

Duplicating Old-Time Radio Shows On A VCR

Yes, you can duplicate your OTR shows on a video recorder using video tape as the tape. Using the extra-long play mode (SLP or ELP) mode, you can get six hours of recording with no flipping of reels and using switches to left and right tracks.

First you must get the proper cables with the proper jacks on the cable ends; connections can vary! Look at the AUDIO OUTPUT jack on your reel recorder. (See drawing on the front cover.) The VCR input jack is the standard RCA jack. Buy a cable at Radio Shack or other electronics store which matches these jacks. You put the RCA plug into the AUDIO IN jack on the VCR. The other end, of course, goes into the reel recorder OUTPUT jack.

So that's it. Start your reel recorder and VCR (set on ELP or SLP.)

To play back the audio you have options (with a remote control yet!): Option 1 Rewind the video tape and play back through your TV using the usual RF cable.

Or

Option 2 Use CABLE A and switch the plug from the AUDIO IN jack to the AUDIO OUT jack on the VCR. You can feed this signal to a separate amplifier or you can feed it into the reel recorder AUDIO INPUT jack. Now set the recorder in the RECORD

position. If your recorder has a speaker enclosed, you'll hear the audio.

If you want to duplicate cassettes, just follow the same directions assuming you have an EARPHONE OUTPUT on the radio/cassette unit. You can play back the sound also though the radio unit if it has a microphone jack. Again set the radio/recorder to RECORD position and sound should be heard. (Some radios are designed so no sound will be heard.)

If your radio has an output jack which says PHONE (HEADPHONES) OUTPUT or SPEAKER OUTPUT (EXTERNAL SPEAKER) you can record any radio shows the same way. Just connect CABLE A into PHONE OUTPUT and feed this into the AUDIO INPUT of your VCR.

Remove all audio cables from the VCR when using it for regular TV use.

Unable to connect with Jim French's KIRO Mystery Playhouse through the URL provided in the July issue of Return with Us Now... I browsed OTR on the trusty computer and found OTRS... OLD TIME RADIO SHOWS. It's produced by Makodon Communications and provides half a dozen shows in RealAudio 5.0 format. Delivered via RealPlayer, it doesn't require those downloads of audio files that seem to take forever.

The shows, updated every Sunday, also offer a bonus - two serials that run Monday through Saturday. This evening I found Bob and Ray and Yours Truly, Johnny Dollar; and as with other OTRS shows the audio quality was comparable to what you might expect with an over-the-air AM signal. A convenient log previews programs to be offered over the next several months.

Programmed in Seattle by Misty Dawn Lane, a lady who reminisces about her northern Idaho roots, OTRS was added to a Web site that was originally developed as a sales and marketing tool. However, Old-Time Radio has since taken over and has become the primary activity on the Internet address. Since

mid-March 30,000 OTR fans from 39 countries have found their way to OLD TIME RADIO SHOWS at

And, by the way, among the web site's extensive list of related links, I found one to the KIRO Mystery Playhouse.

Welcome to the Science Fiction on Radio Bulletin Board System. I want to introduce myself and just why I am moderating this BBS. My name is Jim Widner and I have been involved and around the OTR community for about ten years. I have been a collector for about 25 vears, but was pretty uninvolved for the first 15. I was very active for a time in an Old-Time Radio BBS on Genie years ago, where I first encountered Lou Genco who was also on that board. As the Genie group began to disappear, I was invited by Lou to join the newly formed OTR Digest on the Internet. I came to his digest around issue #9 and immediately re-activated myself among a gradually growing group of on-line enthusiasts.

During the last five years I began work on a book with Meade Frierson

III about Science Fiction on Radio. There were a few X Minus One and Dimension X logs available, but nothing about the whole subject of Science Fiction on Radio. The book was published several years ago appropriately enough under the title "Science Fiction on Radio: A Revised Look at 1950 - 1975." Though the focus was on those years, we also covered SF previous to 1950. I also began a web site within the last few years called Radio Days which tries to provide a soundbite history of broadcast radio during the age of radio drama. At An OTR Convention

Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound Radio Showcase VI, 06/19-20/98 By Stewart Wright

The REPS Showcase VI was my first Old-Time Radio convention. I really didn't know what to expect. Here is my experience.

Let me state this up front. REPS did a FIRST-RATE JOB and put on a great convention! All of their volunteers were very friendly and informative. Special thanks to PEMCO Financial Services, Seattle for making a major financial gift to the Showcase.

The Showcase began on Friday afternoon, June 19th at 3 PM and

continued on Saturday June 20th from 9 AM until 10 PM. The theme of this year's *Showcase* was RADIO FAMILIES. This year, the *REPS Showcase* was held on the Seattle Center grounds, near the Seattle Space Needle. The convention hotel was just across the street from the Seattle Center, only a very short walk from the convention rooms. Downtown Seattle was just a short ride away via Monorail or Metro Transit electric trolleys.

The OTR guests (some of their major credits are in parentheses) included: Harry Bartell (Escape, Gunsmoke, Sherlock Holmes, Fort Laramie, Johnny Dollar), Dick Beals (Lone Ranger, Gunsmoke), Stewart Conway (The Whistler, KIRO Mystery Playhouse), Larry Dobkin (Ellery Queen, Gunsmoke, Philip Marlowe), Sharon Douglas (One Man's Family, Life of Riley), Sam Edwards (One Man's Family, Meet Corliss Archer, Gunsmoke, Fort Laramie), Ray Erlenborn (The Bickersons, Blondie), Barbara Fuller (One Man's Family, Ellery Queen), Page Gilman (One Man's Family), Art Gilmore (Dr. Christian, Lux Radio Theatre), Sandra Gould (Sad Sack, A Date With Judy), Merrill Mael (Vic & Sade, Doctor Kate), Jo Anna March (Second Mrs. Burton), Tyler McVey (One Man's Family, Life of Riley), Norma Jean Nilsson (Blondie, Baby Snooks), Gill Stratton Jr. (Life of Riley, My Little Margie), Ginny Tyler (Jack Benny Show), Janet Waldo (One Man's Family, Meet Corliss Archer, Ozzie and Harriet), Anne Whitfield Phillips (One Man's Family, Phil Harris & Alice Faye Show), Rhoda Williams (Father Knows Best, One Man's Family), and Doug Young (Red Ryder, KIRO Mystery Playhouse.)

There were panels and discussions on: The Gook Family (Vic &

Sade), Harry Bartell Presents Barbara Cook & Art Gilmore, Three Best Radio Family Shows, Three Worst Radio Family Shows, and *One* Man's Family. Ray Erlenborn and Stewart Conway gave a great presentation on Sound Effects.

The radio show recreations were episodes featuring a family theme with at least one original cast member. The recreations included (in order of presentation): Ethel & Albert, Life of Riley, Vic & Sade, The Aldrich Family, Father Knows Best, One Man's Family, Adventures of Ellery Queen, Second Mrs. Burton, Meet Corliss, and Escape. There was a special One Man's Family Reunion with Page Gilman (Jack) and Barbara Fuller (Claudia). They were joined by other actors who appeared on OMF: Sharon Douglas (Greta), Sam Edwards (Tracy), Anne Whittfield Phillips (Penelope), Tyler McVey (Elwood), and Janet Waldo (Irene) for this classic show. They did a completely new script, updated to the present time. Especially interesting was the "cold read" of the Ellery Queen episode. The actors received the scripts right in front of the audience, quickly marked them, and started into a rehearsal.

The highpoint of Friday night was a *Tribute to Parley Baer* hosted by John and Larry Gassman. The Gasmann brothers involved many of the OTR guests in an upbeat, positive look at the work and the person of actor Parley Baer who is recovering from a stroke. A video tape was immediately sent to Parley so he could enjoy it. One of the great stories told during the Tribute involved Parley being stopped by the police in Burley, Idaho late one night while he was looking for — A TRUCKLOAD OF ELEPHANTS!

The Just Sittin' Around and Visiting session on Saturday morning was great fun. All of the OTR guests

were assembled up front in one of the meeting room and they just visited, with some starter questions and audience involvement. Lots of great stories and anecdotes. Hopefully, some of this session will find its way into a future issue or two of *Return With Us Now...*

All of the guest celebrities at the Showcase were very approachable and friendly. During the breaks and Social Hour, there were many chances to talk with them. Several of the OTR guests I talked to had fond memories of coming to Denver for RHAC meeting and/or conventions. I also had plenty of opportunities to meet other convention attendees including a few RHAC members from Seattle and California. Saturday night there was Dinner With The Stars. There were at least two OTR guests at each table during dinner and you had a great chance to converse with them.

Other activities at the convention included a vendor's room (tapes, memorabilia, and such), an auction, and an OTR guest group photo opportunity.

One of the reasons I went to the REPS Showcase was to interview some of the performers for our newsletter, RETURN WITH US NOW... I had made previous arrangements over the phone with Harry Bartell, Janet Waldo, and Sam Edwards. I had also made arrangements to interview Jim French of KIRO Mystery Playhouse Imagination Theatre at his home. I am no journalist and had never conducted an interview; I was more than a little apprehensive. I really didn't need to be. Everyone I interviewed was so friendly, sociable, and helpful.

Now for the obvious question. Am I going to next year's REPS Showcase? I'm already making plans to attend. See you in Seattle!
