

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SARNOFF TELLS OF RCA PLANS FOR TELEVISION

Quite Possible to Gather the Morning Paper From the Radio Rather Than From the Porch

(New York Correspondence)

Members of the New York Advertising Club, who listened to an address recently, by David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America, are certain that not only is television just around the corner, but just around the same corner, a lot of other little things to change our daily lives, may be lurking—among others, an invention that will permit us to go to our radio in the morning, for a copy of the latest news, instead of to the front porch. Another possibility unfolded was the harnessing of static to provide electrical energy.

Mr. Sarnoff announced that the RCA had already secured a license to develop the new discoveries into a nation-wide transmission system, and it has long been known that both the RCA and General Electric have been making rapid strides in their television experiments. It is considered now, that the plans of RCA, in the light of this announcement, include the development of a transmission system wherein these new discoveries can be put to use.

It is realized that it is just a step from television broadcasting of entertainment, to the televising of news dispatches, and there is no secret about the development of a device by which the home owner can get his morning newspaper by radio. Just goes to the radio set in the morning, and takes out the televised facsimile sheets, thus getting his news hours ahead of the present slow-by-comparison process that includes printing and hand-delivery methods.

Newspaper publishers, it is said, have been keeping close watch of the scientific angle—which many believe accounts for the great zeal of the papers in defending their prerogatives as news dispensers from the encroachments of the broadcasting stations. Radio and newspaper executives both agree that television may entirely revolutionize the newspaper industry beyond recognition during the next few years.

Italy Has Extensive Plans for Broadcasting

Schools to Be Equipped With One-Frequency Receiving Sets

(Rome Correspondence)

The Italian government is manifesting a great deal of interest of late in the nation's radio facilities and is lending the heartiest cooperation to the E. I. R. A., in improving the national system. Receiving sets have been installed in all public schools, the sets having been furnished by the government at a very low cost. To insure that they will not be used for purposes other than educational, reception will be possible on one frequency only. Also experimental television transmissions are expected to begin shortly from stations in Turin, where the headquarters of the E. I. R. A. are situated. The E. I. R. A. hopes in the near future to conduct regular television transmissions. Besides this advancement in new fields, the present system is being enhanced by a special cable being laid under the straits of Messina, in order to link up Palermo with the other Italian stations. The Bolzano transmitters, in the extreme north, were recently connected by cable with Turin, and with the completion of the cable to Palermo, a complete national hookup will be realized.

After three consecutive years on the air, with two of broadcasting's most popular serials, Pepsodent has put on its third program—a thrice-a-week broadcast by Eddie Duchin's Orchestra, over an NBC network. All of which makes Pepsodent the leading air advertiser. A competitor, however, Campana, with its First Nighter and Grand Hotel serials, besides occasional orchestra broadcasts, is threatening the Pepsodent supremacy.

Speaking of Amos 'n' Andy and the Goldbergs, it is interesting to note that Dean Fossler, a Chicago organist, who has provided the theme music for these two broadcasts, devotes his talents exclusively to Toselli's Serenade and The Perfect Song, never has seen either Amos 'n' Andy or the Goldbergs broadcast. In the NBC Chicago studios he takes the air from a different studio from the one in which Amos 'n' Andy perform, and the Goldbergs face the microphone in New York, half way across the continent.

Playing four times a day for Amos 'n' Andy—before and after each broadcast—including the repeat performance for western listeners—and twice for the Goldbergs, Fossler estimates that he has played the tunes nearly 2,500 times.

But that doesn't mean that the two selections are all that Fossler can play. Before he began providing the introduction and closing on the Pepsodent programs, Fossler was for seven years a theatre organist in Chicago. He was associated with the famous radio organist, Jesse Crawford, seven or eight years ago at the Chicago theatre and played the dual organ with him there.

GOVERNMENT MAY DISBAND F. R. C.

(Washington Correspondence)

Those who claim to be in on the know, here—in other words in close touch with administration circles—declare that the Federal Radio Commission will soon be a memory. According to the information that is going around, radio will become an adjunct to the bureau of communication, which in turn will be affiliated with a new department of transportation or made into a part of one of the existing departments.

As a part of the story, the old bugaboo of the strife between radio and the newspapers, has been brought in—to the effect that the new radio authority will be much more favorable to the papers and that broadcasting stations will then be asked to stick to their business of broadcasting and the newspapers allowed to look after theirs of providing the news to the people of the nation.

Radio Sponsors Turn to Grand Opera

The American Tobacco Co. (Lucky Strike) loves to pioneer. Remember back not so long ago when the stentorian tones of Ed Thorgesen announced the dance music of B. A. Rolfe, or the then famous Lucky Strike dance hour? Young Mr. Hill, scion of the tobacco millions, entered into his work with a great deal of gusto and enthusiasm; Walter Winchell's gossip, Detective Barry Rudd and lastly, Baron Pearl himself, followed in order and contributed their bit and a change of pace in the program. But now a new deal is on at the tobacco company, which has essayed the pretentious task of sponsoring around three hours of broadcast direct from the elite Metropolitan itself, in Radio City. Not one of the NBC networks, mind you; the combined facilities of both the Blue and the Red chains, and all supplementaries, are tied to the microphones at the Metropolitan for several hours. Some money involved in all that.

The whole Metropolitan affair was done up with decorum and éclat. The staid and distinguished voice of Milton Cross conveyed the story of the opera with all of the descriptive highlights. Floyd Gibbons or Ted Husing wouldn't have fitted in on this program as there was an abundance of time for all there was to say and fast talking wouldn't have been in keeping with the occasion. When Cross was through, John B. Kennedy carried on. He added lights even higher than his predecessor; in fact he added punch to the story, highlights and otherwise. The commenting was excellent and the opera itself was, of course, marvelous. Altogether it undoubtedly went over big in the homes of the land and all hands, including particularly the sponsors who laid the money on the line should be given credit for an event certain to enhance the prestige of radio broadcasting generally.

Canada hooked in on the network, but not as a sponsored feature, mind you, because there is no such thing up there (on the national chain). In fact the Canadian Commission was so zealous to see that none of the Lucky Strike blurb got into the land of the Maple Leaf that they took no chances and pulled the plug as soon as the music stopped. And they undoubtedly have since heard plenty about this from the Canadian listeners, many writing in to ask why they should be deprived of the excellent description and story of the opera that was dished up between the main events. One Canadian paper went so far as to suggest that the commission broadcast the information during the regular evening news broadcast, as long as they couldn't see their way to let it come in via the Metropolitan.

The tobacco company, however, is not alone in the thought that the public might possibly be interested in some music of the better class. The Cadillac Motor Car Co., it seems, was similarly minded, although it is operating along two different lines. The company has inaugurated a series of Sunday evening broadcasts of one hour each, when high-class symphony music by specially formed orchestra has been broadcast, under the baton of world famous guest conductors. Its personnel of sixty members was selected from among the leading symphony players of the country. Among the conductors to wield the baton over this selective aggregation were Bruno Walter of the New York Philharmonic, Arthur Bodanzky of the Metropolitan Opera Company, Eugene Ormandy of the Minneapolis Symphony, Fritz Reiner of the Rochester Symphony, Ossip Gabrilowitsch of the Detroit Symphony, Tullio Serafin of the Metropolitan, Sir Henry Wood of London and Walter Damrosch of New York City. Quite an array of notables, but the list of guest instrumentalists and soloists are equally imposing. Those include Yehudi Menuhin and Efrem Zimbalist, violinists; Josef Hofmann, Jose Iturbi and Vladimir Horowitz, pianists; and as vocalists, Rosa Ponselle, Lily Pons, Lucrezia Bori, Lotte Lehmann, Elisabeth Rethberg, Tito Schipa and Richard Bonelli. Thus this series of splendid concerts as well as the more pretentious Lucky Strike-Metropolitan broadcast and both following the fifteen minute programs broadcast by Leopold Stokowski, over Columbia, has caused many observers to believe that radio has many better things in store for those who love better music.

The story of Lily Pons, who is one of the key figures in the Metropolitan setup, and whose voice will be heard frequently during the broadcast, is interesting. Her voice, the range of which astounded critics three years ago when she slipped unheralded onto the Metropolitan stage, has since become the most applauded voice of the age. Which brings to mind the thought that no matter what past years have produced in the way of outstanding ability, succeeding years give us other outstanding men and women with talents to equal or even surpass the great ones of the past. Miss Pons can sing with ease from middle C in the lower register to A above high C. The famous singers of other days, such as Patti, Melba and Sembrich, never went above a high F in public. And yet Miss Pons, who weighs only 101 pounds can sing higher than any other living opera singer.

Then Carl and Phil dissolved and each had his own dance band; Carl stayed (and is still playing) on the Pacific Coast, but Phil, his troupe of dance bands and his blues vocalist de luxe, Leah Ray, hit out for the high places, New York and other points. The rest is current history. It goes easy for the bass drawler now—ensconced in one of the country's most fashionable hotels, with his contract recently extended, a sponsor on the radio and his dance band, his blues vocalist and his own bass drawing all the rage. Thus is he sitting on top of the world, so to speak. Phil, a westerner, loves his horses and the picture shows Miss Ray and Harris with their mounts, also Harris in riding costume. Another Westerner, Frank Parker of the Revelers and the Chevrolet program, also craves the out-of-doors recreation. Parker (below) among other athletes, has acquired a reputation as a polo player.

The winter has been a bad one—breaking family ties, dividing radio teams. Matrimony has just had to slip in, in both the NBC and CBS studios. In the National it was one of the Pickens sisters and in Columbia, mother gave daughter away in a mile church wedding. Who—you would never guess. The mother, Myrt, (Mrs. Myrtle Vail) and the daughter and bride Marge, her radio partner (Miss Donna Damerel). The groom (also identified with radio) was Gene Kretzinger, of the team of Gene and Charley. But don't worry folks—the show will go on—the Pickens Harmonizers and the Myrt-Marge series.

Germans Plan New Stations

Pretentious Program Is Announced

(Berlin Correspondence)

The postoffice department has announced a rather pretentious program for the improvement of its broadcasting system during the coming year. It includes the new national transmitter, with a power of 150kW, which is to take the place of the present Deutschland-sender, and new relay station (to be synchronized on the Frankfurt common wave) to be erected at Koblenz. The present relay stations at Dresden, Konigsberg and Stettin will be replaced by new ones. In addition, the power of the present 60-kW Langenberg and Heilsberg transmitters is to be increased to 100 kW.

Apart from the program, however, the most important of present developments, is the complete re-grouping of the transmitters. Stations all over Germany have been synchronized in groups.

ENGLISH GIRL MAKES HIT AS IMPERSONATOR

Many radio listeners have been clamoring for the return of Florence Desmond, impersonator de luxe, ever since her single guest performance several months ago. Her uncanny ability to impersonate all the stars of the silver screen brought her to the attention of motion picture officials, when she appeared at the Embassy Club in New York. Previously she had been brought here from England where her phonograph records impersonating Greta Garbo, Zasu Pitts, Mae West and others, were "best sellers." Radio audiences had the pleasure of hearing her a second time when she appeared on the air recently with the Ipana Troubadours over NBC. It was her engagement with Eddie Cantor in his personal tour of motion picture theaters that prolonged her stay in this country and made it possible for the Troubadours to sign her for their program. Miss Desmond plans to return to England when her engagement with Cantor is finished.

The Federal Radio Commission has denied WJBK, Detroit, permission to operate full time. The station shares time with WIBM, of Jackson, Mich, at night and operates simultaneously with WIRM in daytime.

Several stations that have been granted permission by the Federal Radio Commission to move the location of their transmitters are: KYW from Chicago to Philadelphia, KFIW from Hopkinsville to Louisville, Ky., KBTM from Paducah to Jonesboro, Ark., WENC from Atlanta, Ga., WJJG from Mooseheart to Chicago and WMBR from Tampa to Jacksonville. In Canada CKCH has moved from Waterloo to Kitchener, Ont., and CKPC from Preston to Brantford, Ont.

KFZ is used to broadcast the regular Saturday night programs of the expedition and will be called into use for description of any significant event in connection with the expedition's work.

F.R.C. Opens New Channels

Broadcasting Will Be Permitted

(Washington Correspondence)

The Federal Radio Commission has made arrangements for the clearing of all services occupying the channels between 1,500 and 1,600 kilocycles to other parts of the frequency range, and is prepared to issue temporary experimental licenses on three new channels with 20 kilocycle separation: 1,530, 1,550 and 1,570. The commission has announced that it is ready to issue licenses just as soon as applicants can meet the conditions necessary for qualification. All stations must have the supervision of a qualified research engineer and while the stations will be allowed the use of sponsored programs, the sponsorship must not interfere with the general experimental work of the station. The power must not exceed 10kW.

It will be recalled that the use of these bands for broadcasting was decided upon at the Mexico City conference, and the announcement of the commission seems to indicate its intention to open the new bands up to broadcasting after some experimental broadcasting has been done.

New Zealand Pays For Radio Stations

(Wellington Correspondence)

The government has bought three of the best known Class B stations, IZR of Auckland, 2ZW of Wellington and 3ZC of Christchurch. This was done because of criticism to the effect that the B stations have been so ringed around with governmental restrictions as to virtually cause their death. As a result the government felt a moral obligation to these stations, though they were no longer necessary. They will be used to transmit alternative programs to the YA stations. The government is adamant on the question of sponsored programs, so the B stations will doubtless gradually fade away. The New Zealand Postmaster General has stated that the government is adopting the attitude of the BBC of England, with regard to sponsored programs.

Stations that are no longer on the air are: WRNY and WQAO, New York, WLCI, Ithaca, N. Y., WTAD, Quincy, Ill., CFC, Toronto and CHMA, Edmonton.

* * *

Canada has invaded the new air territory opened up at the Mexican Conference—channels 150 to 160. A recent order has moved both Kingston and Kitchener, Ontario from channel 150 to 151. Canada, however, has for some time utilized the 54 channel, which is one step away from the recognized band of 55 to 150. The Federal Radio Commission has signified its willingness to license experimental broadcasters in the new 150-160 territory under certain conditions.

* * *

Several small stations in Canada that were formerly amateur broadcasting units controlled by associations, have now become full-fledged broadcasting stations under the new regime. Among these were Trail, B.C., formerly 10-AT, now CJAT and Prince Albert, Sask., formerly 10-BI and now CKBI.

* * *

The American Broadcasting Corporation of Kentucky, owner of WLAP, Louisville, has applied for a construction permit to move its station from Louisville to a location to be determined in Lexington. They also applied for permission to change frequency from channel 120 to 142.

The commission has granted permission to the following stations to change call letters: WFOX to WVFW, WCOD to WKBO, WFTW to WAVE, KGIZ to KWTO, KOCH to KTUL and WODA to WNEW.

Miss Lee was literally blown into radio fame on a Florida hurricane. She was working in a music store by day and attending a music college by night when a tropical storm struck the southern coast.

The radio station over which Miss Lee sang occasionally, was on the air for 72 hours, and her singing during the long stand-by brought many donations for sufferers in the devastated region and a wide reputation for the artist.

Since then she has traveled far. Chosen as Miss Radio at the Radio World's Fair in 1931, she has since been featured on many outstanding programs. She also has appeared extensively in vaudeville and her deep contralto voice has been heard with leading dance orchestras.

NORWAY BROADCASTING PLANS

Three new broadcasting station transmitters are expected to go into operation in Norway during 1934. The 20-kW Trondheim transmitter will be ready in April, the 20-kW station at Bergen in midsummer and the 10-kW Vardo transmitter is expected to be ready for dedication early in the spring.

Border Stations Have Appeal

Announcers Assume Intimate Attitude

(San Antonio Correspondence)

Mexican border stations are coming in for two things. They are coming in for their share of American dial twisting, which is most important to the stations themselves and no doubt to all concerned. Also they are coming in for a fair amount of criticism from certain circles because of merchandising methods and because of their proximity on the dial to many important American stations. So far it seems that the criticism does not do them any harm, and manifestly, the increasing American audience does them no harm either.

There are four important stations now operating on the border adjacent to Texas. These powerful stations varying from 10,000 to 150,000 watts and broadcasting on frequencies from 585 to 1115 kilocycles, are well distributed over the dial.

Each is manned by efficient personnel, broadcasting programs pitched to reach the masses. The continuity is clever, entertaining. If it is subtle in its sales talk, that is no drawback to most loudspeaker fans. The average listener does not mind advertising in psychological doses, but he is apt to leave a cozy chair to tune out a five minute barrage on the merits of any commodity. The announcers assume an intimate attitude which is liked by the average listener.

The author of the song hit is Miss Mary Loos, a fellow townswoman of the radio star and a believer in things spiritualistic. She confided to Porterfield that not only was the song written during a visit to a spiritualistic medium, but that she through the medium was unknown at the time. She said the medium, when first visited by Miss Loos, informed her that she was soon to become famous and requested that she bring pencil and paper on her next visit. With Miss Loos, through the medium, in touch with the unknown was the song born.

The spiritualist clicked 100 per cent when Miss Loos took the song to the publisher the medium suggested and it has clicked the same for Porterfield over the air. The gear of this program to reach the bulk of listeners, coupled with the channels and the power which they possess makes these border stations a real factor in American broadcasting.

Canada Radio Law May Be Changed

(Ottawa Correspondence)

The fact that the Act Amending the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission Act expires on March 31, 1934, may bring about important changes in the present plan of radio control. Premier Bennett has promised an investigation in the form of a parliamentary inquiry by the committee of the House of Commons. As far as possible, the original committee which recommended nationalization of radio and its operation by a commission will sit on the committee. A report is expected before March 31.

Paris Station Increases Power

The power of the French national station, Radio Paris, will be increased to 150kW during the coming summer. The Eiffel Tower will continue to exist, but will become a medium-wave station.

HIGH-LOW BASSES

All Countries Not in Accord

(London Correspondence)

The much discussed Lucerne plan with its wavelengths allotment mutually agreed upon by the nations of Europe, to prevent interference of one broadcasting station with another, went into operation at midnight January 15, as per schedule. What the result will be, just how far tedious months of figuring and scheming on the part of the delegates from each country, will go toward meeting the insistent demands of broadcasters, for more and more room on the air, remains to be seen. It is the third and most complete plan worked out since 1925, for the co-ordinating of wavelengths in England and on the continent.

These two pages dealing with the four great transcontinental broadcasting networks that cover North America, are published in order to give the listener a better understanding of the source of his entertainment and how it reaches him; also to make clear the use of the program schedules.


An overwhelming majority of interest in radio entertainment generally, is of course in the so-called network programs, which may be produced anywhere, but generally are released from key station studios in New York or Chicago. Thus, from one small studio, a single broadcast is heard by countless millions, in many different time zones. While the program is produced and heard at a given time in New York, it is heard simultaneously in San Francisco, yet some three hours earlier as far as clock reading goes.

The time zone map of the networks on these pages, make clear why programs are received at various hours in different time zones, and also makes clear the zone location of any station from which the program may be coming. The com-


plete station list of each chain is given, from which may be dialed the nearest station of the chain from which the program is desired. It should be remembered, however, that member stations do not take every release; if one does not carry the program you desire, try another.

One condition in broadcasting incidental to many popular programs is very confusing to the average listener—split networks. Amos 'n' Andy is one of these. In this particular case Eastern listeners complained that the program was on the air too late; at the same time Pacific Coast listeners complained that it was coming too early. Thus it became necessary to broadcast the program at a suitable time for the Eastern part of the country and to re-broadcast it later for Western listeners.

Both National and Columbia maintain separate Pacific Coast networks. On account of the great distance and consequent difference in time, these stations operate several hours after Eastern stations have closed down for the night.



This is the complete network of the National Broadcasting Company. It will be noticed the Blue and Red chains run parallel. The Orange chain spans the Pacific Coast, and this circuit, when not producing its own programs, takes either the Blue or Red releases, as does the intervening supplementary networks.



The Columbia is a single network system consisting of basic and supplementary chains; also three distinct subsidiary units: the Don Lee on the Pacific Coast, the Dixie in the South and the Yankee in New England. Each of these produce a part of their own programs.

This is a complete list of all chain stations in North America. The three transcontinental networks are presented below, with the auxiliary chains of both NBC and CBS. At the right all stations are arranged in numerical order by kilocycles, with an abbreviation showing chain affiliation.

Afternoon PROGRAMS (Eastern):

Let These Pages Help You Find
the Programs You Will Enjoy

Because most of the interest in radio programs is in the transcontinental features, attention is paid in these pages only to these releases. An orchestra begins to play in New York City; far away in another time zone, you listen to the music. You hear it regularly each day until you come to fix in your mind a certain hour; yet others are listening in other zones at a different time, and both are still different from the time in the studio where the orchestra is playing. Yet the music that is going across the continent is going on the air at precisely the same second and the answer to this is the changes in standard time that have a great deal to do with radio programs. Time-zone network maps are published frequently in this magazine, showing the time changes that occur, while program time (for the Evening programs that go across the continent) are given in each of the five zones.

Just as the day begins first in the East, so do the first programs appear. On this page are listed the afternoon chain releases, from noon to six in the evening (Eastern time). A few of these programs go across the continent but in the main it is too early for Coast-to-Coast releases. Following these are the Evening Programs, listed on the following double page. Practically this is the entertainment guide of the nation, and the programs listed include radio's most important. From six in the evening until midnight (Eastern Time) all releases on four networks are shown, the majority of which go from Coast to Coast. The period, however, is a little too early for the Pacific Coast (three in the afternoon to nine in the evening). So on the following page the Pacific Coast networks are shown — from four in the afternoon to midnight (seven to three in the morning Eastern time). While these schedules over-

lap the Evening Program schedules, the Coast networks do not carry all of the Eastern releases, supplanting a part of them with their own attractions.

All three schedules are based on 15-minute periods — four to the hour. Three simultaneous releases are listed, one for Columbia and two for NBC (the Blue and Red in the East; the Orange and Gold in the West). The Evening Program schedule includes a fourth network — the Canadian chain. This schedule also gives, where possible, the point of origination of each program, and the zones covered. NBC has but one chain on the Coast (the Orange) but a second program schedule is maintained alternately by the two San Francisco key stations, KGO and KPO, the one broadcasting singly while the other heads the chain on which are carried either Coast NBC programs or Eastern Blue and Red releases.



This page is a complete table of distances as well as map of North America, Central America, and the northern portion of South America. It is entirely graduated by 500-mile distances with both squares and circles indicated. From Reykjavik or Anchorage on the north to Quito on the south; from St. Johns, Newfoundland to the coast cities of the Pacific, the reader at a glance may determine the distance to the station to which he is listening by a rapid calculation of the squares or circles on the map. Its rapidity and handiness is easily apparent, although, of course, the results can be only approximated. The distances actually coincide with figures on distance charts, which, though more accurate, are not so easily ascertained


No. 1: United States-Canada Distances

This table contains the changes in time, in plainly marked figures, that take place as the time zones of the earth are traversed, and is designed for instant reckoning of time as given in another zone. In this chart, it will be noticed that Greenwich meridian, from whence standard time is reckoned, is in the center and the International Date Line is on either side. While identical in principle and operation with the time zone map, it affords easier reckoning. M indicates noon and MN midnight; the AM figures (from midnight to noon) are printed in lightface type, while the PM figures are dark. The degree figures at the top indicate the meridian while the plus and minus figures (at the bottom) show the hours to be added to or taken from Greenwich time.

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
