



THE PULP DICK

Only the hard-core detective fiction buffs recall the fact that Warner Brothers released THE MALTESE FALCON in 1931 with Ricardo Cortez (Who?) as Sam Spade but everyone who ever had a feeling for detective fiction knows Bogart's Sam Spade (Warner's 1943 release) and the equally memorable Caspar Gutman (Sidney Greenstreet), Joel Cairo (Peter Lorre) and Brigid O'Shaugnessey (Mary Astor).

Sam Spade evolved from a nameless detective that Dashiell Hammett featured in his work in the pulp magazine **Black Mask**. Called by the name Continental Op, Hammett's detective was unlike the clever sleuth that preceded him and the super-technocrat agents that would later replace him. He did not rely on reason to the extent that say Sherlock Holmes or even Charlie Chan did nor did he have the manners or grace of a Dupin, Vance or Poirot.

What the Continental Op did have was the breath of life's hard knocks as experienced by Hammett while an operative for the San Francisco office of Pinkertons at the princely sum of \$27.50 a week under superintendent Phil Geaque who would later complete a career in the Secret Service as Franklin Roosevelt's body guard.

Hammett's Continental Op proved to be the prototype of the hard-boiled dick and was directly patterned after Phil Geaque--he was tough, terse, free of sentiment and the fear of death, and temptations of the flesh. Instead of unravelling a crime by some combination of astute observation and deductive reasoning, the hard-boiled dick used muscle, perserverence (a hard head helped also) and words--with which he would play the various characters against one another in order to stir up some action and hopefully produce some results. In spite of his reliance on words, however, the hard-boiled dick was wary of them:

Detective Inspector Walters, Homocide, had a yellowish gaunt face and a sourly cynical nature. He had been chasing murders of one sort or another for twenty years, and he had gotten to the point where he didn't believe what he heard when he was talking to himself."

Generally operating in the large West coast cities of Los Angeles or San Francisco, the hard-boiled dick's world was a sleazy one:

"I could see the Hotel Tremain's sign over a narrow door between two store fronts, both empty--an old two-story walk up. Its woodwork

would smell of kerosene, its shades would be cracked, its curtains would be a sleazy cotton lace and its bedsprings would stick in your back. I knew all about places like the Hotel Tremaine, I had slept in them, fought with bitter, scrawny landladies in them, got shot at in them and might yet get carried out of them to the morgue wagon. They are flops where you fine the cheap ones-- the sniffers and pinjabbers, the gowed-up runts who shoot you before you can say hello."

The hard-boiled dick was born in the pages of the pulp magazines. The pulp's life span covered the period from the demise of the dime novels (early 1900's) and the onset of television and the birth of the comic books. The pulps earned their popularity with fast-paced action stories and their name (pulps) from the cheap untrimmed pulp paper stock on which they were printed. Until the pulp magazines began publishing science fiction, Trazan, Doc Savage, Western stories, Foreign Legion adventures, the Shadow and hundreds of other action fiction types, popular fiction was a bland diet of family magazines and the likes of Frank While it was generally Marriwell stories. looked upon as 'cheap' if not potentially dangerous by parents and teachers, the pulp magazine got a lot of kids into the reading habit and did produce some things of value along the way.

Out of the pulps came such authors as Tennessee Williams and such artists as N.C. Wyeth. Edgar Rice Burroughs was regarded as barely literate by his contemporaries but a recent critical review [Master of Adventure] predicts that only a handful of popular American writers will be read in the year 2000, and included in this handful will be Burroughs.

In 1914, editor Arthur Hoffman of the pulp Adventure proposed the concept of an organization composed of former soldiers, sailors and marines; organized so as to be ready to serve their country. The concept was generally endorsed by readers including General Leonard Wood and Theodore Roosevelt. The organization formed was The American Legion.

The pulps would also turn the detective story around, or, as pulp author Raymond Chandler put it, they would take murder out of the vicar's garden and give it back to the people. During its tenure in the dime novels, the detective story was in essence children's literature. The best of the pulp detective stories managed to generate the smell of fear, how-

ever: "Their characters lived in a world gone wrong, a world in which, long before the atom bomb, civilization had created the machinery for its own destruction, and was learning to use it with all the moronic delight of a gangster trying out his first machine gun. The law was something to be manipulated for profit and power. The streets were dark with something more than night", (Chandler from Trouble in my Business).

The working style of the pulp dick was something more than cerebral; if Dupin and Holmes were chessplayers, Carrol Daly's Race Williams or Raymond Chandler's Philip Marlowe were running backs. Grebstein defined the three basic working skills of the pulp dick [Tough Guy Writers of the Thirties]: 1. Sheer physical stamina—the ability to keep functioning despite bodily damage, 2. Control over personal feelings and natural appetites and 3. The power to confront death.

Plot and story line took on a lesser significance than what was going on—as Nye puts it [The Unembarrassed Muse]: The answer to 'whodunit' was less important than the atmosphere, tone and dramatics surrounding how it was done and for what reasons.

Again, Raymond Chandler says it best: "The technical basis for the old-style detective story was the relative insignificance of everything except the final denouement. What led up to it was more or less passage work."

The November, 1926 issue of **Black Mask** was the first edited by Joseph T. Shaw. Captain Shaw, late of the Marine Corps, took over as editor without having had a "bowing acquaint-ance with the pulps". He decided he wanted a new type of detective fiction that differed from the classical style of the whodunit. Shaw wrote to Hammett describing his objectives: "simplicity for the sake of clarity, plausibility, and belief".

Eventually the magazine dropped the Western, adventure, etc. as Shaw gathered a cadre of writers who could emulate Hammett's fiction; writers like Paul Cain, Raymond Chandler, Horace McCoy and George Harmon Coxe.

The hard-boiled pulp dick came in all sizes, shapes and jobs: private eyes, county cops, state troopers, hotel dicks, reporters-photographers, M.D.'s and railroad dicks.

In the corrupt and violent world of the 1920's and 30's he was something of a knight errant fighting to make things right again. More often than not he received rather than gave beatings, lost his fee and client, but he never waivered in doing his job. He was a man without friends or possessions and a very uncertain future.

The world of the pulp dick was peopled by characters unknown to Holmes:

"A large thick-necked negro was leaning against the end of the bar with pink garters on his shirt sleeves and pink and white suspenders crossed over his broad back. He had bouncer written all over him. He had a battered face that looked as if he had been hit by everything but the bucker of a dragline. It was scarred, flattened, thickened, checkered, and welted. It was a face that had nothing to fear. Everything had been done to it that anybody could think of."

The victims in the hard-boiled pulp passion plays were not the kinds of characters discovered by Frank Merriwell slumped over in a living-room chair:

"I decided to go into the kitchen, get a clean glass and some ice and fix myself a drink. When I opened the kitchen door I changed my mind about the ice and glass.

I stopped breathing. There was no sound except the rain slapping the kitchen windows. He was lying on his back on the linoleum, his head in a brownish, sticky pool. There was a bloody icepick on the floor beside his arm. He must have been stabbed with it a dozen times. One of his eyes was just a sticky hole. There was a long raw sliver of flesh hanging loose from one cheek. He had been stabbed in the neck and the arms and chest. Somebody had kept on stabbing him long after it no longer mattered. He was very cold, but he wasn't stiff yet, and he was very dead. It kept right on raining."

Tough and terse, the hard-boiled pulp dick was a most wised-up guy but in spite of all his savy, a very lonely man, a man whose job was his life.

The hard-boiled pulp dick is not a creature of the 1970's. Those who wish to samplw the pleasures of the hard-boiled pulp dick must go back to the pulp magazines (now collectors items selling for up to \$30.00 each) or out of print paperbacks. In some cases, however, there are in-print paperbacks, as with the works of Raymond Chandler and Dashiell Hammett. Every now and then a hard-cover anthology of these stories emerges and if you check the UHF T.V. program listings, you might luck out and spot one of the following:

MURDER MY SWEET, THE BIG SLEEP, THE LADY IN THE LAKE, THE BRASHER DUBLOON, THE LONG GOODBYE--all Raymond Chandler stories.

MARLOWE, THE MALTESE FALCON, DOUBLE INDEMNITY, THE BLUE DAHLIA, OUT OF THE PAST, SOMEWHERE IN THE NIGHT--all

choice hard-boiled films.

Jack Nicholson's interpretation of the hardboiled pulp dick in CHINATOWN has a lot going for it-period clothes and automobiles, etc. but it fails to capture the sense of Ionliness (J.J. Gittis has a fancy office and an active social life better suited a banker than a depression era private detective). All in all a good film in the hard-boiled tradition.

An earlier T.V. series that did a good job of characterizing the pulp dick was THE OUT-SIDER, featuring Darren McGavin as detective David Ross.

Better still pick up a copy of The Little Sister

and sample the real thing. I cannot read Chandler's opening and then lay it down:

"It was one of those clear, bright summer mornings we get in the early spring in California before the high fog sets in. The rains are over. The hills are still green and in the valley across the Hollywood hills you can see snow on the high mountains. The fur stores are advertising their annual sales. The call houses that specialize in sixteen-year old virgins are doing a land-office business. And in Beverly Hills the jacaranda trees are beginning to bloom."



That was back when the little military vehicle known as the Jeep was being turned out not only by Willys, but by Ford and by American Bantam (the latter said to be the real creators of the all-purpose auto). Civilians in those days couldn't purchase a jeep. It was strictly a military device, of course.

Somehow the civilian population couldn't have cared less; it didn't seem to care about such rough, crude vehicles. A pickup truck, used, was worth almost nothing. A big "gas guzzler", that was de rigeur back in the '40s!

Big, fancy La Salles. Even the used Pierce Arrow cars which were available. The Lincoln Zephyrs and Chrysler "Airflows". Why not? Gasoline in those days was available in unlimited supplies, and priced at around 15 cents to 20 cents a gallon (with some "local"

brands costing as little as 9 cents a gallon! The wonder of it all is that our mass transit systems were able to do so well in those days, aided only by wartime gas rationing and auto parts shortages.

Most men were shaving in those days with heavy single or double edged razors in which such brands of razor blades as Smith, Pal, Durham-Duplex and other now forgotten brands could then be found about as often as such present-day ones as Gillette, Shick and the like.

The years just prior to the onset of World War II, the used car lots of America were overflowing with "take-me-quick" automobile bargains which often included such makes as Packard, Graham-Page, Hupmobile, Studebaker, Hudson and Nash in addition to assortments of such still-manufactured autos as Ford and so on.

Ah, yes, some of the world of yesterday isn't so very far behind us. But the names of its products, in some cases, have already disappeared, it seems.

Larry Linville, Alan Alda..... And Sroucho!!!

A few years ago, I participated in a telephone question-and-answer session with TV actor Larry Linville, in Duluth, Minnesota. Mr. Linville was in the area on a CBS promotion tour, publicizing his role as Major Frank Burns on M*A*S*H. Since leaving that series, he has appeared on NBC's excellent but too short-lived GRANDPA GOES TO WASHINGTON, and in various guest roles.

I asked if the character of "Hawkeye" Pierce, played by Alan Alda, was based, at least in part, on Groucho Marx. The answer I received from Mr. Linville was better and funnier than I ever expected:

"Well, not actually....But our head writer, Larry Gelbart, who is also one of our producers, is a great admirer of Groucho. Actually, we have an experience with a Groucho story..."

"...Alan walked into Chasen's one night... very posh restaurant....and was trying to find a table, and heard this huge voice from out of nowhere say, 'HEY!! MASH!!' he thought 'Oh, my lord,' looked around trying to find who this very uncouth person was. He looks over and there's this shadow in this booth beckoning at him..."

Seems like Universal's 1940s pictures in general, whether Yvonne de Carlo, Karloff-Lugosi-Chaney Jr.; Abbott and Costello, Sherlock Holmes or Walter Lantz; hold up well when seen today. You can watch them as entertainment, NOT as "period pieces." Wish the Yvonne filmography had included her Soundies titles. I do know of one, THE LAMP OF MEMORY, 1942; now from the article I know there were others. Am trying right now to track down a print of the film.

Thought I would take the time now to write you that letter I promised. In spite of the supposed shortcomings you mentioned in your column, WOY 14 was another good issue.

However, Jerry S. Redlich's article on the Three Stooges was filled with factual errors. Ted Healy did not leave the act in 1930, but continued with the Stooges thru 1934. Shemp Howard replaced Curly at the time of Curly's illness in 1946, not following his death in 1952. And, THE THREE STOOGES MEET HERCULES, released in 1962, not 1963, was not their final feature. They starred in 3 more features, THE THREE STOOGES IN ORBIT [1962,] THE THREE

STOOGES GO AROUND THE WORLD IN A DAZE [1963,] and THE OUTLAWS IS COMING! [1965;] plus guest appearances in the all-star comedy features IT'S A MAD, MAD, MAD, MAD WORLD [1963] and FOUR FOR TEXAS [1963]. They also did live-action intros and voices for 150 Three Stooges TV cartoons; and TV commercials for Cracker Jack and North American Van Lines; before the never-completed 1969 feature KOOK'S TOUR, the existing footage of which is now available in super 8mm.

If I recall correctly, Moe Howard and Joe De Rita supplied their own voices for a 1973 episode of Hanna-Barbera's SCOOBY-DOO cartoon series, which also employed such "guest voices" as Cher, Phyllis Diller, Don Knotts and Jonathan Winters. The Stooges spirit is apparently still alive at Hanna-Barbera, whose new series THREE ROBONIC STOOGES [a spoof on the current "bionic" craze,] will premiere this coming Saturday [1/28/78] on CBS. I don't know who will be providing the voices; but I have heard that Norman Maurer, who directed the Stooges features of the 60's, will be working as a writer on these cartoons. Could be interesting.

Bobby Breen fans may be interested to know that an 800-ft. 16mm reel of musical excerpts from MAKE A WISH is available for \$39.50 from Frank Wetzel Productions, 1682 El Cerrito Court, San Luis Obispo, California 93401. Although I do not have this reel myself, I can say that the quality of Wetzel releases I have purchased has been generally good.

BOOKS

THE DECLINE AND FALL OF THE LOVE GODDESSES by Patrick Agan. 286 pp. Illustrated. Introduction. Filmography. Pinnacle Books, Inc., Los Angeles, California \$20.00 Reviewed by Bill Dover.

"....Between the covers of this book are ten faces that, like Helen of Troy, might've launched a thousand ships...the faces of the Love Goddesses who..flashed before our eyes to brighten the quality of our days and our dreams..." So aptly prefaces a richly worded tapestry which, tho one of the sloppiest researched and even more hastily proof-read \$20 tome on the glamour queens ever assembled for public perusal, is so enchantingly and exquisitely written that, true or no, you literally are so intrigued and swept up in its fascinating fabrice D'etre you cannot put it down once you've opened its spellbinding ouevre.

Activist Agan picks his stellar ten Love Goddesses, some still living, as ones whose choice of men, career moves, and own personality problems either partially or wholly destroyed their images and ethos. Wisely, he has moved the concluding chapter on Marilyn Monroe into the caboose section of his tableaux, truncated to the briefest footage of them all and minus any prefatory comments. Since Monroe has already been oversaturated in book form, this is a wise manuever on Agan's part. And who are the other nine?

The eluctible Frances Farmer, with heretofore unpublished items courtesy of Lois Kibbee, perhaps the most perceptive and totally realized chapter (on Betty Grable) which forgets to include Three For The Show in her filmography, John Kobal or no, his headline-hungry treatment of Rita Hayworth unearths even more flavorful episodes in the life of a woman who's oft said: "They went to bed with Gilda and woke up with me..", a trenchant and tactile treatment of the little-written-about evolution of once-starlet Linda Darnell, whose lifetime fear of fire culminated in destruction by same: the tragedy-prone chronicle of the siren with the peek-a-boo hairdo (Veronica Lake) who never truly understood the image Hollywood created or the woman behind it; of revolving satellite blonde bombshell Betty Hutton who was likened to "...a railway locomotive charging down

the track without an engineer ... 'Agan's tale of explosions betwixt Hutton and Ethel Merman seem far-fetched and poorly researched; of plucky, self-contained and stubbornly sexual Susan Hayward who came to Hollywood to test for Scarlett O'Hara and wound up as a well-tooled pro Oscar-nominated five times, one of cinemaland's spunkiest in-fighters; of the first black sex symbol and star role Oscar nominee. dusky, dark and treble-talented thrush-actress Dorothy Dandridge who truly had too much too soon and despite a promising comeback died far too long unable to cope with either success or the male ego; of Jayne Mansfield, the last of the bosom-heavy publicity-crazed page one addicts whose premature, untimely death of decapitation on a speedcrazed lonely country road between nitery engagements fluffed out a near narcicisstic love affair with herself and the American public as well as the color pink and anything heartshaped, and finally an elegiac eulogy of The Monroe.

Photographs included are, sadly, oft of inertia and inferior quality, hacked up and mis-placed in proportion to the text. Certainly with so many photo collections at his disposal, author Agan could have utilized far superior reproductions than the sub-standard collage he's exhibited within these pages.

And the typos? "Mogambo" for the Sunset Strip nitery "Mocambo", "Lola Cola" for the Dietrich character in THE BLUE ANGEL, the aforementioned absence of a Grable film credit, and such erroneous and inexcusable misprints as designating the black-and-white Frances Farmer film SOUTH OF PAGO PAGO as a Technicolor treat! Really, Mr. Agan! Or does one blame the researchers, proof-readers or typists?? Interesting!

THE COMPLETE DIRECTORY TO PRIME TIME NETWORK TV SHOWS, 1946 TO PRESENT by Tim Brooks and Earle Marsh. Ballantine Books. 884 pps. \$9.95. Reviewed by Tom Parry.

Here is the most accurate and up to date reference book ever made available on prime time network television shows. More than 2,500 shows are listed, together with the dates of their first telecast, last telecast and broadcast history (which includes repeats), plus complete cast credits. The authors also present plot outlines and, in the case of variety series, host, format, and guests.

This writer has been watching television since 1953 and quite honestly I thought I had a pretty good recollection for all the old shows. That is, until I read this book! As it turns out, my memory was sketchy at best for I could not

recall even half the shows I used to view on a regular basis. With this book in hand, however, I can picture the shows as they flashed across my black and white screen twenty and twenty-five years ago. Its really like having a complete collection of TV Guide between two covers!

I heartily recommend this book for all television fans. If you are too young to remember the great old shows of TV's golden era, this book will whet your appetite to see them. If you are old enough to remember them (even though you may not want to admit it) you are in store for a wealth of nostalgia! There is enough information in here to keep the most ardent trivia buff busy writing questions and answers for the next thirty years or until the authors turn their attention to television's daytime delights!

RADIO ENTERS THE HOME, RCA Corporation of America, 1922. Reprinted by Vestal Press, no price available. Reviewed by Tom Parry.

This little book is a must for those of you who collect old radio receivers. It is a page by page reprint of a 1922 RCA publication that shows the novice of that era "How to enjoy popular radio broadcasting" with "complete instructions and description of apparatus".

The book is paperbound, 8½" X 11", with full page illustrations of 1922 model radios, wiring diagrams, tube descriptions and diagrams, part numbers and the prices of those parts in 1922. The book originally sold for 35 cents but we assume that Vestal Press has kept up with inflation and that it will be considerably more now (my guess would be \$6 or \$7). But to antique radio collectors it will prove a valuable investment and be an interesting and vital addition to their knowledge of early radio.

THE LEADING LADIES by James Robert Parish and Don E. Stanke. 526 pp. Hardbound, Arlington House. \$25.00. Review by Tom Parry.

Five of the best known female stars of Hollywood's Golden Era are profiled in this salute to Hollywood's past.

JOAN CRAWFORD, BETTE DAVIS, OLIVIA DEHAVILLAND, ROSALIND RUSSELL, JOAN BLONDELL and BARBARA STANWYCK are the subjects. Richly illustrated with vintage portraits and stills, each biography is exceptionally well written and extensively researched. A great deal of personal data is also included beyond the professional statistics, which helps to accentuate the human qualities of these five fine actresses. At the conclusion of each biography is a complete and detailed filmography, including cast and production credits.

Because the book limits itself to five subjects, the reader comes away with a greater appreciation of individual accomplishments. The thirties were a complex time in Hollywood with literally hundreds of actors and actresses competing for major parts and the public's attention. Yet only a handful managed to succeed and survive within the system and go on to greater glories. These five women are among the survivors and their personal stories make worthwhile and satisfying reading. -TP



The picture was the first feature filmed in a new 3-strip Technicolor, and so drew proportionately more interest of moviegoers, a fact which no doubt helped Nigel Bruce still further. At any rate, a succession of roles fell to the actor thereafter, in picutres such as "SHE" (1935), "JALNA" (1936) and in Paramount's well-remembered melodrama "TRAIL OF THE LONESOME PINE" a Technicolor feature made from the tremendously popular novel by John Fox, Jr.

"TRAIL OF THE LONESOME PINE" cast Bruce in the role of an associate of a construction engineer (played by Fred Mac Murray). The two make their way deep into the Virginia mountains, where few "outsiders" go in those days. There, amid the moutain folk (represented by Henry Fonda, Silvia Sidney, "Sparky" McFarland, "Fuzzy" Knight and other "gen-you-wine" mountaineers, MacMurray finds romance, a way to successfully complete a construction project in spite of opposition, and, through it all, the quiet reassurances of the pipe smoking companion which Nigel Bruce played "to the hilt".

During his long screen career Mr. Bruce would not have appeared in a lowcost offering from a small independent studio except for his appearence in "FOLLOW YOUR HEART" (1936), a modest "program feature" churned out by Republic during its first year and a half of operation. That was unusual for him, though.

Mainly, Bruce shuttled back and forth to various major studios, principally to Universal,

Columbia, M.G.M., and Fox until 1939 when he was suddenly cast in the role of Dr. Watson vis a vis Basil Rathbone's Sherlock Holmes in "HOUND OF THE BASKERVILLES" and in "ADVENTURES OF SHERLOCK HOLMES" both made at 20th Century Fox. Following those two features, several years were to elapse before messers. Bruce and Rathbone were to be reunited for further Holmes adventures.

In the meanwhile Bruce was as busy a player as was to be found around Hollywood, appearing in "THE RAINS CAME" (1939) in which the leading players were Tyrone Power and Myrna Loy.

Bruce found substantial roles in such forgetable films, too, as "THE BLUE BIRD". Fox's unfortunate filmization of Maurice Maeterlinck's fantasy (the film starred Shirley Temple and Spring Byington), and in "LILLIAN RUSSELL" (1940 Fox).

Another half dozen films or so followed, including "REBECCA" (UA 1940) which provided Bruce a rather meaty role in the film version of

a Daphne DeMaurier novel. But Bruce now seemed so much a part of the Sherlock Holmes stories, at least as far as the movies were concerned, that he could not escape the role.

In 1942 Universal reunited Basil Rathbone with Nigel Bruce in their roles as detective and physician respectively in "SHERLOCK HOLMES AND THE VOICE OF TERROR". The series of Holmes mysteries continued into 1946 with such entries as "SHERLOCK HOLMES AND THE SECRET WEAPON" and even one in which the great detective and his "sidekick" tried to fathom the mysteries of Washington D.C.! When the series ended, the pair had appeared in fourteen of those inexpensive "B" films and were doubtless happy to move on to other roles (at least that was true in the case of Rathbone who in later years hated even to talk about the Sherlock Holmes films in which he'd appeared).

Except for his parts in the Sherlock Holmes films, Bruce was seldom a "sidekick" in movies. In spite of that, he cheerfully joined a

ted Order of Sidekicks", an informal social group organized originally by Pat Buttram and Andy Devine, and numbering among its members, besides Bruce, such cheerful sidekicks as Jay Silverheels and William Frawley. group were issued printed membership cards and a set of rules conceived in jest, as witness:

- 1. When a sidekick is thrown into a water trough, the water must be heated.
- 2. Ice thrown in the face of a sidekick must be obtained from the bar of the Brown Derby.
- 3. A sidekick gets the girl in every 10th picture.

...etc.,etc...

The membership of Nigel Bruce in such a light hearted organization typified perhaps Bruce's approach to his career. He was relegated by a not totally unkind fate to an we cinema lovers will never forget.





The period that they have explored is one of the least known in the history of the cinema. Few marked trails exist through this luxuriant jungle, where the films were scattered without much order.
