

ABOUT THE COVER

Garnered from the annals of RHAC's crypt, I thought you might enjoy a bit of the past. The newsletter format has not changed drastically with the exception of a redesigned logo and heading. The newsletter of ten years ago were, for the most part, rather brief with an occassional issue being four or five pages.

There have been a number of newsletter editors as well, who have reflected their personalities in a variety of ways. Organizing their personal views about the subject we are most filiar, can and has been an excellent means of generating more than just an interest in OTR.

Support your local newsletter editor by welcoming the newest addition to long line of editors, Dr. Daniel Decker, beginning next month.

Having developed a propensity for sleeping late due to an early morning arrival on January 12th - a luxury he has preferred ever since - Lon Clark came into this world, during a snow-storm, in Bricelyn, Minnesota. His family moved to Frost, Minnesota, a community which included his Norwegian grandfather among its founders.

At the age of six, Lon made his first public appearance as Tom Thumb which gave an indication that the stage was predestined for him. During his school years from childhood through college, Lon was very active in plays, musicals, elocution, etc. Elocution in high school was marked by two categories - dramatic and humorous. During his junior year in high school he entered both categories and won to the dismay of the school superintendent who asked him to choose one because he wanted two students from the school to be represented at the county contest. He chose humor (no doubt loving laughs more than anguish) and won. The other fellow lost and the superintendent lost favor.

Also during those years Lon sang in every function - church, school, festivities, and was adept at playing the coronet. He switched from the coronet to the saxaphone which was purchased by mailorder (looked more dramatic) and taught himself to play it from six a.m. to 10 p.m., daily in four months. Lon later entered a music contest and won the school township

and county events but only placed second in the Minnesota state contest.

After graduation, Lon worked on a farm by day and a canning factory by night to save enough to hitch-hike to Minneapolis where he enrolled at MacPhaill School of Music and Drama. Within a year he was playing in a dance band and was soloist in Sunday morning church services to help augment funds he was earning running the school elevator to pay tuition and rent. One year later Lon had his own band and was singing over radio station WCCO in Minneapolis.

Having run out of funds, Lon got a job acting in a tent show that toured the provinces. He played in the orchestra, acted in plays and did vaudeville routines between the acts during the summer. In the winter he trouped various colleges playing Johnny in "Holiday" and Ernest in "Importance of Being Ernest" until the show went broke. Lon ended up in Chicago Radio at the time radio in Chicago was hitting full stride. Then on to WLW in Cincinnati on a contract basis.

Still actively studying voice, Lon was engaged by Fausto Cleva for a series of roles in Cincinnati's season of summer opera singing roles with Grace Moore, Leonard Warren, Martinelli, James Welton and others. His debut occured in "Manon" which marked the debut of Dorothy Kirsten. His operatic stint lasted over the course of three summers while at the same time playing hundreds of roles over radio station WLW. Some of the roles included a special night time talk show to Admiral Byrd's crew at the North Pole and the famous midnight poetry program five nights weekly called "Moon River".


In 1940 Lon went to New York with the intentions of going on stage and hopefully "The Met" but, became successful in radio and ended up with a half-dozen contracts he couldn't get out of. He was the announcer for the Kate Smith Show, a contract player on the March of Time on NBC and Report to the Nation on CBS, and various soap operas. He also played various parts on Bulldog Drummond, Inner Sanctum, Fred Allen, etc and was tapped for Nick Carter in 1944 which took up his Sundays for 14 years. In the meantime, he made several guest appearances

in summer theatre.

With the popularity of radio fast waning and television becoming more prominent, Lon did miscellaneous TV shows and onto Broadway's Pulitzer Prize-winning play "Long Day's Journey Into Night" with Frederic March. From that time on he shifted from TV to films to theatre until he was side-lined with a spinal disc problem. While on his back, Lon studied for a broker's exam and became vice-president of a brokerage firm a year before Watergate.

Having quit the brokerage business, Lon accepted a position as administrator of The Episcopal Actors' Guild, an organization that raises funds to assist people of the theatre in distress and headquartered in the historic Little Church Around the Corner in New York. He subsequently accepted a adminicular position with the Screen Actors Guild Motion Pictures Players Welfare Fund which also provides aid to performers in need. Lon is also a member of the nation's most famous theatrical organization, The Players.

We welcome Mr. Lon Clark to Denver and look forward to hearing more from him.
