I'm sure I've told you folks about the tobacco auctioneer who sells tobacco at public auction, about the buyers, and about the warehouseman who calls the opening bid. Well, when we reenact a typical auction scene for you, you hear them all in action. But it just occurred to me that there's another thing you hear, which perhaps I haven't explained. And that's the hub-bub and babble of voices in the background. Now, if Basil Ruysdael will reenact a typical auction scene for us, I'll show you why the babble of voices is just as important to you, as a smoker, as the activity of the warehouseman, the auctioneer, and the buyers.
