CBS: (COLUMBIA BROADCASTING SYSTEM)

ANNOUNCER: CAMELS never get on your nerves!

MUSIC: SMOKE RINGS

ANNOUNCER: And now we present Ted Fusing, CAMEL star reporter.

MUSIC: TAG
APPLAUSE

MUSIC: THAT'S YOU SWEETHEART (DEANE JANIS)
(O'KEEFE AD LIBS INTRODUCTION OVER MUSIC)
APPLAUSE

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O'KEEFE: Ladies and gentlemen...last week we took you on an Armchair Cruise to the West Indies across that beautiful ocean...boarding the S.S. Van Dyne. We pick up the ship now as it is leaving the harbor of Goona Goona...and the passengers are crowded along the rail as the natives are diving for pennies.

BIZ: STEAMSHIP WHISTLES (LOTS OF THEM)
AD LIB GOOD BYES
ORCHESTRA PLAYS "ALONG COME"

O'KEEFE: Under the spell of the tropic moon Romance runs riot...and this being leap year no man on board is safe from the wiles of designing females. We now pick up a mother counselling and advising her son before leaving him alone on the deck.

BIZ: ORCHESTRA PLAYS "SONNY BOY"

FROST: Now Sonny...I'm going below to play bridge...you stay here in your deck chair and don't let any of those women get too close with you.

HUNT: Oh May...don't leave me...it's dark.

FROST: No Sonny...you be a good boy and wait for Mama. Good bye.

BIZ: FOOTSTEPS ALONG THE DECK

HUNT: Steward.

JACK: Yes sir...what can I do for you?

HUNT: I want you to go to the bar room and sneak me out something.

JACK: Sneak it out, sir?

HUNT: Yes...I don't want my mother to know. Here's what I want. Get a couple chocolate candies "Lolly-poppy with soft cream" and a couple of whipped cream.

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JACK: Be right up, sir...

BIZ: FOOTSTEPS

HUNT: See, it's peachey to be alone...oh better than that...
it's ginger peachey...Oh...here comes a woman...I hope she
doesn't try to pick me up.

JANIS: Hello babe...how are ya?

HUNT: So way...ya fresh thing.

JANIS: Waiting for anybody...big boy.

HUNT: Yes...I'm waiting for a double chocolate crackly fluffy wuff

JANIS: Alone?

HUNT: No...with oodles of whipped cream.

JANIS: See, you're cute. How old are you?

HUNT: Forty-one.

JANIS: So about a little kiss.

HUNT: Oh don't please...don't...you hardly know me.

JANIS: C'mon you handsome lug...kiss me.

HUNT: No...mama...mama...

JANIS: C'mon kiss me...WHAT are you waiting for...

HUNT: A double chocolate crackly fluffy wuffy.

BIZ: TRUMPET BLAST

OK'NEFF: Oh...Will Pee Wee catch it when Uncle Don finds out! There
is no service that a passenger could want that is NOT
furnished aboard the S.S. Van Dyne. One of the best medical
men in the country is the ship's doctor and we pick him up
as he's making a call on one of his patients. All right...
the patient isn't feeling well. Give us some restful music.

BIZ: "ST. LOUIS BLUES" PLAYED BY ORCHESTRA
KNOCK ON THE DOOR

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FROST: Come in.

BIZ: DOOR OPENS

FROST: Oh, hello doctor...my patient is feeling low.

SORIN: Hello Cutepuss...

O'KELFE: (GROANS)

SORIN: Come on, nurse...let me feel your pulse.

O'KELFE: No doctor...I'M the one that's sick.

SORIN: I know but it's no fun holding YOUR hand. Nurse...help us
put these instruments on the table...and BE CAREFUL...they're
very delicate.

FROST: All right doctor...I'll be careful.

BIZ: CRASHING OF HEAVY METAL OBJECTS EXAGGERATED.

O'KELFE: Nurse...get this veterinary out of here...Do you think you
have to operate.

SORIN: I don't know...stick out your tongue and let me feel your
wallet. Come, come, now....stick out your tongue and say

O'KELFE: OY OY OY...

SORIN: There's nothing wrong with you...you're just a little nervous.

O'KELFE: By the way, doctor...how is my friend in the next cabin.

SORIN: Oh, I will operate on him tomorrow. He is going to leave
a wife and three children.

BIZ: TRUMPET BLAST

O'KELFE: The afternoon draws to a close. The younger set, after a

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OSWALD: Informality is the keynote of the occasion. Everyone gets an

OSWALD: And now...the ship's concert. The highlight of the evening
the piece de resistance of the entertainment. On the night
before reaching port everyone gathers in the main salon to
be entertained by their fellow passengers. We peck in, just
as the band is coming to the end of a dreamy waltz...

BIZ: ORCHESTRA PLAYS "IN THE GOOD OLD SUMMER TIME"
BABBLE OF VOICES

DOUGLAS: Quiet, folks...As captain of this ship I just want to thank
you all for your delightful company and now it's my duty
AND honor AND privilege AND pleasure AND right AND distinct
to introduce at this juncture MY friend, YOUR friend, OUR
friend...his own friend, our master of ceremonies...star of
radio, stage, screen, television, phonograph records,
burlesque, direct from his sensational success at Joe's Bar
and Grill on Eighth Avenue. May I present Smiling Freddie
McGonigle.

BIZ: ORCHESTRA HITS CHORD IN G

OSWALD: Thank you, skipper...well, folks, I had dinner at the
Captain's table...we had fish...fish lots of bones in it...
couldn't get a piece of fish without a bone in it...(LAUGH)
Now I know what they mean by BONE voyage. It must have
skipped hearing (LAUGHS). Get it, folks...skipped hearing
Not seriously folks, all kidding aside...we got a little

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(CONT'D) artist over here...a sweet little fellow...a little
single...his little mother is with him...a charming little
old lady...and I got a little gossip for you...You see his
little sweetheart is out front...marvellous little girl..
really marvellous, folks...I really mean it, folks...she's
got a sweet little smile...Well, give him a little applause
folks...

BIZ: APPLAUSE

OKLEFF: What are you going to sing, Jimmy...

JACK: I love life.

OKLEFF: All right, Professor...

BIZ: ORCHESTRA PLAYS AND JACK SINGS "I LOVE LIFE"
SHIPS BELL TOLLS

BUSING: Eight bells and all's well...eight bells and all's well.

BIZ: JACK FINISHES SINGING

APPLAUSE

OKLEFF: And now seriously, folks...we got a little girl on board,
a child prodigy. She's an old-fashioned girl...she's ten
years old and still lives with her folks. But seriously, folks
...Miss Dahlia Clodhopper is the poet laureate of Miss
Souple's School for backward children...Dahlia...what is
the title of your first poem.

FROST: (LITTLE GIRL VOICE) To My Dolly Bedelia...Verse one.

I named her Bedelia, because I think Bedelia
is a good name...especially for a dolly.

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O'KEEFE: This is free-verse, folks...and if you pay for it you're
stuck. But come, Dabria...surely you have another poem.
FROST: Oh yes, I have another one...this one is entitled...To My
Dolly...with apologies to Kipling...Verse one...To My Dolly

To me a doll my mother did give
She gave me a carriage too
And when I go walking on the street with my car
I'm very sad...wouldn't you?

O'KEEFE: I think I would...wouldn't you.

FROST: Verse two...

O'KEEFE: You see, folks...it's getting verse and verse...(LAUGHS)

FROST: The sky is very, very blue with roses round the door
And I am very blue too...could my dolly do more...

O'KEEFE: I wonder who'll get the Rose Bowl game next year.

FROST: Verse four...

And then that fatal day dawned bright
Downhill the trolley dashed slow
But Genevieve didn't see it
Oh woe, Oh woe, Oh woe.

O'KEEFE: Alas Dabria...back up...And now, ladies and gentlemen...
Glen Gray and his Ship's Orchestra will play "The Volga
Boatsman"...
