5 FIB: No kiddin'! Who taught you how to do it?

6 GALE: Nobody. I started from scratch.

7 NOL: I can see that anyone would.

8 GALE: Yes, I was really a very good flea-trainer. In fact I
was so good that I began to get commercial offers. And
that took it out of the hobby classification, so I quit.

9 FIB: You had a lot of offers to train fleas, eh? That's very
interesting. How does a flea make an offer like that?
Bite a message in your leg?

10 GALE: No no no....of course not. I mean I had offers from
sideshows to train fleas for them. But I quit that and
started collecting rare postage stamps.

- 1 HCL: Oh, McGee did that for awhile, Mr. Mayor. He saved the stamps off of every letter he got. And he got some rare ones too. Letters, that is.
- 2 FIB: Yeah, the stamps weren't much good, though. There was one I kinda liked - sort of a home-made lookin' stamp with a picture of a J-masted boat on it. Only some postal clerk had scribbled his initials all over it.
- 3 GALE: Hand cancelled, eh?
- 4 HCL: It was from New Zealand or someplace, Mr. Mayor. We thought it might be valuable at first - but it was only worth a penny. It said right on it - "One Cent".
- 5 GALE: That wouldn't happen to have been the New Guinea One Cent Stamp, would it?
- 6 HCL: NEW GUINEA! THAT'S IT - THAT'S WHAT IT WAS! It was sort of a magenta color - and octagonal.
- 7 FIB: Yeah - red with six sides.
- 8 GALE: Newsflash. And where is your collection now, McGee?
- 9 FIB: You got me, boy. Up in the attic, I guess. I gave it up for something really constructive, like ukulele playing.
- 10 GALE: You prefer ukulele playing to stamp collecting, McGee?
- 11 HCL: Well, I think there's more future in it, Mr. Mayor. He might get good enough to play professionally...
- 12 FIB: You betcha! Might eventually pick up five or ten bucks an evening, playin' at parties.

- 1 GALE: If the way I heard you play it was a sample, you couldn't pick up a split forevian pony playing the 1812 overture while juggling 13 deep sea turtles, blindfolded on a unicycle, balancing a wheelbarrow full of pig iron on your nose, and surrounded by fifty beautiful girls in Bikini bathing suits waving American flags with their phone numbers tattooed on their knees.
- 2 FIB: HEY...THAT SOUNDED LIKE A WONDERFUL NOVELTY ACT!!! write that down, La Triv...I'll start workin' it up and
- Maybe I can...Oh no...No good.
- 3 MEL: Why not, McGee?
- 4 FIB: Can't use deep sea turtles, S.F.C.A. wouldn't let us.
- 5 GALE: Too bad, I'd like to have seen the act. But about that stamp McGee - the New Guinea One-Cent Niganta.
- 6 FIB: What about it?
- 7 GALE: According to last October's Curzon magazine...it's the rarest stamp in the world and is worth over a hundred thousand dollars!
- 8 MEL: WHAT?
- 9 FIB: You mean I -

- 1 GLE: But what do you care? You don't want to be a fish collector - you'd rather be a poor unlucky player...and believe me...you ARE! Good day.
- 2 SOUND: DOOR SLAM!
- 3 CRCH: WILLIAM TELL SWEET BRIDGE!
- 4 SOUND: CLATTER OF COINS AND JUNK
- 5 FIB: Where is it? Nigosh where is it?
- 6 MCL: Well, it isn't up here in the attic, McGee. That's for sure. Incidentally...why is one tiny little stamp worth so much money?
- 7 FIB: It ain't the size that counts, kiddo...a pearl ain't valuable just because it comes in a big oyster, you know...COME ON...LET'S LOOK IN THE BASEMENT...NY GOSH...A HUNDRED THOUSAND DUCKS!!! WE GOTTA FIND IT!!!
- 8 CRCH: SHORT WILLIAM TELL
- 9 SOUND: CLANK THUD...CLATTER
- 10 MCL: No good, McGee. It's not in the basement. How about the hall closet?
- 11 FIB: WHAT? OPEN THAT DOOR FOR A HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS? OR NO!!! LET'S TRY THE GARAGE!
- 12 CRCH: SHORT WILLIAM TELL
- 13 SOUND: CLANK CLANK...BANG...BATTLE
- 14 FIB: Oh this is awful, kiddo! I dunno where that goddamned stamp collection could of went. Let's go back in the house.
- 15 SOUND: GARAGE DOOR CLOSE; FOOTSTEPS ON DRIVEWAY...
- 16 MCL: Think hard. What could have become of it, dearie?

- 1 FIB: I dunno maybe I give it to somebody, that would be kinda typical. No throwin' away a hundred thousand dollar stamp collection and takin' up with a seven buck unkle! If I ain't the stupidest--
- 2 MEL: Now now now...don't blame yourself, sweetheart, you didn't know about the New Guinea stamp...
- 3 FIB: WHY DIDN'T I? I WAS COLLECTIN' STAMPS, WASN'T IT I SHOULD of know!!! Gee whiss, I'm the kind of a guy that digs for fishbones and squawks about the gold nuggets dentin' up the shovel. Now lamma see...WHAT DID I do with that stamp collection? I--was--Oh, hiya Old Timer.
- 4 MEL: Hello, Mr. Old Timer...
- 5 OLD: (READING IN) HILAH DAUGHTER...HILAH JOHNNY...WHAT YOU LOOKIN' SO EXASPERATED ABOUT?
- 6 FIB: Had a very valuable stamp collection, Old Timer...and I can't remember what I done with it. It's worth over a hundred thousand today.
- 7 OLD: Well, that is a tidy little sum, Johnny! Peller could git along real good on that, if he didn't get married and et in cafeterias. I was a millionaire myself, once - for a few days.
- 8 MEL: For a few days!!! You must have been quite a spendthrift!
- 9 FIB: How'd you lose it, Old Timer? Invest it all in a inside straight?

- 1 OLD: Hope. You see me and my pappa, we had us a gold mine. Uncovered a streak of pay dirt that assay'd three thousand bucks a ton. Well sir, papa planted some dynamite one day and we got ready to open up a new shaftPapa says "READY, BOY" and I says, "BLAST IT, DAD!" AND DAD BLASTED. In fact, dad blasted the whole dad-blasted mountain. Never did find the dad-blasted mine again.
- 2 MOL: That was hard luck.
- 3 FIB: Just what part of the West was that, Old Timer? Reason I ask, back in 19 creht 26, I was out in the Snake River Country. Homesteading. I claimed a steak out there.
- 4 MOL: I think you mean you staked a claim, Gaurie.
- 5 FIB: No, I claimed a steak. In a restaurant. Another hombre says it was his and I says it was mine. We stood there, for a minute...and then...quick as a flash, he went for his gun!
- 6 OLD: Did he kill you, Johnny? Did he kill you?
- 7 FIB: Hope. He must have had to go quite a ways for his gun, because when he got back, I was gone. Having of the steak.
- 8 OLD: Well, it's a right interesting country out there, Johnny. My whole family grewed up in the West. My sister Jennie....she was kin's stage-struck, you know.
- 9 MOL: Not much opportunity for an actress out there, I suppose.
- 10 OLD: Who says anything about bein' a actress? Jennie was a dance hall girl.

- 1 FBI: You says she was stage struck.
- 2 OLD: She was. Run across the road one day to get herself a drink of water outa the horse trough - they didn't serve water where she worked...and got struck by the five o'clock stage from Laramie.
- 3 MLL: Heavenly days...was she hurt?
- 4 OLD: Nope...but what she told that stage driver shore blistered his gun butt. WHY I MIND ONE TIME WHEN JESSIE --
- 5 FBI: Look, Old Timer, this is all very fascinating, but I gotta get busy and locate my stamp collection. I can't j just stand here and ignore a hundred thousand bucks. My Elk's Club dues are over-due- Elk's Club - Cliff OLD AT THE ELK CLUB! I REMEMBER NOW, I GIVE THAT STAMP COLLECTION TO CLIFF! Come on, Molly! See you later, Old Timer.

SCENE 1:1 SOUND: FOOTSTEPS AND TRAVEL

2 FIB: Keep hurryin', Molly! Boy, I can hardly wait to get hold of Ole and get my New Guinea stamp book! A hundred thousand bucks! With that much lettuce, I could - Oh - Oh, there's Ole in front of the Elks Club now, sweepin'...

3 MCL: What if he doesn't want to give you back that stamp collection, dearie? After all, if you GAVE it to him - legally he doesn't have to -

4 FIB: Don't worry, I'll handle Ole all right! Diplomacy that's all. I'll butter him up like a hot biscuit. I'll have those stamps back before O HIDEH, OLE, OLD MAN! GHEAT TO SEE YOU, BOY!

5 OLE: Oh, hello, McGee. I didn't see you come. I was busy sweepin' the other trash off the sidewalk...Hello, missus.

6 MCL: Hello, Ole.

7 FIB: I said to Molly this mornin. I says, "It's been too long since we've saw Ole," I says. I says, "He'll be glad to see his old friend and good pal, McGee!" I says.

8 OLE: Well, the name is familiar all right - but I don't recognize that description...Now the fact, McGee - so I can sweep the sidewalk.

2 SOUND: BELLS RINGING, UNCLE

- 1 FIB: YOU DO A GREAT JOB OF SWEEPIN' TOO, BOY! I WAS TELLIN' THE MAYOR YESTERDAY, I SAID "THERE AIN'T A SIDEWALK SWEEPER IN TOWN THAT SWEEPS A SIDEWALK ANY SMOOTHER THAN OLE SAMMY" I SAID. I SAID, "HE'S THE SMALLEST SIDEWALK SWEEPER THAT -
- 2 MOL: McGee.
- 3 FIB: Huh?
- 4 MOL: Don't overdo it. Say, Ole, how's everyone at home? The children all well?
- 5 OLE: Oh sure, the kids is all wonderful, missus. If you like kids, which we do, when they're good, which is mostly never...move the foot, McGee.
- 6 SOUND: HEAR SWEEPING SOUND
- 7 FIB: YES SIR, YOU GOT A GREAT COLLECTION OF KIDS, OLE! GREAT COLLECTION! AND SWEEPIN' OF COLLECTIONS - YOU REMEMBER ONE I GAVE YOU ABOUT 6 MONTHS AGO??
- 8 OLE: Collection?
- 9 FIB: Yeah. Remember I was cleanin' out the attic and I give you a shoebox full of a collection of -
- 10 OLE: Oh that old junk! Sure, I remember that.
- 11 MOL: Good!
- 12 OLE: I took it home to the kids, but they don't want it - so my missus burns the whole thing up...Move the foot, McGee.
- 13 FIB: WHAT?? GEEH BOOO! MY VALUABLE SWEEP COLLECTION!!
- 14 MOL: Oh dear!!

- 1 FIB: YOU GOT A GREAT FAMILY, OLE! SWELL KIDS! GOOD-LOOKIN'!
INTELLIGENT! WELL-BRED! WELL-BRING-UP! MANNISH!
...I'd like to meet 'em sometime.
- 2 OLE: Boy, I'd like to meet that family myself! ...Anyone
I know? ..Move the foot, McGee.
- 3 SOUND: BRICK SUSPENDING BOARD.
- 4 FIB: Why doncha sit down while, boy - you're workin' too
hard. Here, have a cigar! Free. It's a good one,
too - genuine In Perfecto.
- 5 OLE: Well, thanks, I -
- 6 FIB: Want me to bite the end off of it for you?
- 7 OLE: No thanks, I'll just stick it in my pocket....Who's
expecting? You, missus?
- 8 MEL: No - McGee is.
- 9 OLE: Come again??
- 10 MEL: He's expecting to talk you out of -
- 11 FIB: YES SIR, YOU GOT A GREAT COLLECTION OF KIDS, OLE!
GREAT COLLECTION! AND SPEAKIN' OF COLLECTIONS - YOU
REMEMBER ONE I GAVE YOU ABOUT 6 MONTHS AGO??
- 12 OLE: Collection? If you mean the time Mart Trope slips
on pool cue you left on the floor and breaks his leg -
and I take up collection to buy crutches for him -
that dime you gave me had a hole in it. Move the
foot, McGee.
- 13 MEL: No, that isn' the one he means, Ole. He means -
- 14 FIB: My old hobby. Remember I was cleanin' out the attic
and I give you a shoebox full of a collection of -

- 1 OLE: Stamp! You don't give no any stamps, McGoo. You give me a whole box full of match covers, who wants to cover matches? No burn 'em up.
- 2 FIB: MATCHES? OGGOSH! - WAS THAT WHAT I GAVE YOU? MY MATCH BOOK COLLECTION! YOU BEST!
- 3 OLE: Certainly, Sonother - there was a little girl there and you was cleanin' out a lot of junk and-
- 4 HOL: That's it, McGoo! Tony! I'll bet you gave the stamps to Tony!
- 5 FIB: TONY! THAT'S RIGHT! I remember - I gave 'em to Tony.
--COME ON, WE GOTTA FIND HER, LET'S GRAB A STREET CAR!
- 6 SOUND: HUSHING FEET PAUSE
- 7 OLE: (CHECKS) Well, I finally got him to move the foot!
- 8 OLE: PAUSE INJURY
- 9 FIB: Didn't it, why don't that streetcar hurry up! I gotta get -
- 10 HOL: It's coming, Dario, Take it easy. It's coming.
- 11 SOUND: STREETCAR PAUSES IN BEHIND
- 12 FIB: Yeah, Well, keep your fingers crossed, kiddo - I hope Tony know where she put that stamp collection.
(SOUND: CLANG...CLANG) If that kid lost a hundred grand stamp -
- 13 SOUND: CAR STOPS - OH- DOORS OPEN
- 14 OLE: OOOPPLASSSNDK! OOPPLASSSNDK AND FEETTAIL!
NEW CAR...SOUND!
- 15 HOL: Give me your arm, dario. This skirt is a little long and the stop is a little high and -

1 FIB: Yeah, you better lift your skirt, Molly. If you catch
your heel -

2 MEL: I've got it, dearie.

3 SOUND: LONG WHISTLE

4 MEL: (PLEASED) Why, that fresh thing! Bless his heart!

5 FIB: That's a cop. Directin' traffic....You got two dime?

6 MEL: Here.

7 FIB: Thanks. Let's sit over here.

8 SOUND: CAR DOOR CLOSE...CLANG...CLANG...CAR UP AND PAIR BEHIND

9 CONDE: ALMIXLAVENSTHIN NERT! ALMIXLAVENSTHIN AND
DOSSIPHOSSIPHAN!!

10 MEL: What did he say?

11 FIB: 14th Oak.

12 MEL: My goodness, what an accent. I don't know how these
conductors ever learn to talk like that, McGee.

13 FIB: They go through trainin, Molly. They got quite a
system on this line, too. Very modern.

14 MEL: Really?

15 FIB: They always start a new conductor out with a
mouthful of marbles at first - to help him talk
indistinct, see?

Each day - as he gets better - he spits out one of
the marbles.

16 MEL: I see.

- 1 FIB: They tell me on this line here, that a guy makes the best conductor when he ain't got all his marbles...You see when -
- 2 MIL: Oh WAIT. MUSH! LOOK! Look who's across the aisle!
- 3 FIB: Huh? Well, nigosh, if it ain't Harlow Milk-Ox, the Double-Rich Kid! Kiysh, Milky!
- 4 MIL: Hello, Mr. Wilcox.
- 5 WIL: Well, hello, Milly - Hi, Pal. What brings you two downtown? Window shopping?
- 6 FIB: No, we got plenty of windows Junior. We're lookin' for a postage stamp, boy.
- 7 WIL: Oh. Have you tried the Post Office?
- 8 MIL: This is a special stamp, Mr. Wilcox.
- 9 FIB: New Guinea stamp, Junior. Worth a hundred grand, and I'm gonna -
- 10 WIL: Yeah, yeah -- well, if you kids will excuse me now, I've got a new book here I'm anxious to read.
- 11 FIB: What book is it?
- 12 WIL: It's Mary Lee Taylor's Famous Book of Pot Milk Recipes, Pal!
- 13 MIL: Ohhh, dear.
- 14 WIL: The reason why I'm so anxious to get at it is because this issue features Pot Milk's most popular recipe - the one for Pumpkin Pie!
- 15 FIB: Yeah, well -

- 7 WIL: Besides that, Pot Milk is the finest -
- 8 FID: HOLD IT! HEY, THERE'S TONY, MULLY!
- 9 MCL: Where?
- 10 FID: IN FRONT OF KODER'S MEAT STORE! HOLD IT! LEAVE OFF!
- 11 WIL: That's why I say Pot Milk is the finest that money --
- 12 FID: (SCYLLING FEET) HOLD IT, CONDUCTOR! LEAVE CFWA HERE!
HOLD IT!
- 13 COND: CHEWVETIOUS OOL, NAC! CHEWVETIOUS! ... LARDOTFLIM STREET,
YOU GETTING OUT?
- 14 FID: YEAH! (SCYLLING STEPS) YOU STAY ON THE CAR, MULLY! SEE
YOU AT HOME! HEY, TONY! WAIT UP!
- 15 SOUND: STRATONS UP AND FANGES OUT DRIVING
- 16 THE: Hi Mister. (GIGGLES) Hey, what's all the excitement about,
mister? Not The excitement? Not What's it?

- 1 FIB: Look, Teeny, I'll get right down to business. You remember 6 months ago I gave you a stamp collection? Remember?
- 2 TEN: Stamp collection? Oh - You mean that old shoe box that the lid didn't fit very well, only I could have used it for a doll bed if it wasn't all full of dirty old used-up postage stamps? That stamp collection?
- 3 FIB: Yes, yes, yes. Quick! What'dja do with it?
- 4 TEN: I gave it to Willie Toops.
- 5 FIB: WHAT?
- 6 TEN: Boys are more interested in stamps than girls, and girls are more interested in boys, and so I gave -
- 7 FIB: OH FOR - LOOK, SIS, THIS IS URGENT! There's a stamp in that bunch that's worth a lot of -- UHSH, that is - well, I'd like to have 'em back, see? For - well, for sentimental reasons. You understand?
- 8 TEN: Sure - you love money! (GIGGLES) Big deal, huh?
- 9 FIB: A hundred thousand - er no! I ain't gonna tell how much it's worth. Look, can you get hold of Willie and have him bring them stamps to my house? Quick?
- 10
- 11 TEN: Sure, I know where he is right now, mister. Only -
- 12 FIB: (PAUSE) Only what?
- 13 TEN: (SIGHS HAPPILY) Well, it's gonna be expensive, mister. Willie broke a window playin' ball, and they're keepin' him in till he pays for it -
- 14 FIB: I'll pay for the window!

1 THE: - and well, Willie's all upset about it, and he'll need a
couple shockin' sodas to calm his nerves -

2 FIB: Here's a buck - stuff him full of sodas! Just hurry -

3 THE: Then there's no, of course. Willie never drinks alone.

4 FIB: All right, all right! Here's a buck for you! How much is
the broken window? What window was it?

5 THE: (GIGGLES) The front one. In Kramer's Drug Store. 29
dollars.

6 FIB: \$30. Mizosh, what a piece!

7 THE: (GIGGLES INTO.)

8 CRCH: AND KING'S MEN: "THE THING".

- 16 THE: (GIGGLES) They were all throwin' kisses at the post office!
