
friends around the world. His energy is the envy of many!





A young teen-age acquaintance of mine (who happens also to be my son) saw The Jolson Story on the late, late show the other evening and was intrigued. He was also a little amused.

"I dug it," he squeaked, "but Man! What a put on. Imagine a guy singing a song without a mike and amplifier. Man, nobody would ever hear him. How did he get an 'echo' effect? Where did all the 'watts' come from? Man, what a laugh."

"Son," I answered, "You have just referred to your honorable father as 'Man' thrice. Your punishment shall be a trip to the attic where you shall hear some Jolson recordings that were made without benefit of six hundred watt amplifiers, or a microphone. Come along."

He followed me, rather reluctantly to be sure, to the musty confines of the old attic where lurk the sounds of the past. After seating him in the old rocking chair, I wound up the Vintage Victrola and reached for the Jolson stack of 78's. I pulled out a recording made in 1913 called "Movin' Man, Don't Move My Baby Grand" and gave it a spin.

Soon the musty air of the attic was filled with the voice of a vibrant young man pleading, "--take the coat from the rack, shirt off my back, the dog and the cat, even my hat, but Movin' Man Please Leave My Baby Grand." The sound absorbed into the walls and the younger generation beside me wanted more. Out came such relics as "Rum Tum Tiddle," "That Haunting Melody," "Brass Band Ephraham Jones," and "My Yellow Jacket Girl." All old Victors.

"Any questions?" I asked rather smugly.

"Yeah, Man." said the disrespectful one. "You mean to say he didn't use a microphone? How did he get that 'groovy' sound?"

"Son," I stated sonorously, "Al Jolson made those recordings when your grandmother was too young to remember them. The microphone wasn't used in commercial recordings until 1925, and then only sparingly. These men warbled into a big horn, and the sheer vibrations of their voice was etched onto the wax of the record. This separated the men from the boys. A man HAD to be a singer in the truest sense of the word to be even HEARD on these discs. Groovy sound, hell. Al Jolson had a groovy VOICE."

"Okay," laughed my offspring, "You made your point. But listen Dad, can we hear some more?"

"Yer darn tootin'," I replied.

For the next few hours the stilled voice of the man called by many "The World's Greatest Entertainer" vibrated throughout the attic.

We played "A Broken Doll," "Mandalay," "Mammy," "Rock-A-Bye," "Steppin' Out," "Swanee," and lots more.

One I didn't play.

It was called "Who Wants A Bad Little Boy." My kid hadn't called me "Dad" for a year.
