We are wondering what our members do with the shows they collect. Do you closet yourself in a back room and listen to your tapes or, even worse, maybe just collect them to have them on the shelf and not listen to them?

Maybe we should remind our members that they will get great pleasure from sharing their shows with others. You may even get a few of the young people you work with to think! It may be difficult at first to get their interest, or even other members of the family, but it's like fishing: you can cast a lot of lines before you get one hooked. And it is interesting to see the reactions once hooked.

Our librarians and acquisition volunteers are doing their work for your pleasure and get a warm feeling of sharing as their only reward. I guess that is what makes life worth while.

We have shared our tapes with groups at our local seniors center, with neighbors, and even with our family (although that was the toughest).

I have had several of you ask about the colt we mentioned last month. So, just to bring you up to date, we got a horse trailer and traveled to Lander, Wy. the first day. Next day we spent seven hours on the road bringing the colt home. He is a chestnut with a star and

a partial blaze on the face. He turned out to be a much larger horse than I had remembered. He has been taking good care of me for the past two weeks on the trails. His name is "Dreamer" and he will have a couple of weeks off while we travel through the West for a while and visit Seattle.

We are getting out all of the reel-to-reel shipments before we leave on our trip. But there was one order we could not because the ship ordering tape had not given us enough alternate selections. This happens too frequently with both reels and cassettes: the person ordering tape lists only those tapes he hopes to get and fails to make alternate selections. Then, the librarian may find one or more of the requested tapes have already been checked out and the order ends up be "short" because no alternate selection was made. Moral to the story: it is always helpful and best to give alternate selections with each order!

We have been listening to the new entries in the Contributor's Library as Dick makes the tapes. They have many stories of murder and mystery and many British from the broadcasting industry. most recent tapes we listened to included some of the "heart rendering" trials of Big Sister. I suppose our lives have been very hum-drum compared with lives of these radio characters but we certainly have been happier. We wonder just how happy were the writers of these programs.

#### Van Heflin Tracks Philip Marlowe

Van Heflin is known as a perfectionist among actors (that's how you get academy awards), and in preparation for his radio role as Raymond Chandler's detective. "Philip great Marlowe", he was permitted to investigate the Los Angeles Police Crime Laboratories. Accompanied by his announcer, Wendell Niles, Van was taken under the guidance of police Pinker, chemist Ray discovered how alloys identified dabbled with poison investigated chemical analysis and went along for a police prowl car ride.

Some were just run-of-the-mill calls, like checking on a man removing merchandise from the sidewalk. It turned out to be a merchant closing his store for the night. A fast call to find out about a disturbance in a hotel turned out to be an argument in a "flop hose" between two itinerants as to who should sleep by the window and whether or not it should be open!

The most exciting was a man reported to be holding up a liquor store. The prowl car arrived in time to catch the criminal emerging from the establishment brandishing a gun. The officers driving the car told Van to duck. Refusing to miss any of the excitement, Van and Wendell dashed out of the car with the officers. It turned out that the desperate thief was

armed with a toy gun and gave in readily when he saw the law!

After the ride, Van felt he had gathered plenty of atmosphere for his role. Originator Chandler, character has been brought to the screen in such films as "Murder, My Sweet", "The Big Sleep", "Lady in the Lake" and "Brasher Doubloon", approves heartily of Heflin in the role. "I think the part of Philip Marlowe' couldn't be in the hands of a more capable actor," is the unusual praise handed to Van by the author. Hearing of Van's research into police procedure aid his to Chandler characterization. added, "Judging from the trouble you're taking to know Marlowe -you'll have no trouble in playing him!"

Now Gerald Mohr (formerly "The Lone Wolf") is sleuthing it to beat the band in a series of very entertaining mishaps. The present writers have managed a Sam Spadish touch, throw in some pretty good comedy, and seems always to have a new plot. Refreshing.

AFRA-ite Mohr is a most actor. and the competent dowagers, damsels, evil-doers and big-business types who hinder or hamper "Marlowe's" radio adventures are equally well of the most cast. One entertaining aspects of the show (for local listeners, anyway) lies in the fact that all the stories are set in Los Angeles and its surrounding territory...

We don't mention the airer as a red hot prospect for a radio Nobel, but we do mention it for you who enjoy a well-done mystery on your radio, and who may have missed the old "Marlowe" series.

#### REEL TO REEL INFORMATION

All reels are 7" and are recorded at 3 3/4 IPS, and are recorded on all four tracks except as noted. Each reel contains an index of contents.

1200' reels in stero - 2 hours of shows 1200' reels Mono - 4 hours of shows 1800' reels in Stero - 3 hours of shows

1800' reels Mono - 6 hours of shows

The rental fee is \$1.50 per reel for 30 days. <u>Late or overdue penalties of 1.00 per reel per week will be charged on overdue tapes.</u>

Payment must be received with your order. Make all checks payable to RHAC. You may order up to ten reels at one time when your last order is returned. Please give the RHAC reel number and title of each reel ordered. If you wish to receive the number of tape you have paid for, please include an alternate list of reel numbers so we may fill your order without delay.

#### CARE OF RHAC TAPES

Keep your tape deck heads clean Q-tips dipped in a suitable head cleaner. Keep pinch rollers and capstans regularly with proper rubber cleaner or conditioner (DO NOT USE ALCOHOL TO CLEAN RUBBER PINCH ROLLERS, AS IT WOVEDRY OUT THE RUBBER).

Always rewind the tape onto the club reel and be sure the white leader is on the outside and tied down with masking tape, Please do not use scotch or other plastic tape.

Should there be a problem of any kind, include a note in with the reel that has a problem, describing the problem and location.

The following is a list of rules on care of RHAC tapes...

- As mentioned, rewind tape so that the white leader is on the outside.
- 2. Secure leader with masking tape only.
- 3. Return reel index in the box with the reel, do not write on the index.
- 4. These pre-recorded tapes are for home use, only. And not for commercial or monetary gain.

Remember..these programs are for you to copy and enjoy. Anyone violating the rules of the Library may be refused any future orders.

#### RETURNING TAPES

Please return tapes and boxes in the same carton in which you received them. We have enclosed a return label. Please use only strapping tape to re-seal the cartons. Tapes may be returned to the library at Library Rates, if you do not cover the Library Rate designation on the carton.

is pleased that he's registered with audiences and the author to such a degree. "Philip Marlowe" is his own favorite of the fictional detectives. "He's human," says Mohr. "He's looking for a romance around the corner -- and he knows there's no corner. He remains a romanticist in spite of his being an iconoclast.

After probing the background and hobbies of "detective" Mohr, however, we've decided that he's just as much "Philo Vance" as he is "Marlowe." "Philo," if you recall, was played by William Powell, an actor who resembles Mohr considerably. "Philo" was an art connoisseur -- Mohr paints in his spare time. A realistic actor. Mohr finds that when he puts brush to canvas he becomes a satirist, an impressionist. Like "Philo," Mohr collects rare books, many of which he's discovered by poking through the downtown bookshops. One of his special treasures cost him a mere seventy-five cents. Also, like "Philo," Mohr prefers chess to other games.

Mohr doesn't know what to make of his "Philo Vance" parallel -- he's never read the books written around the intellectual detective. I may seem like 'Vance,'" he grants, "but I think and feel like 'Marlowe."

An ideal type for any down-to-earth hero with a touch of the poetic, Mohr has been heard as "The Lone Wolf" and "Bill Lance," both romantic air detectives. At present he is also heard on "Our Miss Brooks" as "LeBlanc," a romantic

Frenchman. Originally Mohr was scheduled for a single broadcast in the "LeBlanc" role. Listener interest was so intense that the part was written into the show. The actor is also "being hysterical before breakfast" in "Today's Children." He's often heard on "Damon Runyon Theater," usually as a killer. His last screen chore was in "Two Guys From Texas."

Most unusual attribute of the attractive Mr. Mohr is his very resonant voice. Even when he whispers confidentially, his words boom out into the room. "It gets me into trouble," he admits. This "built-in echo chamber" renders the Mohr voice one of the most easily recognizable in radio. Kids on the street, overhearing him speak (and he's very easy to overhear), immediately recognize him as "Marlowe."

His own son, twenty-one-month-old Tony, is too young to have heard his daddy on the air. However, Mohr relates that he awoke one morning to find tiny Tony standing over him with a large butcher knife. He was eying daddy with interest. Mohr disarmed Tony with all the efficiency of a "Philip Marlowe."

### "Adventures of Philip Marlowe"

"Philip Marlowe," KNX, 6:30 p.m., Saturday, is beginning to get us all over again. The program has definitely recaptured the mood and characterizations of Raymond Chandler's original "Marlowe" novels.

Gerald Mohr reads his lines as if he understands the character from the ground up, and the music of Dick Aurandt and his symphony of five interprets the words into melody.

A recent script, "The Smokeout," closed with a short speech by "Marlowe," read so beautifully by Mohr supplied with such an exact mood by Aurandt that we asked for a copy to reprint here. Later we learned from a friend of Aurandt's that the musician had discovered at 1:30 o'clock Saturday morning he had forgotten to write the music for the tag speech. He set to work, feeling very wee-small-hour-ish. what emerged at 3:00 fit Mohr's "Marlowe" speech exactly:

"I had been dog-tired when it started...whipped...fed up with the city and the aimless, milling mob of shallow people, always hungry for a buck that made it move. But now, as I drove through the quiet empty, downtown streets and listened to Frances Hamlin talk about her sister, who had never been anything but nice--I stopped thinking about those money grubbers, and thought instead about the ones like Vera, all the Veras all over the world who sometimes got in trouble because other people won't realize - the world is not for sale. Yeah...the Veras are the ones to keep in mind. (Brighter) And that is when I decided that I was only tired, not whipped...not fed up. All I needed was a good night's sleep. So I went home and got it."

At the basis of the show's overall excellence, of course, are writers Robert Mitchell and Gene Levitt, credited with this particular script. We are grateful to them for a moving half hour.

### Mohr Has a Case of "Marlowe"

As the embodiment of Raymond Chandler's famous private eye, "Philip Marlowe," Gerald Mohr is convinced that he is the possessor of a role to be coveted by any actor.

In his third season as "the detective with a heart," Mohr is especially happy that his creation of "Marlowe" is so close to that which Chandler envisions that the author has given him complete freedom of portrayal.

"Marlowe is different from all other private detectives dotting the airwaves and invading video," Mohr explains, "because, while his profession necessarily brings him in contact with an exciting assortment of adventures, he could be the average guy. I'm stuck on the character because he's the ordinary fellow, not a superman. Were I a listener, I could easily project myself into his personality, and just like the fellow on the other side of the mike, "Marlowe" himself doesn't always come out on top in his adventures. To me, he's a completely plausible creation.

Mohr's characterization of "Marlowe" evidently makes him "live" for his audiences, too. The

dark-haired actor is easily recognizable because of his long career in films, and his smoothly resonant voice is well known to radio listeners. But Mohr himself didn't realize just how closely associated he and "Marlowe" were until a couple of illustrative incidents occurred which he told us about.

One Sunday Mohr was driving to the beach when a belligerent driver kept crossing the lanes in front of him. Finally the two cars came to a stop at a red light and Mohr and his antagonist — a tough-looking character — began to exchange some hot words concerning the right-of-way. A woman in the other car warned the driver: "That's Philip Marlowe.' You'd better not get into a fight with him!"

"Of course," Gerry recalls smilingly, "most people who associate me with the character usually have the opposite reaction. They want me to prove just how tough 'Marlowe' can be and I have a difficult time convincing them that actually 'Marlowe' is a mild-mannered, sympathetic guy, the foil through whom the unsavory characters are projected."

"And to me, that's where the charm lies 'Marlowe' is an amorphous character. He is consistent in his make-up, but adaptable to any situation in which he is placed. He's my ideal of a character!"

In real life, Mohr is a natural for the part of his ideal. He is six feet two inches tall and his dark good looks are just what Chandler could have ordered for the suave gumshoe he has so successfully fictionized. Mohr was raised by his grandfather, a famous psychologist who studied with Freud, and has a decisive interest in science. He is also a collector of crime and mystery fiction. From these two pastimes he has developed a character pattern equally as intriguing as that of his alter ego.

He had a good start on "Marlowe" before he picked up his radio trail three years ago. His mike-side talents were undisputed already an accomplishment and in constant demand on top dramatic airers. Following his success in the title role of Orson Welles's Mercury Theater production of "Jean Christophe" in 1937, Mohr had also gone on to a flourishing screen career that has continued ever since. A role in the film version of "Detective Story" is his latest camera work.

With such successful sorties into radio, screen and stage work, Mohr is looking forward to bringing "Marlowe" to television in the near future.

When he's not at work on "Marlowe" ar enacting roles in top radio and movie dramas, Mohr relaxes on horseback - his favorite sport. He and his wife, Rita, a childhood sweetheart, live in a lovely San Fernando home where they keep a prize horse and "the most wonderful son in four-year-old the world." Marlowe's "Philip Anthony, severest critic."
