Chuck Rose, D-18- is looking for a copy of "Manhattan Spiritual" by Reg Owen. He will furnish a cassette for it.


Merv Phinney, D-89- has for sale an Aiwa reel-to-reel tape recorder, AC-DC, uses 3 and 5 inch reels, \$25.


Calitais notes


