



PERSISTENCE, MR. OBOLER ?

[From Suzanne Warner's interview with Arch Oboler supplied by Ray Stanich]

On the same day and at the same hospital were Mrs. Phil Harris was giving birth to a baby girl, Eleanor Oboler was giving birth to a boy. Outside in the hall Arch and Phil paced the expectant father's corridor together.

A normal reaction for the man who said, "I have to read when I eat ...[or] my food

won't digest unless I do."

But eating when he read was not Arch's only special habit. Moselle, one of Arch's secretaries, gave another when she said:

"When we hear a stirring patriotic number coming from the automatic phonograph Mr. O keeps beside his dictaphone, we know he is working on one of his TO BE PRESIDENT plays. The sinister ghost music from Mozart's "Don Giovanni" tells us he is working on LIGHTS OUT. other afternoon we heard Grieg's "Butterfly," and rushed in to see if we were starting a new series, but it was only a sequence from one of his screen plays introducing a panty-waist sort of guy who was flitting about trying to find someone with 'pull' who could keep him from going to war."

Another special habit of Arch Oboler was his working habits when the plot of one of his plays became "tied up into an almost impossible knot." He would leap into the front seat of his car and with a secretary by his side he would drive

and drive and drive.

The big problems with Arch's driving spells was when they came at night. His secretary would have to take notes in shorthand in the dark !

Anyone who could have created the LIGHTS OUT stories that Arch Oboler did was not going to let a little thing like no light stop his flow of creativity. First they tried the dashboard light, but it was too dim. Next they hung a flashlight from the [Continued on page 9]

roof, but as it swung back and forth with the motion of the car so did the light it gave off. With persistence, Arch had an elecrtic pencil made. It was a pencil that carried its own light. It may have looked like "an inventor's nightmare," but it worked!

Arch Oboler's ideas came from his own experiences and that ment he had to sometimes go in search of ideas. One such time was on his honeymoon. When Arch married Eleanor they went on a tour of all the haunted houses in New England!

But no matter how strange Arch's SPECIAL writing habits might seem, one can not forget that the result of those habits was a lot of great writing. There is no doubt that Arch Oboler knew how to write a good RADIO play. So when he was asked how one went about getting into RADIO his answer was that of an expert.

"Persistence!" was Arch's answer. "Persistence must be coupled with talent. If you are any good at all at what you want to do, here is the place for the very necessary little demon of persistency to start his operation...the continual pounding and beating at doors and other people that will, blitzkriegs permitting, get you the measure of success that your ability or your personality warrants."
