ONE MAN'S FAMILY

Several members have requested that shows from One Man's Family be placed in the rental library. (Many others have stated that they are not interested in the show.) After much deliberation, the officers decided to place the show into the library. However, because the shows are continuing episodes, it does not seem logical to place only one reel in the library. Therefore, an extended run has been included. Rather than extending the run over two months, all ten reels have been added this month. Even though you may not like One Man's Family, serious collectors should have this show in their collection because of the impact the show had in radio as witnessed by its lengthy run.

RADIO STAR AND WRITER GOODMAN ACE DIES

Goodman Ace, one of Americas best-known comedy writers is dead, at the age of 83. He died at home in his sleep. Ace and his wife Jane are best remembered for their dialogue and comments on a show called "Easy Aces" which ran for almost 20 years.

After starting his radio career on KMBC, a Kansas City radio station, for \$10 a week, he was asked to fill in for a 15 minute act that did not show. and his wife began a dialogue about current events and with the help of his wife Jane who's off the wall remarks such as "time wounds all heals" and "home wasn't built in a day" soon lead to a contract with CBS in Chicago.

Ace used a special table with a hidden microphone to put his guests at ease. Soon he was up to \$500 a week and national recognition. The show ended after Ace and his long time sponsor Anacin had a difference of opinion in 1944.

Ace then wrote scripts for great comedians such as Danny Kaye, Milton Berle, Sid Caeser and Bob Newhart. He also had several books he had written including "The Book of Oklahoma City" and "The Better of Goodman Ace." His wife Jane died in 1974.

MY INFATUATION WITH "I LOVE A MYSTERY" AND ANYTHING RESEMBLING IT

A number of years ago, John Dunning began serializing a series called "Chandu." Each morning I listened to the further adventures of Chandu as he magically tantalized me with his daring-do adventures and demonstrations of exotic powers. At the time I began to record the 15 minute episodes on my tape recorder while I listened to the show driving to work. I must have listened to nearly every episode—and I invited the students who rode with me to listen, too. They soon learned that it was time to quiet down whenever the weird organ music sounded the program's beginning. Most of the students thoroughly enjoyed it and were reluctant to ever miss school!

The best part about the serial was the experience of listening to it for the first time, thanks to someone who happened to tape it many years ago. Before long I missed one episode--I think there was a power shortage which fouled up my timer so that I missed the program--and so I looked for a source from which to buy the missing episode. To my amazement there were a number of fine sources. By purchasing it I could be sure to have the complete story, although I was careful not to listen to it before the episode was aired! John also played a number of "Adventures by Morse" and since I enjoyed them, I also bought a complete set of those programs.

Recently I came across a column in an old radio magazine that made me think of the feeling I had felt at hearing programs for the first time:

Jumping back into the ether with the same verve as of old is Carlton E. Morse's "I Love a Mystery" adventure series heard Monday through Friday. Once again the fictional Rover Boys, "Jack" (Russell Thorson), "Doc" (Jim Bowles), and "Reggie" (Tony Randall) find themselves in tumultuous happenings that concern weird surroundings, fearful characters and even spicy-tongued girls. Last week the gentlemen of fortune became involved in a series morbidly titled "Bury Your Dead, Arizona." So far, the "fellers" (as quaintly called in a manner most indiscreet . . . via the greight train.

After huffing and puffing their way aboard a moving box-car, the boys were jolted by a voice in the night . . . female and barb-tongued. As would be expected, they are not alone in their flight, for lodged in the same quarters are two more travelers "Nasha" who wants to knife the intruders, and her companion, "The Maestro," who informs "Nasha" that if she dares draw the blade, he personally will give her a thrashing.

The relationship between outspoken "Nasha" (done by the versatile McCambridge in a Russianish dialect) and her reprimanding comrade is a bit mystifying to the naive "Doc," who just cannot figure out how the pair have lived together for two years without being married. But, undoubtedly, more will come of this affair risque later in the serial. Right now they're riding the rails to Arizona, and if the venture pattern fits the gruesome title, dialers can guess what'll happen next.

It isn't my purpose to tell how this adventure turns out--although I can hardly hold myself back because of the interest I feel about explaining the strange transformations "Nasha" undergoes under the powers of "The Maestro" in becoming a wolf and her ability to go floating out in space--but I think it illustrates how well these old programs have held up.

A note or two tells us how Carlton E. Morse was able to whet the appetite of listeners when the serials were first aired. Apparently he arrived at his small office (often referred to as his cubicle) in the heart of Hollywood early in the morning, every day of the week. He worked on "I Love a Mystery" five days a week, wrote his "One Man's Family" on the remaining two days, and thus kept the former some ten days in advance, penning the latter from week to week. By arriving at 6:30 a.m. he was able to write his daily episode of "I Love a Mystery" by 9:15 a.m. and then take time out for a cup of coffee and a doughnut.

I was interested in the description I found of his cluttered by adequate office:

His office walls bear framed certificates of merit awarded his shows, autographed photos of his programs' cast members, a lovely portrait of his wife, and a banner from San Francisco's Bohemian Club. On the shelves above a long table heaped with bound volumes and mammoth scrapbooks are the impressive gold trophies his airshows have been awarded and the neatly-bound copies of the vast number of scripts he has penned since his "One Man's Family" and "Mystery" programs took to the airwaves. By November of 1944 there were one hundred and sixteen volumes with an average of 90,000 words in each volume. Seated at his typewriter, Morse has a globe of the world at his right hand, a massive dictionary at his left, and reference books of every kind within arm's reach. The latter collection includes a complete set of Encyclopedia Britannica, Roget's Thesaurus, Bartlett's Familiar Quotations, a book of pagan symbols, a History of Heathen Gods (these last two specifically for use as a reference on his "Mystery" scripts), Sunset's Complete Garden Book, Mother and Baby Care in Pictures, the Handbook for Nurses and the Medical Dictionary (the latter group of particular use in following the specialized pursuits of the various members of his famed "Barbour family").

It was one of these scripts that I got from the Printed Materials Library of SPERDVAC that I borrowed that I intended to write about. I'm often asked why I have spent so much time and effort—a little money over the years also—to collect tapes. Besides listening to them myself, I have often used them in conjunction with my teaching assignments. Initially I taped everything on my reel to reel equipment and then recorded the tapes I wanted on cassette. I bought a cassette radio player and enjoyed them on the way to school each morning. Once in a while I found an opportunity to use them in teaching. To teach how to listen, for example, what vehicle is better to use than a "Mystery Theater" show such as "Dracula"? It's neatly packaged in three acts, which allows the teacher to take notes on the blackboard while the program is in progress and then review with the students at the end of an act, or allows the students to compare their notes made while listening for the story line with the teacher's details. Think of the many interesting ideas to further discuss!
