Most of this went to his mother.

When he wasn't playing or practicing, he was listening to music. He (Continued on Page 45)



I WAS A PLUMBER'S HELPER

Do you want to write a song-hit? Here are the do's and don't's of song-writing as listed by a famous popular composer

BY JIMMY McHUGH

SO YOU'RE thinking about writing that song that's been in the back of your head for weeks and months?

Well, come on. Let's have it. Procrastination is the thief of time, you know. You can't start sooner than right now.

Perhaps I'm a chump to urge you on. After all, I make my living writing songs. And you don't see any doctors, lawyers or businessmen going out and inviting competition for themselves.

But I'm feeling in an expansive mood. I'm very pleasantly ensconced (I hope that word means what I think it does) on the top of the world. In my desk there is a letter from Harry Kaufman, general producing manager for the Shuberts, in which he says "Streets of Paris," for which I wrote the music and Al Dubin the words, is a cinch to run throughout the winter.

In addition, "The South American Way," the hit tune of the musical, is a great success. The radio and the name bands are giving it a grand play. Now Darryl Zanuck has signed Carmen Miranda, the sensational Brazilian singer, to make a picture called "The South American Way," which will mean still more popularity for the song. And, not too incidentally from my standpoint, more royalties for me.

So here's to competition. For a person with a talent for music there's no finer career than song-writing. I sincerely hope that your efforts lead you ultimately to a double-A rating in ASCAP. Here are a few tips that may help you on your way.

Just as a matter of course, once you get into song-writing you'll find yourself working twenty-four hours a day. You'll study people, newspapers, magazines, every phase of life, for an idea that can be turned into a song. You may be out with the most interesting group of people imaginable, brilliant conversationalists and gay, but right in the middle of the party you're apt to find your thoughts wandering, thinking about a song. Every song-writer I know is that way. So if your mind starts taking that turn, encourage it. It's the mental process from which hit songs are born.

But, though your mind works around the clock, the body mustn't. The old saying that hard work never killed anybody wasn't meant for artists. And, don't forget, a song-writer is an artist. Songs that catch on have to be inspired. They are written with your mind and your heart, not with your hands.

So don't try to plug your way to success with long hours at the piano. It won't work. It will merely make your music dull and routine, the oppo-

site of inspired. The only place for hard physical effort is in working out your song once you have gotten the melody.

Just as many hits have been created away from the piano as at it; perhaps more. When a song comes to you away from the keyboard, it's more apt to have a natural melody that the man in the street can sing. And when he starts singing and whistling your tune, royalties start pouring in.

IN WRITING songs, put more reliance on inspiration than on perspiration. School your mind to be on a constant lookout for ideas. Then, after you have gotten the idea, sit down to the piano and work it out.

Sometimes songs pop out without rhyme or reason. "The South American Way" was like that. It came to me when, of all things, I was singing in the shower-bath.

Harry Kaufman, Al Dubin and I had been in my suite at the Warwick Hotel in New York all morning, going over the numbers for "Streets of Paris." Everything was complete except a number for Carmen Miranda, whom Kaufman was bringing up from Brazil. We were having a little trouble with that one.

When we went out to lunch Mr. Kaufman gave us a bit of a pep talk. He went to considerable length to get us enthusiastic about the Brazilian singer. "She's sensational," he declared, "and I want you fellows to give me a good zomba rhythm for her. I must have it." When you consider that she had not been heard in the United States up to this time, you realize what a keen

judge of talent and public taste he is.

Back at the hotel I decided to take a cold shower to overcome the effects of a heavy lunch. I got under the stream of water and began singing at random, nothing in particular, when—wham!—it came to me. I jumped out of the shower, wrapped a towel around myself and ran over to the piano in the living-room.

"Listen to this," I said. "See how you like it for Miranda."

"That's thrilling! That's Miranda! You've got it!" Kaufman declared when I had finished. Turning to Dubin, he said, "Now, Al, let's have some bang-up lyrics to match the music." A few minutes later he departed, leaving Dubin and me to complete the number.

"I Can't Give You Anything But Love, Baby" was born as a cross between inspiration and getting ideas from watching people. I was standing in front of Tiffany's on Fifth Avenue with Dorothy Fields, with whom I collaborated for eight years, when a young fellow and his girl came up and began looking in the show window not far from us. They gazed longingly at the costly jewelry on display. I don't know just what the girl said. Undoubtedly it was some remark about wishing he had enough money to buy her some jewelry like that. But both Dorothy and I heard the important thing—his reply. Wistfully he said, "I wish I did, too, Baby, but I can't give you anything but love." It hit us at the same time. We both realized that we had an idea for a new tune.

Song-writing has been good to me. I have a fine home in Beverly Hills. I drive a nice car. I have money in the

bank—a little. I have perhaps more than an average number of friends, charming people in all walks of life. Among them are Jack Robbins, the music-publisher; Dr. A. H. Giannini, the banker; Father Remi Schuvier, of St. John's Prep School, Danvers, Mass., and Johnny Royal, now in charge of production and vice-president of NBC, but whom I knew as a young newspaperman on the Boston Post.

It has been a privilege to write "The Cuban Love Song" for Lawrence Tibbett, "Hitting a New High" for Lily Pons, "My Dancing Lady" for Joan Crawford, "I Love to Whistle" and "My Own" for Deanna Durbin, and "You're a Sweetheart" for Alice Faye.

ENTIRELY aside from the monetary rewards, there has been a great personal satisfaction in having authored such tunes as "I'm in the Mood for Love," "On the Sunny Side of the Street," "Exactly Like You," "Digga Digga Doo," "Hinky Dinky Parley Vous" and "Dinner at Eight."

I am telling you this not to be boasting but to urge, "Go thou and do likewise."

I started out as a plumber's helper, working in one of my father's crews (he was a plumbing engineer) in Boston. Luckily I dropped a four-inch pipe on my foot and gave it up. Later, for three years, I had a small office job at the Boston Grand Opera House. It paid hardly more than cigarette money.

I'm a perfect example of a fellow to point to and say, "If he can do it, so can I."

And I still suspect that perhaps I'm a little tetchy to be urging you on.

OVERSEAS BROADCASTS FROM JAPAN

THE five daily overseas broadcasts of the Broadcasting Corporation of Japan, which originate in the new four-million-yen Broadcasting House at Tokyo, are radiated as follows:

From 12 midnight to 1:30 a.m. EST over JZI (9.535), directed to the Pacific Coast of North America and Hawaii; from 7 to 9:30 a.m. EST over JZI (9.535) and JZJ (11.80) directed to China and the South Seas; from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. EST over JWV (7.257) and JZJ (11.80), directed to Europe; from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. EST over JZJ (11.80) and JZK (15.16), directed to South America, and from 8:00 to 9:00 p.m. EST over JZK (15.16), directed to North America.

All broadcasts open and close with the playing of "Kimigayo," the national anthem of Japan, followed by a series of soft chimes representing the notes in the first four bars of the same song. Newscasts in English are read at 8:15 p.m. and 12:03 a.m. EST. These bulletins consist almost entirely of latest war news from the Sino-Japanese conflict, as furnished

by the Domei News Agency. Japanese victories are of course greatly overemphasized, while Chinese victories are never mentioned.

Reception from Japan ranges from fair to good, depending upon the listener's location, direction in which the receiving aerial runs, season of the year, and frequency in use. Listeners in the central and eastern states should tune for Tokyo at 8:00 p.m. EST. JZK (15.16) is located near the low-frequency side (nearest 15 megacycles) of the 19-meter band (the 19-meter band will probably be a short, thick line or dc. marked as 19 M on your dial), and will be just above GSF (15.14), London, which, at that period broadcasting to Latin America, will probably be weaker than JZK. . . . Listeners in the western states should tune for Tokyo at 12 midnight EST. JZI (9.535) will be found in the 31-meter band just a hair above KGEI (9.530) of San Francisco, California. Some nights KGEI will blanket JZI, but if reception conditions are right JZI should top the U. S. station in volume.

FROM THE EUROPEAN ARENA: Those who understand German will get an ear-opener by tuning in the broadcasts from London intended for those brave listeners in Germany who, flirting with the firing-squad, hover over forbidden short-wave sets hidden away in the attic or cellar. Best reception may be had at 2:30 p.m. EST, over GSI (15.26) or GSP (15.31), or at 4:15 p.m. EST, over GSP (15.31) or GRX (9.69). To tempt the Germans to thus take their lives in their hands, news notes giving the names of German prisoners of war held in British camps are sandwiched in between general news items favorable to the Allies' cause. The twenty names of prisoners read daily consume only half a minute of the news period. . . . Desmond Callan of Readville, Mass., reports the German short-wave station has a new interval signal, consisting of five piano notes of the same pitch repeated over and over, which is used occasionally. . . . CSW7 (9.74), "Emissora Nacional" of Lisbon, Portugal, is coming through with tremendous signal strength these nights, from 6:15 p.m. EST on. A deep-toned clock booms out the hours. Just before the clock strikes, chimes, similar to those ushering in Big Ben, are sounded.

THE NEWS IN GENERAL: VONG (9.475), St. Johns, Newfoundland, operates from 4:30 to 10 p.m. EST. . . . British short-wave stations VK3ME, Melbourne; VK2ME, Sydney, Australia, and VPD2, Suva, Fiji's, are all off the air for the duration of the war. . . . "Radio Martinique" (9.70), Fort-de-France, Martinique, B. W. I., radiates a news bulletin in English nightly at 6:15 p.m. EST. . . . VPGYB

in Barbados, British West Indies, formerly an amateur station, has been taken over by the Government for broadcasting purposes and operates nightly from about 6:15 p.m. EST, on frequencies of 4.2 or 3.7 mcs. . . . The first organization to sponsor a program over a United States international station as a distinctly short-wave feature is the United Fruit Company, which has signed on the dotted line for a daily quarter-hour evening spot over NBC stations WRCA and WNBI. . . . According to Ama-Touring, many undercover amateur stations are now being heard as a result of the withdrawal of licenses in so many countries. Among these is LX1UU (28.16), believed to be a British station; ES3CA (28.12), using a French accent, so probably in France; ZZZZ (14.12), claiming to be in Iceland, and ZX4M (14.115), believed to be operating from Cuba. . . . Hal Clein of Los Angeles, California, writes that MTCY (11.775), which operates for North America nightly from 1:30 to 2:30 a.m. EST, with a power of 20,000 watts, has since its inauguration on July 20 received 436 reports, including almost every country of the world. The Hsinking (Manchoukuo) station is well heard in the United States. . . . "Radio Saigon," French Indo-China, power of 12,000 watts, is now operating on 11.78 mcs, from 8:30 to 10:45 a.m. EST and from 11:15 p.m. to 12:45 a.m. EST and on 6.116 mcs, from 6 to 8:30 a.m. EST and from 6:45 to 7:45 p.m. EST. English broadcasts are radiated daily on 6.116 mcs, from 6 to 6:45 a.m. EST and on 11.78 mcs, from 11:45 p.m. to 12:15 a.m. EST and from 10:30 to 10:45 a.m. EST.



It is believed that the basis for the alphabet used by Europeans was learned by the Greeks from the Phenicians.

Person-to-Person . . .

● In one of the several demonstrations presented at the KSTP Conference on Educational Broadcasting in Minneapolis, a cartoonist instructed a class in drawing via television. This probably is the first public demonstration of a possible educational use of this new medium. Judging from the reports of those who attended, the conference program was extremely interesting and informative. Especially the radio workshop demonstrations.

● Though 'tis said there's nothing new in radio, short-wave station WRUL in Boston is presenting a program which is new and the only one of its kind on the airwaves. The subject in question is aviation, and this is the second practical course on the "Elements of Aviation" to be presented over WRUL by Captain Hilding N. Carlson, president of the New England Aircraft School and instructor in civil aeronautics at Boston University. The series is following through the increased interest in aviation that has been created by U. S. Government sponsorship of aviation courses in leading schools and colleges. Students interested in flying, mechanics, or ground-school phases of aviation are given helpful and useful instruction in this course. Illustrated booklets have been prepared to supplement the radio lectures so that the student misses none of the classroom teaching or blackboard illustrations. For further information write the World Wide Broadcasting Foundation, University Club, Boston, Massachusetts. Broadcasts may be heard Tuesdays at 10 p.m. EST (9 CST, 8 MST, 7 PST) on 11.73 or 15.13 megacycles; and is repeated on Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. EST (3:30 CST, 2:30 MST, 1:30 PST) on 11.79 or 15.13 megacycles.

● The listener aids for "The World Is Yours" broadcast, published by the Columbia University Press (New York, New York), are truly a work of art and a valuable contribution to any library whether you listen to the program or not. Prepared by Clarence Barker and Wallace Patterson, of the Office of Education, in collaboration with Leonard P. Schultz, technical adviser for the Smithsonian Institution, these printed pamphlets give you a thorough, up-to-date background of facts about the subject treated in each broadcast; important excerpts from the script; one bibliography for the casual listener, another for the scientifically minded.

● Announcement has been made that a Texas School of the Air will be launched over the Texas State Network shortly under the auspices of the Texas State Department of Education. According to present plans, it will begin the second semester with three programs a week: One in elementary science, one in upper intermediate grade social studies, and one in junior and senior high-school reading.

● Word comes from A. L. Chapman that the Bureau of Research in Education by Radio of the University of Texas is planning to launch a number of research studies, one of which will be a study of the listening habits of 50,000 Texas children. Mr. Chapman is director of the Bureau.

ALMOST anything can—and does—happen to Parks Johnson and Wally Butterworth, who ask the questions on "Vox Pop," a completely unrehearsed man-on-the-street program heard each Thursday night over CBS at 7:30 EST; 6:30 CST; not broadcast by stations in Mountain or Pacific Time zones. From close contact with the varied types of men—and women—they encounter in the various New York hotel lobbies from which they broadcast, these veteran question-askers have a mental album of man-on-the-street types, are able to recognize them at a glance. That this is no mean achievement is amply evidenced in a glance at a few of those interviewed on this program in the past. Professor Louis T. Masson, of Buffalo, N. Y.,

decided that the program would be much better if he did the question-asking, and Johnson and Butterworth had a bad few minutes trying to answer the professor's "stumpers." The audience liked it so well, however, that the professor has been asked back for a return engagement. A husband, in the doghouse at home with a wife who refused to listen to his explanations, wanted to broadcast. SO! YOU WANT TO STICK YOUR NECK OUT?

Then, would-be sports-caster, get the inside dope from radio's best

BY BILL STERN

EACH year hundreds of listeners—regardless of their present positions—write in to ask how they should go about becoming sports announcers. We try to answer these letters as ably as we can, but our time is limited and our answers are never as detailed as writers want. So, for their benefit, *RADIO GUIDE* is permitting us to answer—for the first time to our knowledge, completely, thoroughly and with no reservations—exactly what the qualifications of a sports announcer really are, based upon my six years of sportscasting for NBC.

I would say that the first requirement of a good sports announcer is a good background in sports. This is common sense. I don't mean that he should be an expert in any particular game or that he will necessarily have had to play in many games, but he must know sports, appreciate the effort which goes into them and be possessed of a natural love for anything competitive. From his schooling he should have a good vocabulary, be able to speak correctly, write intelligently and read with the greatest proficiency. These, of course, are the obvious requirements. Let's go behind the scenes, where the audience never penetrates. That's where the sportscaster's job actually begins. There hours, sometimes months, of preparation are necessary to make the broadcast interesting, full of facts and figures to set off the actual description.

I average approximately four hours of broadcasting a week, but nearly seventy hours are used in preparation and correcting available records for future reference. To cite a specific case, we'll take the recent A. A. U. Track and Field Meet at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln, Nebr.

Three hundred and fifty athletes from every section of the country were entered in the meet. Many of them were

comparative unknowns, competing in a major event for the first time. There was little information about them available. So we wrote to 412 coaches over the country asking for past records and achievements of men they were likely to send to the games. This was five months before the actual games, mind you. From the mountain of mail we made a file card for each athlete. With this file at my side, I was able to discuss his career with authority and accuracy. Later, A. A. U. officials requested and received a duplicate of my files for their own reference.

You must be a stickler for details, for small details which might easily be overlooked may mean the difference between a clear picture for the listener and just another radio broadcast. In the mile race at Princeton last June when Sidney Wooderson raced America's best milers I noticed that, as the runners came into the final turn, Wooderson faltered in his stride momentarily. I reported this to my listeners. It looked like a tiny detail, but it turned out to be the highlight of the race—unique among all other mile races of the season.

ENUNCIATION is important, too, and something which must be learned. It cannot be picked up in any other way, for certain syllables are notoriously bad for radio. The letter "s," for example, is difficult because you almost whistle it. And remember never to get so excited that you become incoherent.

Don't over-dramatize. Take the sensational first round of the Louis-Galento fight. Here the entire sporting world was caught unawares by the vicious left-handed attack of Tony Galento. No announcer in the world needed to inject any dramatics into that situation, for here was a heavyweight champion of the world on the verge of being dethroned—one blow away from it. You

can imagine the crowd's reaction; after describing it briefly, we kept as quiet as possible and let the audience hear the crowd tear its lungs out.

Another important consideration is your own willingness to take chances. You must consider yourself last and the show first. If you're afraid of flying, if you don't like fast automobile rides, you have no place in radio. I can cite numerous cases where it was a matter of risking my neck or missing the broadcast.

At the Yale-Harvard crew races this spring, for example, I did most of the broadcast from the top of our mobile unit, which in turn was atop a flat-car on a train doing a nice clip. And me with nothing to hold onto but words.

Much has been said and written about the accuracy of the sports broadcaster. Personally, I believe that sportscasters are no better or worse than the average reporter. I remember the time I was doing an auto race several years ago at the newly opened Roosevelt Raceway at Mineola, Long Island. Material had been gathered for weeks in advance, and the favorite in the race was the late Floyd Roberts, killed in the Memorial Day races at Indianapolis this year.

A bright-red car seemed to be trying to defy the law of gravity in circling the track; by referring to my charts I knew it belonged to Roberts. So I told my listeners what a daring ride Roberts was giving. "I'm doing all right, ain't I?" It was Roberts, there at my elbow. He had turned the car over to his mechanic after one of his trips to the pit for fuel and was relaxing for a moment. He always kidded me about it at later meetings.

In broadcasting sports you must be absolutely impartial, letting none of your own preference creep into your work, for you are reaching a partisan

audience. And don't be flippant. Audiences resent it. At a recent Harvard-Yale football game I commented on the water wagon the Harvard team possessed and said it was nothing like the old oaken bucket they used down South. Letters from southerners who felt it was a reflection on their economic straits flooded me.

Most important is the ability to ad-lib. I mean the ability to extemporize on the air as though you were reading from a script. This ability is the real difference between a fair announcer and a good one. Its importance will become more evident with the advance of television. In sports, where delays may occur at any time—times-out, injuries, etc.—you've got to ad lib.

THE final requisite is the ability to think clearly, quickly, intelligently, no matter what the circumstances. Decisions must be made on the spur of the moment—seconds count—while you're broadcasting. At Lincoln, Nebr., we were describing the quarter-mile championship event for the National A. A. U. title. We had fifty-one seconds before we had to be off the air. The race took 48 3/10 seconds. As the runners hit the finish line we called first, second, third and gave the unofficial time, then said, "This has come to you from the National Broadcasting Company." No race ever finished more on schedule than that one did. Had it been a close finish, we would have had to hang onto the air until we had made certain of the winners, for NBC has an unwritten rule—never start something you can't finish.

And that's as good a place to end up as any—never start something you can't finish.



YOUNG MAN WITH A BAND

had an insatiable musical curiosity, which led him to the discovery of "serious" music. He went to concerts and was raised to a new pitch of excitement when he realized what could be done with his instrument.

But the necessity for earning money kept him bound to dance-bands. He played with summer-resort bands, theater bands, hotel and night-club orchestras. At nineteen he was an accomplished instrumentalist. Other musicians came to hear him. There was no lack of jobs, for him. Bandleaders bid against each other for his services and he became a "premium" man. Not caring for the rigors of travel, he joined the staff of a radio station, but after a year of this became a free-lancer, earning several hundred dollars a week by playing in various network and transcription bands.

When swing came in, a top-ranking bandleader signed him to an attractive contract. Although a feature attraction of the band, he was entirely indifferent to the fame that came his way. Then one day a representative from one of the alert agencies suggested that he go into the band business. Oddly enough, he found the instrumentalist reluctant. The headaches involved were far from appealing. Besides, he wasn't happy unless he really was playing. However, he was won over. Immediately the various departments of the agency went into action. Backing for the venture was plentiful and the instrumental-

ist was given a free hand in the selection of his musicians. A band was built around him, complete to orchestrators, arrangers, and vocalists. The publicity mill began to grind. He was sold on the strength of his exceptional musical ability.

The bandleader of today, regardless of his classification, is a supreme egoist where his own band is concerned. Nevertheless, he respects the capabilities of other bands. Musicians first and last may be somewhat eccentric, but they have a definite respect for each other. They speak a common language—music. It is for that reason that, after finishing their evening's work, they will go elsewhere to listen to outstanding musicians. Being called a musician's musician is praise of the highest order.

On the whole, the bandleader is a personable fellow. He entertains freely, drinks only moderately, and generously supports one or more service-worn musicians. He is happily untroubled by the world's ills and only vaguely is aware of what is happening outside of musical circles. Adrift from his fellow musicians, he is shy, taciturn, ill at ease, and avoids the spotlight as much as possible. He rarely attends Broadway first-night affairs, but will always turn out for another bandsman's opening. The spirit of camaraderie is strong in him. His worst vice is gambling, in a mild way. He plays the horses but never plunges. He rarely figures in scandals and his private life is a quiet, dull one. His greatest aspiration is to settle down on a farm in New Jersey.
