

The FBI's "full facilities" have been thrown into the search for four members of the U.S. communist politburo. . . who failed to show up in federal court this morning. . . as ordered. The other 7. . were packed off to jail promptly...to begin serving 3 to 5 year prison terms... after conviction of conspiring to teach overthrow of the government by force. For the four missing: federal judge Sylvester Ryan has issued bench warrants. If they're not in custody by ten-thirty tomorrow morning...Judge Ryan says...their bail of ten thousand dollars each... will be forfeited.

Another declaration on Korean peace talks is expected soon from General Matthew Ridgway's headquarters. There are new hints from Tokyo that the UN supreme commander will make public an official allied acceptance of Chinese communist counter-proposals for peace talks at Kaesong---just south of the 38th parallel. Sources at far east headquarters indicate a broadcast statement may come from there...at 6 o'clock this evening... Eastern Daylight Time.

There's little doubt now but that General Ridgway's reply to Radio Bayping will be agreeable. Officials at the Pentagon in Washington say the counter-bid WILL be accepted. President Truman told his congressional lieutenants at a White House meeting that he thinks UN forces are now in a "GOOD POSITION" in Korea.

But the South Korean assembly...fearful of a settlement restoring the pre-war boundary is rushing delegates to Lake Success to try and stop cease-fire talks!

UN airmen are raining heavy destruction on red convoys north of the parallel. Communist-held ports along both coasts are also the targets of naval gunfire.

An 8th Army spokesman says "we have superior firepower and we're going to continue using it to the fullest advantage." But the ground fighting IS diminishing. No major contacts reported. Soldier feeling on the possibility of an end to the bloody fighting...is voiced concisely by Pfc. John Hibbard of Akron, Ohio:

"If a cease-fire does come off, it should be right away because there's no sense in more guys getting killed."

In Czechoslovakia...again the familiar and sordid pattern of communist spy trials: American newspaperman William Oatis "confesses" to Czech communist charges of espionage but U.S. officials attending the trial say he looks "pale and strained"---that he apparently had "memorized" his testimony.

British oil tankers in the middle east...most of them...have now left the port of Abadan with empty tanks as the critical oil dispute continues unresolved. Iranian embassy spokesmen in London say the Tehran government of Premier Mossadeck may file a formal complaint with the United Nations...against movement of British military forces.. near Iran's borders.

American ambassador Henry Grady announces Iranian rejection of a compromise proposal to insure a continued flow of oil to western nations. But Premier Mossadeck tells INS that he IS willing to write a clause guaranteeing a permanent flow to the west.

Lawyers for the four missing Communist leaders have been ordered into N.Y. Federal Court this afternoon to explain WHY their clients vanished.

And the search for the four is widening. Again this morning they failed to show up by FINAL DEADLINE TIME, so Federal judge, Sylvester Ryan, ordered their total bail of 80 thousand dollars forfeited. Government agents are scouring the country for Henry Winston...Robert Thompson...Gilbert Green...and Gus Hall.

The U.S. Communist party's so-called SECOND TEAM...DID show up in Judge Ryan's court, however. All 17 pleaded NOT GUILTY to the same charge of conspiracy on which the first 11 were convicted.

A hopeful sign from troubled Iran today! Premier Mohammed Mossadeck reportedly will ACCEPT a compromise settlement of the Anglo-Iranian dispute over oil receipts. He'll go along...says Mossadeck...if claims of the new nationalized company are not invalidated...if British and other oil purchasers guarantee eventual payments for oil delivered to British tankers.

Bitter ground fighting has broken out in Korea as the world awaits
Chinese and North Korean reaction to General Matthew Ridgway's latest
proposal. He wants a meeting of Allied and Red ADVANCE parties...at
Kaesong...day after tomorrow...prior to the full-fledged truce
negotiations on July 10th.

On the East-Central front...one of the BIGGEST...and easily the LONGEST artillery duel of the entire war...blazed forth today for three hours.

UN troops...in the words of one Allied officer "never before encountered anything like it."

The air war continues too with enemy supply lines and troop concentrations the particular targets of medium and light bombers.

South Korean president, Dr. Syngman Rhee, is blasting General Ridgway's acceptance of the Chinese counter-offer. Hinting at the charge of "appeasement"....Dr. Rhee says the "38th Parallel is something we CANNOT accept."

In this country...a UN spokesman thinks another answer from the Reds will come in about 40 hours.

And diplomats of the 17 nations whose troops are fighting the Reds in Korea...INCLUDING SOUTH KOREA...talked truce terms today in Washington.

Congress was warned by two administration officials AGAINST A LET-DOWNnow that truce talks are near.

Members of the Senate Finance Comte heard Chief Defense Mobilizer, Charles E. Wilson declare that a Korean cease-fire will have "NO EFFECT" on the need for armament and higher taxes.

White House adviser, Averell Harriman, was telling the House Foreign Affairs Comte at the same time that relaxation now would mean "the sacrifice of our men in Korea"...."in vain."

Washington is watching too the trial in Prague of AP reporter, William Oatis...who went back to the witness chair today in a Czech Communist courtroom...adding more details to his so-called "SPY CONFESSION".

One such commander, Major General Gerald Thomas of the 1st Marine division, made a crash-landing in a helicopter today...but was NOT injured.

And today too, New York City police...flying one of the awkward-looking machines...woke up a 17 year old boy...floating out to sea on a raft... and towed him back to shore with a helicopter.

Allied unity on the question of next week's Korean truce talks...is more solid today.

A spokesman for the South Korean government now says President Syngman Rhee doen NOT intend to urge his army and his people to DEFY any cease-fire order that may come from the UN high command.

Earlier Dr. Rhee had said flatly... "we cannot accept" restoration of the 38th parallel boundary. And the Republic of Korea legislative chairman says his govt. would not "MIND" a setlement about 30 miles NORTH of the parallel.

Preliminary negotiations are now set for Sunday, July 8th...with the full-dress conference to begin two days later. Allied officers are expressing concern over the reorganizing and re-equipping of a new North Korean army...which they say is far more powerful even than the original communist force which blitzed over the parallel a year ago.

In the ground fighting NOW...UN troops have scored another major victory....shoving the reds back in the central mountain sector of the Sobang mountains...after four days of bloody combat...and 15 hundred enemy casualties.

Picnic grounds...bathing beaches...baseball parks...and highways...are packed with millions of Americans today...celebrating the 175th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.

Showers are dampening observances in the Great Lakes area...and through Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, and the Rocky Mountains.

And...while the Missouri river heads for a crest 11 feet above flood level west of St. Louis...MORE valuable timber land is being eaten up by forest fires racing along the northern border of New Mexico.

A tornado knocked down bldgs and uprooted trees in the southwestern Missouri community of Webb City.

Motorists everywhere are warned that 130 persons are expected to lose their lives in holiday traffic accidents...before the day is over.

The toll now stands at 21 killed.

More than ten thousand communities from coast to coast are holding special 4th of July ceremonies...rededicating themselves to the principles of freedom. In Philadelphia, the actual signing of the declaration is being re-enacted in front of Independence Hall. And all this will be capped by an address on the Washington monument grounds in the nation's capital tonight...by President Truman...an address to be broadcast over the Mutual network at 9:30 PM Eastern Daylight Time.

Mr. Truman's message will be watched closely in other world capitals for any references to the Korean truce talks.

Two Americans will have special reason to remember this particular Independence Day. One lost his freedom today. The other regained it. 37 year old William N. Oatis...Associated Press correspondent in Czechoslovakia...was clapped into jail in Prague...to serve a ten year sentence for what his communist captors call "espionage." He's the first American REPORTER to be jailed behind the iron curtain.

Air Force Lieutenant Luther Roland...elutching his red crash helmet...

A Mississippi river tragedy just reported!

A tug and a tanker collided one mile north of Avondale, Louisiana. Seven of the 11 crewmen on the tug are missing.

In Eastern Berlin...the death toll in an earlier ship disaster today... has now risen to at least 70. An excursion steamer...loaded with 150 child orphans...caught fire and blew up on the Spree River. Communist authorities are keeping details of the disaster under wraps. No official report yet published. All offers of help from West Berlin rescue teams...turned down!

A LEGAL round in the Iranian oil dispute today...goes to Britain.

The International Court of Justice at The Hague has ordered Iran to permit continued British operation of the company until a <u>final</u> court decision. Both Iran and Britain are directed to avoid actions which might interfere with the flow of oil to the world.

In New York federal court, millionaire Frederick Vanderbilt Field... declined to name the persons who put up bail money for four missing communist leaders. So judge Sylvester Ryan...who packed 7 others of the convicted top 11 U.S. Reds off to jail-cells earlier in the week... ordered Field to bring in the names by 2:30 PM New York Time or be held in contempt of court.

No comment on the Korean cease-fire talks...at President Truman's regular news conference in Washington. The battlefront itself has quieted down as Supreme commander Ridgway awaits ASSURANCES that his

ADVANCE party of three Colonels will be given safe conduct by the Reds ...on their trip to the armistice city of Kaesong...on Sunday. Mr. Truman did speak out again today on Economic controls! He does NOT plan to ask Congress AGAIN for a tougher price-wage-rent control law, said the President but still wants it nonetheless. And there li be NO COMPROMISE, he indicated, with beef producers on the issue of PRICE rollbacks.

At the Capitol...Chairman Brent Spence of the House Banking Committee opened floor debate on new controls legislation, declaring "peace talk has nothing in the world to do with defense production and controls."

In Paris, an official of the Franch Defense Ministry says he hopes a Korean peace will mean a sizeable jump in U.S. arms shipments to Europe.

The Pentagon reports nearly 14 hundred MORE American casualties in Korea in its latest weekly summary.

Holiday accidents...late to be reported...are running still higher the 4th of July death toll here at home. At least 165 persons lost their lives. 90 on the nation's highways.

Budapest has ordered the immediate expulsion of two American diplomats: Albert Scherer Jr. and Ruth Tryon. Both must cross over into Austria by One o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The Hungarian communist government links both to the recently-convicted Archbishop Groesz.

Another American...has been ordered out of Finland.

HIGBIE:

A bulletin from Washington: President Truman has just notified Soviet Russia and her major satellites that all American tariff concessions on goods they ship to the United States are being cancelled. Duties on such goods will thus revert to pre-1930 rates.

Latest word in the worsening Iranian oil crisis. London says the government of Iran will be approached at once about establishing a board of supervision for the Iranian oil industry as directed by the International Court of Sustice.

In Iran itself police threw a cordon of officers around the Anglo-Iranian oil company office near Abadam and arrested Michael Kelly, a British official. Premier Mossadegh has rejected the World Court's ruling that the Ango-Iranian company continue operations pending a final court ruling on ownership.

New York millipmaire Frederick Vanderbilt Field was sent to jail today by Federal Judge Sylvester Ryan. The secretary of the left wingCivil Rights Congress Bail Fund must serve 90 days in prison for contempt of court. Judge Ryan held Field in contempt for his refusal to hand over the names of persons who put up bail money for four missing Communist leaders. Earlier, the other seven of the convicted top eleven Reds in this country were transferred from New York's House of Detention to the Lewisburg, Pennsylvania Federal Penitentiary. With them in the same bus went former Army Sergeant David Greenglass who must serve 15 years in prison for his role in that atomic spy ring.

UN tank patrols rolled into Pychagana at the apex of the old Iron Triangle in Korea today against no opposition. Eighth Army reports only light ground skirmishes but Far East Air Force says there's no letup in Allied air attacks on enemy road convoys.

One UN officer at Eighth Army Headquarters comments on reports of heavy Communist reinforcements moving toward the battlefront. If we don't get a cease fire, he says, we'll have a fight on our hands.

New York's Governor Thomas E. Dewey now in Tokyo on a Far Enstern tour, told members of the Japanese Parliament today that he's convinced Red troops will not reinvade South Korea again after a truce unless the Soviet Union is new ready for world war three.

From New York meanwhile, Soviet UN delegate Jacob Malik has sailed for home aboard the Swedish liner Gripsholm.

Hong Kong dispatches report Chinese Communist activity at Heinan Island off the South China Coast. Air base runways there are being lengthened, air field facilities expanded.

Near Rochester, Pennsylvania nine bus passengers were hurt when a tank truck and Greyhound bus collided.

And 24-year-old Dick Savitt of Orange, New Jersey, won the Men's Singles Tennis Title at Wimbledon, England.

A new development in the critical Iranian situation: President Truman wants to send his personal adviser, Averell Harriman, to MEDIATE the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute. The offer to send Harriman was made in a message to Iran's premier, Mohammed Mossadeck, just published in Washington. "The time available" says the President "is running out." And from sources in Teheran close to the Iranian foreign office, the opinion is expressed that the offer already is "too late." Mr. Truman is also said to be asking Iran to RECONSIDER a rejection of the World Court suggestion that a five man commission take over control of oil operations until a solution is reached.

A statement to the House of Commons on the crisis is expected in London later in the day...from Britain's foreign secretary Herbert Morrison.

In Washington, another peace move, on the eve of Korean armistice negotiations! President Truman has asked Congress to declare an official END to the war with Germany. Such a move, will not, says Mr. Truman "affect the status of the occupation". But, in concert with Britain and France, the President adds, we do intend "to grant" West Germany "increasing authority over its own affairs".

London announces officially that Britain's state of war with Germany is OVER...effective today.

Also in Washington, Speaker Rayburn talked with President Truman today about the administration's most pressing DOMESTIC problem: economic controls. Congress will come through, says Rayburn, with "a better controls bill than some people think". The House is beginning a lengthy series of votes today on amendments to price, wage, and rent controls legislation.

At the Capitol, the Senate has received from the White House a formal nomination of 8th Army Commander, Lt. General James Van Fleet, to be a full, four-star general.

Highlight of the far east dispatches today as the world awaits the first formal truce talks: a <u>blazing renewal</u> of aerial combat up in northwest Korea and some sharp ground attacks by U.N. troops on the central and east-central fronts.

UN supreme commander General Matthew Ridgway is <u>staying on</u> in Korea to receive nightly progress reports from his armistice negotiators. Vice Admiral Turner Joy, head of the UN team, says: "My personal hope is that the shooting war will be over the day after tomorrow!"

In Addis Ababa, the minister of State of Ethiopia has been put under arrest...accused of plotting against his government with "foreign" help.

An American air attache in Spain is being recalled from his post!

Robert Charles Schumann, says the Spanish foreign office in Madrid,
will be returned to the United States for his part in a bar-room
brawl in the Spanish capital.

At John Carroll University in Cleveland, size-mologists report a strong earthquake, located somewhere in the area of western Guatemala or southern Mexico.

In Detroit, the famous Tiger outfielder of another year, Harry Heilmann, died today at the age of 57. In recent years he had gained new fame as a baseball broadcaster.

A possible clue in New York to the whereabouts of those missing American communists! Matthew Cvetic, who played the role of red inside the communist party for eight years while working for the FBI, tells the New York Journal-American that the eight red leaders may be hiding out in carefully-prepared rural sections.

Iran has filed a formal protest with the United Nations against Great Britain. The British, says Iran's note to UN Secretary General Trygve Lie, are interfering illegally in Iranian domestic affairs. A British Embassy spokesman at Teheran sees evacuation of all Britons from Iranian oil fields as now inevitable.

And the military governor of Abadan has ordered a midnight to dawn curfew throughout the oil refinery area.

Cairo reports anti-British demonstrations on the eve of the anniversary of a British bombardment of Alexandria, Egypt in 1882. A state of emergency is in effect. Egyptian police and troops are standing by.

The Pentagon in Washington announces an overscas alert for two more National Guard divisions...the 28th from Pennsylvania and the 43rd from Rhode Island, Connecticut and Vermont are slated for shipment to Europe in the Fall.

Landslides in Southern Japan - dispatches from Kyushu tell of heavy slides burying 52 persons, 28 of whom were killed.

Sixteen reporters and photographers will not go to Kacsong, Korea for the next round of truce talks after all. Permission has been withdrawn because, say UN

officers, nothing must be done to jeopardize the success of the conference.

From Pyongyang, capital of North Korea, the Communist radio is insisting that all of what it calls foreign troops must get out of Korea as a condition for a peaceful settlement.

Memorial services in Berlin today for those who lost their lives in another western struggle with Communism. Two hundred thousand residents of the divided former German capital crammed rooftops and windows of buildings at the broad Templehoff Airdrome to honor 31 Americans, 39 British and 5 Germans who were killed in the Berlin airlift.

Senator Pat McCarran reveals in Washington that his Internal Security Committee has subpoensed New York millionaire Frederick Vanderbilt Field and all his bank accounts. His group wants to find out, says the Nevada lawmakers, how Field raised bail for the four missing Communist leaders.

Also in Washington, the House Appropriations Committee has stamped approved on the State Department's money bill. Two hundred thirty-one million dollars are allotted for the current fiscal year.

And Florida's Governor Fuller Warren tells Chairman Herbert O'Connor of the Senate Crime Investigating Committee that he'll be glad to confer at any time in Tallahassee, but he blasts the Committee's subpoena again as an invasion of Florida's sovereignty.

No panie, but considerable concern at Syracuse, New York this morning. A short circuit in the city air raid alarm system caused thousands of residents to jam police and fire department switchboards with calls.

At Rome, Georgia, the state of Georgia's much publicized County Unit Voting System has been upheld. Superior Judge H. E. Nichols has dismissed a legal suit aimed at

An official denial in New York today that two of the missing Communist leaders have been captured, but New York police say that they did receive an anonymous telephone tip that two of the vanished eight are hiding out in Manhattan apartments.

Public testimony in Washington from Mrs. Mary Markworth, a former FBI undercover agent in the Communist party: Red leaders were fairly well satisfied, she says. with infiltration among steel workers in Baltimore.

Iran's Premier Mohammed Mossedegh has made it official - he told American Ambassador Henry Grady in Teheran today that he'll be glad to accept President Truman's offer of Averell Harriman as mediator in the oil dispute. But he insists Iran's position on nationalization will not change.

And Britain will demand substantial damages from Egypt for the halting and boarding of a British freighter in the Red Sea July 1st. Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison makes that declaration in London. Cairo explains the action - says the ship was stopped to prevent her being fired on by shore batteries and to search for possible Israel bound contraband.

In Washington, sweeping new proposals for dealing with an American atomic disaster - those proposals went to Congress today. Billions of dollars would be spent under the

new White House plan, over and beyond existing plans for civil defense.

Air Force Chief of Staff General Hoyt Yandenberg returned to Washington from Europe, declared that the United States is building a chain of air bases in North Africa and the Middle East in what he calls amazing speed. That comment - the first official statement on completion of arrangements for the North African bases.

New details on the swirling aerial dogfight over Northwest Korea this morning - more than 60 American and Chinese Red jets fought a 20 minute running battle from 33-thousand down to 3-thousand feet. Three enemy fighters were shot down.

At Pusan groups of South Koreans are roaming the streets and shouting - "on to the Yalu", demonstrating against an armistice at Parallel 38.

Prospects for a truce - much nearer says Colonel George Rulin, a member of the UN delegation.

Twenty Allied correspondents will be permitted in Kaesong, the armistice city, tomorrow.

The Pentagon in Washington announces new U.S. casualty totals: battle casualties since the war began - 78-thousand, 110. That's an increase of 616 over last week's total, the smallest increase in several weeks.

The new Dun & Bradstreet Index of U.S. food prices just out: Wholesale food prices at their lowest average level since the beginning of the year.

Senate Crime Investigators are on the road again, studying alleged waterfront rackets in Newark, New Jersey, in closed door sessions. A former aide to ex-New York Mayor William O'Dwyer, Irving Sherman, will be quizzed in New York tomorrow.

Another draft exemption test is due tomorrow, too. Local boards will determine from its results who is drafted and who can stay in college.

The Chinese Communist radio has just broadcast confirmation that the cease fire talks in Korea are suspended. There's no indication, says Peiping, that UN representatives will continue the talks. But most UN officials in Korea are treating the breakdown as only temporary. At the State Department in Washington - no comment.

A bulletin: 15 indicted U.S. Communist leaders go free. Judge Learned Hand of the U.S. Court of Appeals in New York has just ordered their freedom on bail money put up by the Civil Rights Congress.

Also in New York, Salvatore Salazzo has pleaded guilty to 28 of 30 counts of bribery and conspiracy in connection with the latest basketball fix scandal.

An optimistic forecast in the Iranian oil crisis: In Washington Nasrollah Entezam, Iran's Ambassador to this country, says he expects 100% success from Averell Harriman's trip to the Middle East in settling the lengthy oil dispute.

In Paris President Vincent Auriol has called on French Minister Maurice Petsche to form a new French government.

At the Pentagon: More details on U.S. Air bases in North Africa. Arrangements are complete with the French government, says the Air Force, to operate seven such bases in French Morocco. A strategic air command established primarily for atomic bombing will have its headquarters at Rabat.

Publication of the draft text of a Pacific security pact modeled after the North Atlantic treaty is set for 4 PM, Eastern Daylight Time today at the State Department. Australia, New Zealand and the United States will be linked in the new pact which must still be ratified by all three governments.

Complaints are heard in Washington meantime about the proposed Japanese peace treaty, a draft of which was published this morning. The Chinese Nationalist Foreign Minister on Formosa objects to omission of Chiang Kai-shek representatives from the list of treaty signers. Elpidio Querino, President of the Philippines says his government may demand war indemnity from Japan. Australian Foreign Minister Richard Casey wants more precise limitations on Japanese rearmament specified.

The American troop rotation program is swinging at a high gear. Another military transport docks at San Francisco today with 350 more veterans of Korean combat.

Congress is hearing new appeals for stronger economic controls from Chief Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson. And AF of L President William Green and CIO Secretary-Treasurer James Carey, threaten another labor walkout unless effective price controls are legislated.

No indication of sabotage in the Indianapolis jet engine plant explosion this morning. The Air Force blames a gasoline leak for the tragedy which took 7 lives.

In Bridgeport, New Jersey an entire family was wiped out when a tractor trailer truck smashed into the rear of a car waiting for the Chester-Bridgeport Ferry. Five persons perished in the flaming wreckage.

Heavy rains are sweeping through some parts of the mid-west. Flood stricken Kansas is hardest hit. Three hundred blocks of the state's capital city, Topeka, are still under water.

HIGBIE:

First a bulletin - flood waters of the rampaging Missouri River have forced a closing down of the main water pumping plant which serves Kansas City, Missouri and thousands of suburban users in Jackson County.

Another bulletin - Major General Louis Peck, chief of U.S. Army engineers announces in Washington that Kansas has suffered three hundred million dollars damage already and the floods are getting worse. He'll fly to Kansas City this afternoon.

Charges of bad faith are being hurled at Communist negotiators in Korea by the Voice of America. Peace talks are still suspended. But American Red Cross officials are ready to ship food packages north of the parallel into the hands of UN prisoners if the talks ever reach the point where contact with Red-held UN prisoners is achieved.

UN troops making limited attacks are meeting stiff opposition in the east central sector.

At the Pentagon, new Army estimates of Communists casualties just released, show 11,506 Red casualties between June 25th and July 4th. Running the overall total up to nearly one million two hundred three thousand.

At the capital, Massachusetts' Senator Henry Cabot Lodge is calling for a 150 group American Air Force with ten thousand planes available for European duty.

Owen Lattimore, Far Eastern expert and Johns Hopkins University professor, a target of charges last year by Senator Joe McCarthy, says the Institute of Pacific Relations was never Communist dominated or a Communist front. That's what he told the Senate Internal Security Committee he said in a two hour closed door session today.

Fifteen indicted Communists leaders, members of the so-called second team of the U.S. Red High command are out of jail again released shortly after noon New York time. Federal Judge Sylvester Ryan ordered their release on bail money put up by the Civil Rights Congress. This in keeping with the ruling by Judge Learned Hand of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

W. Averell Harriman is on his way to Iran after a special send-off from his chief President Truman. Mr. Truman told his special advisor to assure Iranian leaders that the United States has no selfish interest in the oil dispute. He expressed confidence to his emissary that he'll handle the job with satisfaction and success.

From Teheran - late dispatches report that Premier Mossadegh's Government is considering applications from many foreign workers to take the place of Britain's in running the oil fields and oil refineries.

The White House announces that U.S. Ambassador to Iran, Henry Grady will be relieved from that post soon at his own request.

The President sent a special message to Congress today asking more rigid laws controlling illegal entry of Mexican farm workers into this country.

And top fashion designers in New York are knocking down those rumors of impending sharp price jumps in ladies fall clothing.

HIGBIE:

Congress is rushing help to Missouri and Kansas for flood relief. 25-million dollars will go to the stricken area after the House and Senata take final action later in the day. Missouri National Guardsmen have been ordered to duty in the disaster zone. President Truman will make a personal flying inspection trip to the area tomorrow afternoon. Major General Lewis A. Pick, chief of Army Engineers from the flood scene has telephoned the President that the damage will run higher than 750 million dollars.

Federal Judge Sylvester Ryan in New York declined today to take \$10,000 cash bail for detective fiction writer Dashiell Hammett. Ryan disqualified the Civil Rights Congress bail fund and its secretary, millionaire Frederick Vanderbilt Field, from putting up bail money for any of the Communist leaders accused of violating the Smith Act. New bail must be posted by the 14 indicted Reds, members of the so called second team by noon tomorrow, says Judge Ryan.

Teheran dispatches report an American offer of economic help for Iran in return for a satisfactory settlement of the current Anglo Iranian oil dispute.

In London, foreign secretary Herbert Morrison wishes Averell Harriman all success in his delicate mission of mediating the dispute.

Britain has protested to Iran against the holding up of a British freighter by an armed Iranian gun boat.

The British Foreign Office warns the United States today not to wrap up a military alliance with Franco Spain. U. S. Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Forrest P. Sherman, talked with Generalissimo Franco today, soon after his arrival in Madrid, talked reportedly about U. S. naval and air bases in that country. Embassy sources said earlier that a military treaty probably would be worked out as a result of the Sherman-Franco talks.

Sherman's arrival followed by only a few days the visit of eight junketing members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee who turned up today in Ankara, Turkey continuing their survey of western defenses. Tomorrow they fly to Rome.

From Frankfort, Germany, High Commissioner John J. McCloy warns again that time is running short in meeting the threat of Communist aggression, that work on a joint European defense system must be speeded up.

There've been some Communist inspired strest demonstrations at Liege, Belgium but no disorders, as King Leopold abdicated today.

Word from Washington - little chance of House action on economic controls until late this afternoon. Several minor bills are ahead on the House calendar.

Chairman Brent Spence of the House Banking Committee says there'll be longer sessions in the Lower Chamber this week to speed up action on controls.

Late developments in Washington - National Production Administrator Manley
Fleishman has been approved by the Senate Benking Committee for the job of Defense
Production Administrator.

President Truman removed from office Internal Revenue Collector Dennis Delaney of the Massachusetts district, referred also a report on him to the Justice Department for action.

The State Department says no report is in from W. Averell Harriman yet on the progress of his efforts to mediate the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute. The Department can neither confirm nor deny reports published in Paris today that the talks in Tehran have collapsed, that Harriman will leave the Iranian Capital for Washington tomorrow.

Thirteen of fourteen indicted U.S. communist leaders were ordered to prison today by Federal Judge Alexander Holtzoff in New York for failure to post one hundred sixty five thousand dollars in bail acceptable to the court. One of the fourteen, Elizabeth Hurley Flynn was admitted to bail on ten thousand dollars put up for her by a woman named Grace Hutchins.

President Truman is flying at this moment to the Missouri-Kansas-Oklahoma flood zone for a personal look at the disaster scene.

The Post Office Department announces an increase in emergency mail service throughout the flooded Missouri valley.

The nation's chief weatherman, Francis W. Richeldurfer says in Washington, there's no evidence that the activities of so-called rainmakers had anything to do with the midwest floods.

The AF of L Commercial Telegraphers Union in Washington, announces acceptance

by its thirty five thousand members of a wage boost agreement which headed off a nation wide Western Union strike last July second.

As promised, the national production authority has just removed the ban on spare tires on new automobiles.

American reporters back from the latest truce talk session at Kaesong, Korea, quote an eighteen year old north Korean Wac Sergeant as saying, "There are many American prisoners in Pyongyang, capital of communist North Korea." As the truce negotiators again reported some progress in the latest talks, other American officials were engaged in top flight discussions in various parts of the world.

U.S. Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Forrest B. Sherman conferred today with Spain's aviation minister. He declined to reveal what he talked about yesterday with Generalissimo Franco.

The U.N. mediator of the Kashmir dispute, Dr. Frank Graham, has arrived in Kurachi, capital of Pakistan, amid reports of increasing tension along the Pakistani-Indian frontier.

And North Atlantic Pact Commander, General Ike Eisenhower talked with his chief subordinate commanders today in Paris, planning strategy of defense of western Europe.

Former Marshall Plan Chief, Paul Hoffman, urged Congress to set up a new cabinet post to handle U.S. foreign economic aid.

Illinois Congressman Mel Price charges that every two percent jump in prices means an extra billion dollars added to our defense bill.

In Chicago, the secretary of the Chicago Bar Association is studying a proposal

by Senator Paul Douglas of Illinois, that the members of that association be polled on the question of whether President Truman or Senator Douglas is right in their selections for northern Illinois judgeships.

There is wide speculation among the foreign diplomatic corps in Moscow about a Soviet magazine called The News. Purpose of the English language publication, says the magazine, the restoration of friendship between Russia, and the Anglo-Saxon world.

Seven British Quakers arrived in Moscow today to study the chances for an East West peace.

And King Farouk of Egypt, honeymooning in Italy, was drenched by a huge wave kicked up in a Venice canal by another boat. He had to return to his hotel for a change in clothes.

First a bulletin from London....Prime Minister Attlee may make another flying trip to Washington next month for top level talks on Anglo-American relations.

It's not official yet, but a late dispatch from Madrid, reports agreement on United States use of Air and Naval Bases in Spain in the event of war. Generalissimo Franco, without explanation has suddenly canceled a speech he was scheduled to deliver at a children's school near the Spanish capital today. Informed sources there say a new Spanish cabinet will be announced in the next twenty four hours.

A British foreign office spokesman in London again denounces U.S.-Spanish military cooperation, charges the communists will make great propaganda capital of it.

In Washington, Secretary Acheson admits that the United States is split with Britain and France in the question, announces officially that Admiral Forrest B. Sherman's role in Madrid is to talk about the Franco government's part in defending western Europe.

And back in London, foreign secretary Herbert Morrisson has told the House of Commons that Britain is now ready to take Greece and Turkey into the North Atlantic Pact organization.

New moves are underway, says Secretary Acheson, to gain the release of Associated Press correspondent William Oatis, who is now languishing in a Czech communist prison. A reply is expected from Prague sometime this week.

Acheson also warns against the new Russian peace lullaby in a comment today on the English language magazine published in Moscow.

In Paris, French Finance Minister Maurice Petsche announces his failure to form a new coalition cabinet.

In New York City Federal Judge John F. McGohey says he'll set a trial date sometime this afternoon for seventeen of the twenty one indicted communist leaders.

Senate tax writers heard the National Grange urge a boost in individual income taxes by seven hundred fifty million dollars more than the House approved plan to add twelve and one half percent.

President Truman sent a letter to Vice President Barkley today, opposing an amendment to the tax bill which would boost the federal share of state payments to needy individuals.

The House has just adopted one hundred sixty to one hundred forty four, the coal amendment to the economic controls bill. Critics say it means higher meat prices, backers say it helps the small meat packer.

Maryland Senator Herbert O'Connor charges in the Senate that materials of military value to the communists are still moving into Red held China and into North Korea.

In London, the foreign office makes a formal expression of confidence in General Matthew Ridgway's conduct of the Korean cease fire talks. Next session nine o'clock tonight eastern daylight time.

Price boss Mike DiSalle sends a letter to chairman Brent Spence of the House Banking Committee, declaring that the House adopted cost - plus guaranteed profit amendment to the economic controls bill will destroy the entire price control program.

The National Security Council has put Canada on the exemption list from the prohibition against sending economic help to nations who trade with Russia or her satellites.

The Washington Star reports that a top Air Force general - the man who commanded the recent Eniwetok atomic tests - Lieutenant-General Pete Crisada, will resign from the service soon.

British leaders are gloomy about the assassination of Trans-Jordan's King, saying we've lost the best friend we had in the Arab states. Jordan's frontier with Palestine has been ordered closed. Martial law has been clamped down on the Arab held section of Jerusalem, where the murder took place. Abdullah's second son, Prince Nief has been named Regent. The cabinet has just ordered three months of official mourning.

The Senate Crime Committee discloses that one of its witnesses, Francis L. Smith of Atlantic City was warned not to testify or he'd be rubbed out. Smith told the committee today that he made a \$250 pay-off to New Jersey State : 'Senator Frank Farley.

Other Senate investigators heard Samuel D. Mason of New York testify that he has filed no income tax returns since before 1929. Mason was named in earlier testimony as a confidence shark, who swindled thousands of dollars from five victims, promising to use his influence in Washington. Mason himself admits that he took thousands of dollars and the Senate influence probers have handed the case to government attorneys for possible prosecution.

The Mississippi River has risen to 39.4 feet at St. Louis, due to crest at 40 and one half sometime Monday. Most of a twenty mile square area at the confluence of the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers is covered with a blanket of muddy, yellow water.

An American oil company launch, flying the Arabian flag has been fired on from the Iranian shore. Dispatches from neighboring Iraq say three rifle shots missed their target - no one was hurt. Two Americans were on board at the time, Sidney B. Smith of Bell Flower, California and M. B. Riley of Thousand Oaks, California.

Admiral Forrest P. Sherman reportedly told top British military leaders in London today that this country and Spain will conclude a direct military alliance in spite of British and French objections.

Paris complains that French authority in Morocco would thus be undermined.

The State Department reveals a radical change in the American position on Japanese reparations. Announcement of the formal invitations to fifty nations to take part in Japanese peace treaty ceremonies at San Francisco September 4th, includes a statement that makes it possible for the Philippines to receive reparations from Japan.

Copies of the proposed Japanese treaty were handed to Russia's Andrei Gromyko, in Moscow today.

At the Pentagon - new Army estimates of enemy casualties are released. For the period July 4th through July 13th says the Army, 10,616 Reds were killed, wounded or captured in Korea running the total since the biginning of the war to 1,213,000.

Spending for military purposes must be almost doubled in the coming year. President Truman sent that warning to Congress today in his mid-year economic report. And reviewing the first six months of this year, the President noted that employment went up to more than 61-million, that production of goods and services jumped 5%, that prices leveled off, that wages continued to go up, that personal income increased by nearly 6-billion dollars.

Two top Republicans in the Senate, Taft and Millikin, told the Finance Committee that the budget cannot be balanced by slicing domestic, military, and foreign appropriations.

Senate crime investigators heard John J. Maloney, city commissioner of Covington, Kentucky testify that a member of the State Liquor Control Board approached him in February last year saying in effect, some of the boys in gambling have a plan of sharing profits with men in office and are willing to include you. His reply, says Maloney, was not interested.

Also from Washington comes the official announcement that the Czechoslovak government has turned down the State Department's flat demand for release of A.P. correspondent William Otis.

Twelve British oil workers in Iran are willing to stay on and work for the new nationalized company. A spokesman for the Iranian Oil Board in Teheran says they've

written letters requesting jobs under the new setup.

The mediation mission of W. Averell Harriman shows signs of a major success in breaking the Anglo-Iranian deadlock.

President Truman talks this afternoon with Secretary of the Navy Francis Matthews about a successor to Admiral Forrest P. Sherman as Chief of Naval Operations.

At the Pentagon defense officials confirmed reports that Spain will send some military students to Annapolis and West Point.

This unconfirmed report is in from Hong Kong. Twenty five Russian advisers have taken command of highways and railroads along the Hong Kong border, says the Chinese press. Also from Hong Kong a report that allied ships are passing up that port to by-pass British export controls; instead are sailing directly to Communist-held Canton, Chins with embargoed goods.

Only light ground action is taking place in Korea, as truce negotiators prepare for the next session tomorrow night.

Guards have been ordered out on the Ile d'Yeu, off the French coast, to prevent any demonstrations. Former Marshal Henri Philippe Petain's funeral is scheduled for Wednesday morning.

Outside Paris, General Eisenhower opened his new headquarters today. On 60 acres, a group of one story pre-fab buildings the G.H.Q.of Western European defense. General Tke was pictured in Washington by returning members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee as indispensable.

And another 4700 C.I.O. telephone workers on the west coast walked out today in Oregon.

Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., just back from Europe, told the Senate that a Congressional cut of the proposed five billion, two hundred million dollar military aid program for West Europe would be courting disaster.

A regional director of the General Services Administration says the government has eleven thousand extra deaks on hand; that some of them are stored in cow barns, but that they will be used within three to five months.

The House Judiciary Committee has just approved a proposed Constitutional Amendment

to abolish the Electoral College in picking the mation's President and Vice President.

Treesury Secretary John Snyder was quizzed by Washington reporters about the refusal of a group of Marshall, Texas housewives to withhold Social Security taxes from their domestic servants' wages. He'll answer the ladies' letter, says Snyder, but he adds, "I can't find anything in Emily Post that approves of corresponding with ladies through the newspapers."

In the Midwest flood zone, heavy rains north of St. Louis are keeping the Mississippi from receding as fast as was expected.

More than a thousand West Coast A.F. of L. electrical workers walked off their jobs today, running the number of telephone workers on strike in California, Nevada, Oregon, and Washington, to nearly 15,000.

No word yet from a British long range bomber flying across the North Pole. The Air Ministry in London says it's due to land at Fairbanks, Alaska at six o'clock tonight Eastern Daylight Time.

London dispatches report the naming of Lord Jollett as chief of a special mission to Iran to resume Anglo-Iranian oil talks.

Fighting has broken out between Jordan and Palestine Arabs, in a small town near the Trans-Jordan capital, according to late word from Damascus, Syria.

Britain's U. N. delegate, Sir Gladwyn Jebb is asking the U. N. Security Council to meet Thursday to take up British complaints that Egypt is interfering with ships going to and from Israel by way of the Suez Canal.

In Rome, Alcide DeGaspari has notified the Italian President that he will try and form a new cabinet.

Certer reveal that Frederick Vanderbilt Field contributed some \$60,000 to the Institute of Pacific Relations over a period of several years. Carter, an I.P.R. trustee, testified that he wrote a letter in Field's behalf when the latter was trying to get an Army

Intelligence commission in 1942.

Joint conferees on economic controls bills passed by both Houses decided today to throw out the provision which would forbid livestock slaughtering quotas.

President Truman sent these nominations to the Senate for confirmation: General Omar Bradley for another two year term as chairman of the Joint Chiefe of Staff; Thomas E. Whalen, a North Dakota Republican, to be Ambassador to Nicaragua; Capus Waynick to switch from the Nicaraguan Embassy to be Ambassador to Colombia.

Three top witnesses before the Senate Crime Committee last Spring, Frank Costello, Joe Adonis, and Frank Ericson, were indicted today by a Federal grand jury in New York, charged with contempt of the Senate.

For the first time since 1938 the Presidential railroad siding underneath the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York was used today by General of the Army Douglas MacArthur to board his special train for Boston. Tonight his address to the Massachusetts State Legislature will be broadcast by the Mutual network at 9:00 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time.

Reports from Communist sources reaching Hong Kong say the U. N. truce negotiators are demanding a division of north and south Korea far north of the 38th parallel.

At the ellied truce camp below Kaesong, officials hope they may complete an agenda for actual cease-fire negotiations at the next session, which begins at midnight tonight.

Former French Premier George Bidault is trying to form a new cabinet in Paris.

On Korea, he warned the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, that the danger is no less real than it was a month ago. The strategy of the Kremlin is the same. But he added, General Ridgway is alert to the threat of the enemy build-up

in forces that has occurred during the truce talks.

At Kaesong, scene of those talks U.N. and Communist negotiators begin actual armistice discussions tonight on the five point agenda agreed to early today.

The Defense Department's latest weekly summary of American casualties shows an increase in the over-all total by five hundred eighty four, only two other summaries reported smaller increases for one week periods

A strike at the American Smelting and Refining Company in Utah says President Truman, is seriously affecting production of defense vital copper. He's ordered the Wage Stabilization Board to try and settle it.

At the Capitol, joint conferees on the Economic controls bills have given administration supporters another round.

Rent rollbacks to the level of May 24th to June 24th last year will be permitted in some critical defense areas.

Dan Kimball has a green light from the Senate Armed Services Committee for the job of Secretary of the Navy. His confirmation is recommended by the committee unanimously.

Also in Washington, ten Republicans and five Democrats in the House Public Works Committee outvoted their colleagues and pigeon holed again, the much disputed St. Lawrence Seaway Project.

More than twelve hundred price law violation cases are announced by the Department of Justice for possible prosecution.

Fighting broke out along the East-West sector borders in Berlin today when a group of young Reds held a pep rally at the border for a big Communist Youth

Manley Fleishman, newly installed Defense Production Administrator announces another five percent slash in production of cars, refrigerators and washing machines.

The city of Detroit celebrates its two hundred fiftieth anniversary tomorrow with an address on city hall steps in Cadillac Square by President Truman.

Broadcast time on the Mutual Network - 1 P.M. Eastern Daylight time.

Armed police and Iranian soldiers are patroling down town sections of Teheran to make certain Communist leaders obey a government edict against the big anti-western rally.

The AEC's tenth semi-annual report just out says small amounts of the slow forming by-product Helium 3, are now available for experimental purposes. But in response to the question - what progress is being made to determine the feasibility of the H-bomb - Chairman Gordon Dean declines comment.

Alexander Barmine, once a Brigadier General in Russian Intelligence, now working for the Voice of America, told Senator Pat McCarran's Internal Security Sub-Committee today that Owen Lattimore and Joseph Barnes were once referred to by his Soviet superior as "our men". His assumption, says Barmine, was that the Moscow intelligence chief meant they were members of the Soviet military intelligence apparatus. He fled Russia in 1937, Barmine testified, to save his own life. Later he became a naturalized American citizen after serving in the World War Two American army as a private.

Monitors of the Red controlled radio in Indo China say that the Viet Nam rebels are calling for Indo-Chinese peace negotiations.

Later word on the assassination of the South Viet Nam Governor near Saigon this morning - a French General and several other French officers were also killed when a Communist terrorist threw a grenade at them.

None of the cease fire lines now under discussion are acceptable to the South Korean government as a permanent border. The Republic of Korea Foreign Minister made that declaration to the National Assembly today at Pusan, the temporary capital.

Officials at both the Pentagon and State Department are keeping a tight silence on the current stalemate in the truce talks.

Along the battlefront UN officers report a marked slackening of Communist opposition. The first air drop of emergency supplies to UN forces since the middle of June is announced at 10th Air Force Headquarters.

Back in Washington, Representative Celler's House Monopoly investigators currently studying baseball's much disputed reserve clause found themselves sidetracked today. National League President Ford Frick was asked if he thinks he has Leo Druocher under control. Said Frick, "For the sake of posterity I refuse to answer". New York's representative Ken Keating commented that Durocher has improved since he left the Brooklyn Dodgers. Chairman Celler, a native of Brooklyn, shot back - "The Dodgers have improved since Leo left".

On a serious note Chairman Celler warned later that the major leagues must permit teams west of the Mississippi to avoid anti trust action.

The salaries of baseball players and other professional athletes got some attention elsewhere. The Wage Stabilization Board has appointed a special panel to rule on those salaries. Its members will be Ty Cobb, sports writer John Kieran and the University of Maryland's President Harry C. Byrd.

No action yet at the White House on the Economic Controls Bill which President Truman must sign by nightfall or watch all controls expire.



Secretary Acheson indicates too that new moves against Communist Czechoslovakia are in the works because of the imprisonment of American reporter William Catis. Ris case, says the State Secretary, is of the utmost importance to our government and to our people.

Latest American casualty figures released at the Pentagon show an increase of 356 over last week's summary.

Also at the Pentagon, the October draft call is announced. Thirty-six thousand for the Army, five thousand for the U.S. Marine Corps.

Britain is making atomic bombs. A spokesman for the Ministry of Supply in London confirms that report but declines comment on possible tests to be held in Australia soon.

Wholesale food prices are up one cent to six dollars and ninety-one cents on the Dun & Bradstreet Index published today.

Meantime we have this warning from the Department of Agriculture: An 18% decline in butter production the first six months of this year may mean a butter shortage by Fall.

Also in Washington: The Senate approved and sent to the White House the measure granting Federal help for temporary housing for Missouri-Oklahoma-Kansas flood victims.

Senator William Fulbright, Chairman of the Influence Probers says he thinks there should be an inquiry into reports that Democratic National Chairman Bill Boyle received a fee linked to an RFC loan.

The Army announces the return to their rightful owners in Germany of the fabulous collection of Hesse jewels, stolen by an Army officer and his WAC wife several years ago.

Here's a contrast in trolley fares. Chicago streetcar rides today went up to 17 cents. In Seoul, Korea, streetcars are running again in that liberated city. The fare, one-sixth of a cent.

In San Francisco the picturesque cable cars of the California Street Cable Railroad were halted today because the company was unable to renew its public liability insurance.

Sabotage is reported on a railroad serving suburban Buenos Aires. Many railway workers are under arrest after an explosion ripped out a bridge and track sections.

That statement by British Foreign Minister Herbert Morrison was published in Pravda today along with a lengthy Communist reply. A Russian controlled East German news agency did this - used 109 words of Morrison's 1500 word statement, sent out Pravda's 3,000 word reply in full.

No indication what the next move will be in the Korean truce talks, but observers on the scene say they seem headed for a breakdown. Another meeting is set for nine o'clock tonight, Eastern Daylight Time.

The sudden appearance of four British destroyers off the oil center of Abadan,

Iran, has stirred up new Iranian resentment; may cause a breakdown in the proposed

Angle-Iranian oil talks even before they resume.

But in London the British Foreign Office says it's hoped the Stokes mission can leave tomorrow for Teheran, after this morning's unexplained postponement.

From Bonn, capital of West Germany, comes the report that a Russian soldier has deserted from the East Zone to British authorities in Lower Saxony, expressing hate of the Soviet regime.

In Stockholm, preliminary hearings by Swedish authorities, show that mutiny aboard a Polish minesweeper involved 16 crewmen who locked their officers in their cabins.

In Washington, Hedda Massing, the self confessed former Soviet spy and one-time wife of Gerhart Eisler, put two names before the Senate Internal Security investigators. She testified that she recruited for her spy apparatus in the 1930's Noel Field, who vanished behind the Iron Curtain after World War II, and Lawrence Duggan who jumped or fell to his death from a New York hotel room in 1948.

No change is contemplated in the policies of the late Admiral Forrest P. Sherman. That's the promise in Norfolk today by Sherman's successor as Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral William Fechteler. Without a top-flight air arm, he says, the Navy is totally inadequate to do its job.

Some of the Nevy's merchant ships are being armed, but it's not the result of any change in the present world situation. So reads the official announcement released at the Pentagon.

Thirty nine aliens freed recently on \$110,000 bail put up by the Civil Rights Congress are ordered arrested again by the Department of Justice.

President Truman and Bernard Baruch both have further comments on General Eisenhower as a political candidate. Elder statesman Baruch, just back in New York, declares that those who divert Ike's attention from his job in Europe are doing a disservice to their country.

At his news conference in Washington, President Truman declines direct comment on Baruch's statement, but says Ike is free to come home and run for President next

U.S. officials today tagged the new Soviet peace pact proposal a propaganda trap. At the State Department spokesman Mike McDermott announces this first official American reaction to the letter sent last night to President Truman by the Soviet President Nikolai Shvernik.

In New York hopes have just been dashed that we might see a new high commissioner of Baseball picked today. Word comes out of the major league club owners meeting that there'll be no election of a commissioner today. At the Baseball monopoly hearings in Washington, Former minor leaguer Ross Morning urges a change in the much disputed reserve clause. He says, clubs with less money can then buy bench warmers from the stronger clubs.

Former Deputy Secretary of Defense Stephen T.Early was rushed to a hospital in Washington suffering from severe stomach pains. No word yet on the exact nature of his illness.

Republican Congressman Wilson D. Gillette, who has represented Pennsylvania's fourteenth district for ten years, died today at his home in Towanda, Pennsylvania at the age of seventy one.

A Red Cross spokesman in Washington says flood contributions follow the headlines.

And at the Pentagon, Defense officials bear him out, with the announcement that contributions to the blood plasma reserve are off one third since the Kaesong

truce talks began. No reply official or otherwise from the Reds as yet to General Ridgway's new ultimatum demanding absolute guarantees of neutralization of the Kaesong area.

And the ground fighting in Korea has slackened off so sharply that eighth army headquarters says it will no longer issue an evening communique.

Chairman Carl Vinson, of the House Armed Services Committee in Washington came out today for a one hundred sixty three group Air Force and the building of two-more Navy super carriers. He'll introduce legislation to authorize these additions at once, says Vinson, and his committee will begin hearings shortly.

More Cadets face expulsion from West Point. Major General Frederick A. Irving, Superintendent of the Military Academy, told reporters today that twenty nine additional Cadets are under investigation, each accused by someone in the list of ninety already ordered dismissed. General Irving also makes it clear that Army will field a football team this year, the nineteen fifty one schedule, he says, will be played.

University of Washington Professor Dr. Karl Wittfogel himself a former German Communist told Senate Internal Security investigators that he believed Michael Greenberg, a former White House aide was an organized communist. In the continuing crime hearings, Captain Harry MacElroy head of the Pennsylvania State Police Criminal Identification Division named missing witness Louis Cohen as Rimppin of a thirty million dollar annual lottery racket in that state.

In San Francisco, accordionist Dick Contino heard the bad word. He was sentenced to six months in prison and fined ten thousand dollars for evading the draft.

A bulletin just in - U. S. Navy district headquarters at Seattle says a Navy patrol bomber has crashed into Puget Sound; that all nine crewmen on board are believed lost.

Correspondents are waiting at Tokyo supreme headquarters for an expected announcement by General Ridgway that the Korean truce talks are on again, but the next actual negotiating session is not expected until Wednesday at the earliest.

Army's head football coach, Red Blake, says he may make a statement this afternoon on the West Point cribbing scandal which reportedly will take away all but one of his 1951 starting line-up.

In Congress, Wisconsin Republican Reed Murray calls for a cooling off period; introduces a bill to prevent any of the dismissals until all of the facts can be ascertained.

Two public officials recently mentioned as possibilities for the High Commissionership of baseball are taking themselves out of the running. Ohio's governor Frank J. Lausche suggests George Taubman, chief of the minor leagues, for the post. Colorado Senator Big Ed Johnson declares flatly, "I know I will not be named."

The deposed Commissioner, A. B. "Happy" Chandler, tells House monopoly probers he thinks anyone under present conditions would be stupid to take the job.

Democratic National Chairman Bill Boyle called on President Truman at his White House

office today, came out to tell reporters that he's not quitting that post, as charges linking him to an effort to gain control of a Cuban nickel plant are pure fabrication, that he has never wielded improper influence on government loans or other matters.

The House takes up Wednesday this week the record breaking 56-billion dollar military budget, reported out today by the House Appropriations Committee. Thirty billion of that amount is earmarked for planes, tenks, ships, and other military hard goods.

President Truman writes a lengthy letter to CIO President Philip Murray in response to Murray's appeal for stronger efforts in support of a Missouri Valley Authority. Says Mr. Truman, "It will take the election of more forward looking liberal minded members of Congress from the Missouri River Valley before the people of that area can expect substantial flood protection."

The White House says some spoiled canned goods, discovered in the Blair House pentry, were not intended for the President's table. The White House press radio secretary Joe Short makes it clear to reporters that President Trumen will stand by his nominations for those Illinois judgeships, and this in response to queries about a possible compromise in the current feud with Illinois Senator Paul Douglas.

At St. Johns, Newfoundland, messages from search parties reveal that all four crew members of an Air Force jet bomber, an RB-45 Tornado, lost their lives when the plane crashed near the Goose Bay, Labrador base Saturday night.

New York's governor Tom Dewey in Australia is quoted by the London Evening News as saying that he definitely will not run again for the Presidency next year, but will support General Eisenhower.

Former Democratic National Chairman James Farley, back from Europe on the liner

HIGBIE:

From a leading authority in Congress on military appropriations comes this grim warning today, we have only a minimum hope of avoiding war with Soviet Russia. Representative George Mahon of Texas issues that estimate as the House begins three days debate on the biggest peace time military budget in our history.

The Korean war has cost us five billion so far - will cost another five billion by next June says Mahon if the truce talks collapse.

The Communist radio is blaring forth more propaganda today but no answer yet to General Ridgway's latest demands for resumption of those talks. Artillery supported Communist attacks during the night near the old iron triangle area, were thrown back.

The Pentagon issues a new total of American casualties. Since the war began, eighty thousand, four hundred thirty are reported killed, wounded or missing, reflecting an increase of three hundred fifty one over last weeks figures.

President Truman sends some critical comments about false economy to Capitol Hill. In a letter to chairman Kenneth McKeller of the Senate Appropriations Committee, Mr. Truman asks the Senate to put back a twenty percent cut the House took out of funds for flood control. He is asking too for another twenty one million for Oklahoma, Kansas and part of Illinois.

Published reports that he was treated royally at West Point to get him to play football are a distortion of fact and truth, says Duncan MacDonald, that eighteen year old Flint, Michigan high school football star. Army's head coach at West Point, Red Blaik, seconds him, says MacDonald and others were brought to the Academy campus this spring but the whole proceedure says Blaik was perfectly proper and correct.

In Washington, Demon Miller, Business Manager of the San Francisco Beals, urges an end to the draft rule in the Congressional baseball hearings. Says the Pacific Coast league wants major status or at least provisions preventing the majors from drafting their best players.

Senator Joe McCarthy figures in two other Washington reports. At a special Press Conference, the Wisconsin law maker says he'll make public on the Senate floor tomorrow 29 names of State Department employees who are under investigation.

And the same committee which investigated last fall's election campaign in Maryland has been handed the job of studying Connecticut Senator William Benton's proposal that the Senate expel McCarthy.

The Full Rules Committee, by the way, has voted its approval - 9 to 3 - of the report which denounced the Maryland campaign.

At Federal Court House in New York, gamblers Joe Adonis and Frank Erickson pleaded innocent to those indictments which charge them with contempt of the Senate Crime Committee. The committee is turning its spotlight today on chairman Herbert O'Connors home state of Maryland.

The nation's cotton crop this year will be the third largest in our history - seventeen million, two hundred sixty six thousand bales. That's the forecast today from the Department of Agriculture.

Army's heed football coach Red Blaik is meeting in a Hollywood premier atmosphere with press and radio reportess at a midtown New York restaurant, as sources close to Blaik knocked down those rumors that he'll announce his resignation. Blaik told the assembled reporters as he arrived that "we're going to talk this whole problem over."

At West Point the Army announces that about 35 of the accused cadets are now processed and waiting for the final word on whether they'll be cleared, discharged, or allowed to resign.

Distress messages are reported from an unidentified ship, said to be burning off Newport, Rhode Island. Coast Guard ships and planes are looking for the vessel, whose exact location has not yet been determined.

Soviet Russia learned a full month before the Pearl Harbor attack that Japan was plotting Pacific strikes against Britain and America. Japan's chief investigator in the Tokyo Attorney General's office tells the House Un-American Activities Committee in Washington, that the Richard Sorge spy ring transmitted that information to Moscow.

There was no danger to American security in publishing that 1949 Army report on the Sorge spy apparatus, so ease Major General Charles A. Willoughby. And General MacArthur's former chief of Intelligence in the Far East informs the Senate Internal

Security investigators that some of the best legal talent in Tokyo approved the report which reveals Gunther Stein and Agnes Smedley as knowingly connected with the Sorge spy ring. Both, says Willoughby, were Communists.

The Senate Armed Services Committee approved Admiral William Fachteler as Chief of Naval Operations and General Omar Bradley for another two year term as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. General Bradley, meanwhile, was handing a new warning to the Senate Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committee on East-West relations. No great improvement, he says. The recent Soviet peace pact proposal, he interprets as an effort to interrupt our defense effort.

Foreign Relations Committee chairman Tom Connally tells reporters later that we may have to send more than six divisions of U.S. troops to Europe.

Fist fighting broke out today in the Italian Chamber of Deputies in Rome. Communists and Christian Democrats' tempers broke after a flery speech by Premier Alcide DeGasperi, who is seeking a vote of confidence for his new coalition cabinet. Incidentally, he won that vote 291 to 175.

At the advance truce camp in Korea, Admiral Turner Joy and his staff are ready to leave for Kaesong if and when they receive word the talks are on again. Again today the pontoon bridge across the Imjin river is washed out, which will force them to travel by helicopter if they go.

New York city's underworld goes under the Senate Crime Committee's microscope again next week, but the dramatic hearings will be held in Washington this time, say Senate investigators, so that committee members can be in close touch with legislative proceedings.

And the nation's capital itself is the chief source of the drug heroin for Baltimore peddlers, so testifies a Maryland judge, as the committee studies the Maryland

A bulletin just in from Troy, Ohio. An F-86 jet fighter plane has crashed ten miles northwest of Troy. The state highway patrol says no further details are yet available.

Latest reports on the Louisiana troop train wreck, at least twelve killed, many others injured, some still pinned in the burning wreckage. It was a head-on collision in Louisiana swamp country near Simmesport between the Kansas City Southern Railway Streamliner Scuthern Bell and the troop train loaded down with three hundred U.S. marines bound for the west coast. That casualty estimate comes from state police, but marine corps headquarters in Washington says it hears one report that 60 were killed or injured. That report from Colonel Robert Weir of the New Orleans military district.

At the advance UN truce camp in Korea, a dramatic word pinture of the latest truce meeting is painted by the official UN spokesman, Brigadier General Bill Knuckles. The air he says was full of electricity, General Nam fidgeted nervously, smoked cigarettes chain fashion, tapped the beige covered table with his cigarette lighter, glanced frequently at his watch. For more than two hours no one on either side spoke a word. The takes now officials admit are at their most critical point appear close to failure.

At Pusan, a South Korean Government spokesman reveals that make than 400 thousand North Koreans have fled south of the parallel in the past two weeks.

The Pentagon in Washington announces new estimates of enemy casualties - nine thousan eighteen, in the period July 23rd through July 31st. And that adds up to one million, two hundred thirty seven thousand enemy killed, wounded or captured since the war began.

At West Point, military academy officials announced the formation of a new screening board to speed up disposition of the cases of 90 cadets ordered expelled for cribbing. Only about half of the ninety have been processed so far.

Dr. Edward U. Condon, whose resignation as Director of the Bureau of Standards was announced earlier by the White House, goes to the Corning Glass Company as Director of Research and Development. His appointment is revealed by the company president at Corning, New York.

That Senate Judiciary Sub-committee hearing on Illinois judgeships postponed since last Friday features a warning from Senator Pat McCarran today that Presidential appointment Cornelius Harrington does not stand a good chance of Senate approval. His nomination is opposed by Illinois Senator Paul Douglas.

Members of the baseball monopoly investigating committee heard Florida's representative A.S. Herlong attribute a slackening in minor league attendance to broadcasts of major league games. Then the committee recessed further hearings till fall.

President Trumen is ordering wherever possible the awarding of special tax privileges and defense contracts to new manufacturing plants located away from prime atomic target areas.

The House in Washington has another military spending bill up for debate today following overwhelming approval of the biggest peace time defense budget in our history. This time it's a five billion, seven hundred eighty million dollar appropriation for building bases at home and overseas. Some of them, secret

HIGBIE:

Britain's new plan to end the Anglo Iranian oil dispute is in the hands of Teheran officials. One of them makes this optimistic forecast, we think an agreement is possible.

No decision on taxes yet by the Senate Finance Committee in Washington. Just beginning is a study of the seven billion two hundred million dollar tax increase bill approved by the House. Chairman Walter George foresees no Finance Committee voting on changes in the House Bill for several more days. But the Committee has okayed exemption of military personnel from twenty percent Federal Admission's levics. Two other bills have just cleared the House. One provides nine hundred fifty thousand dollars for running the Mexican Farm Labor Import Program. The other will send gold star lapel pins to widows and parents of Military men who died in war.

Senate majority leader Ernest McFarland announces October First as a target date for congressional adjournment. But speaker Sam Rayburn coming out of a White House conference with McFarland says he has no idea when the House will complete its work. He does expect a two week recess beginning late next week. Speaker Rayburn adds that he advised President Truman that the House will clean up most of its pending business except conference reports this week. Later at the White House this announcement was released. President Truman will soon

send a special message to the Hill, asking congressional help in talking Russia into a freer exchange of ideas and information.

And the Government may soon take another bookkeeping chore off your shoulders. Legislation is now pending, say Treasury officials, which if passed, will permit Federal collection of state with-holding income taxes.

U.S. Military Academy officials at West Point say they'll wind up some time today, their final hearings on those ninety cadets ordered expelled.

At the regular Pentagon briefing in Washington, Commander Howard A. Johnson, former Chief Surgeon of the First Marine Division in Korea announces one case of Louse born Typhus and three cases of Smallpox there last winter. All four patients he says, recovered. No other cases of either disease have been reported.

Senate Internal Security investigators announced confessed former Soviet Spy Courier Elizabeth Bentley as chief witness at tomorrow's open hearings on the Institute of Pacific Relations.

Spreading Communist ground attacks are being turned back at several points along the battle front, according to late Eighth Army reports, and the Reds are suffering heavy losses.

U.N. Truce Negotiators prepare for their next meeting at Kaesong at nine o'clock tonight, eastern daylight time, an agreement apparently as far away as ever.

Police Headquarters in West Berlin add an interesting foot-note to the Red Youth Rally in East Berlin. Nearly sixteen hundred of the young Communists have applied for political asylum in the Western Zone.

Massive war games began for American Military forces today. Near Fort Bragg, the the Army and Air Force are hurling back an aggressor attack in the mock fighting.

HIGBIE

William Randolph Hearst is dead. The world famed American publisher whose career began more than half a century ago, died today at his Beverly Hills, California home. He was 88 years old.

Overseas. Iran's Vice Premier in Teheran says part of the new British proposal for settling the oil dispute is flatly unacceptable.

In Berlin prisoners of war of unannounced nationality just out of Russian camps after six years say Soviet war factories are going full blast. They add that Russia is as ready for war as Germany was in 1939.

UN troops in Korea are throwing back with heavy Red losses a steady series of Communist attacks along most of the battlefront. Eighth Army commander General Van Fleet tells reporters at the advanced truce camp below Kaesong that his soldiers would be delighted to give a good account of themselves if the deadlock cease fire talks break down completely.

A call for help has gone out from the Utah State Prison near Salt Lake City. Several guards are reported being held hostage by rioting prisoners.

Near Beckley, West Virginia four coal miners died in an underground accident when water from an abandoned tunnel gushed into the vein they were working.

In Washington the House is whipping along toward a two week vacation scheduled to begin late next week.

Today a resolution was approved unanimously recommending an immediate break-off of commercial relations with Czechoslovakia, until American reporter, Bill Oatis is set free.

This followed the overwhelming vote of approval - 352 to 5 - the House gave a five billion, seven hundred sixty eight million dollar military construction bill.

It's the biggest military building program ever considered by the Congress in time of peace or war.

The House Foreign Affairs Committee also pointed up the trend toward a build up of western defenses with its report approving a seven billion, eight hundred million foreign aid bill. The west now has plans, cays the committee, which should deter Soviet aggression or defeat it if launched. There's no time to spare, the committee says, in preparing for a possible Soviet attack on Western Europe.

And the nation's chief defense mobilizer, Charles E. Wilson, voices a similar warning in a speech at Evanston, Illinois. The danger of world war three, he says, is greater than ever.

The confessed, former Russian spy courier, Elizabeth Bentley tells the Senate Internal Security Committee that the Institute of Pacific Relations was a Communist front of a sort, and that the late Harry Dexter White, then assistant Secretary of the Treasury was as good as a Communist Party member.

Also in Washington, Illinois Senator Paul Douglas emphasizes his refusal to be a candidate for President next year, by telegraphing Oregon backers to withdraw his name from the primary.

HIGBIE:

Violence has broken out in Berlin for the first time in ten days of continuous rallies at the East Zone Communist Youth Festival. Thousands of young Reds, clad in blue shirts stormed the French and American sector borders, fought with West Berlin police in the streets. Hundreds of the youthful Communists are reported arrested, and West Berlin police reinforcements are being rushed to the border.

The season's first tropical hurricane is announced by the Miami weather bureau. Its one hundred mile an hour winds are churning north westward from the West Indies. At last report the storm center was plotted about seventy miles east of Martinique, some sixteen hundred miles south east of Miami.

Former New York Mayor William O Dwyer now Ambassador to Mexico advised Irving Sherman to leave town in 1945 so that reporters could not quiz him about a story connecting O'Dwyer with Frank Costello, and Sherman. The Senate Crime Committee heard that testimony from Sherman himself in Washington today as it resumed its study of the New York situation.

Also in Washington a unanimous vote by the Senate Banking Committee to report out to the full Senate its studies of alleged influence and political pressure in the RFC. And a promise from Senator Pat McCarran of Nevada, that his Internal Security Committee will give former White House aide Loughlin Currey,

HIGBIE:

a chance to reply to charges that he supplied Elizabeth Bentley with information for her Russian Spy Ring. And McCarran's announcement that Whittaker Chambers the accuser of Alger Hiss will testify at an open hearing tomorrow.

The Pentagon issues its latest weekly summary of American casualties in Korea. Three hundred twenty new casualties send the over-all total up to eighty thousand seven hundred fifty. And that's the smallest increase for one week since the fighting began.

The next truce talk session at Kaesong is scheduled two hours later than usual at eleven o'clock tonight eastern daylight time, an indication perhaps that the Reds are giving serious thought to Admiral Turner Joy's proposal for a special Sub-committee to study the armistice line.

Off northern Norway four fishermen claim they saw a guided missile zoom over them. They sent word to Oslo that the object apparently came from across the Arctic.

In London today the British inter-planetary society holds out this fascinating prospect. Human beings will fly to the Moon and back before this century is over.

Some of the Texas heat wave is getting an eviction notice in the Panhandle section as cool air moves in. And some relief is predicted for central Texas tomorrow. Artificial rain-makers at Beaumont are giving up. They say there are no clouds to see.

Forty seven year old Max Conrad landed at Washington's National Airport this morning, nineteen hours and five minutes out of Mexico City, and thus completing successfully the first non-stop light plane flight between those two Capitals.

A flat warning from the United States to Russia today. The Japanese Peace Treaty Conference which opens at San Francisco September 4th is not a conference to re-open negotiations on the terms of peace. A note to this effect has been delivered to the Moscow Foreign Office in the Kremlin.

Several headlines from President Truman's weekly news conference in Washington. Russia will not be able to sabotage the Japanese Peace Treaty Conference says the President. He'll be happy to talk with Russia's chief delegate to the conference Andre Gromyko if Gromyko so wishes. He has no objections to General MacArthur addressing the conference.

On 1952 politics, the chief executive concedes that General Eisenhower might be the Democratic candidate, but doesn't think he will be.

Court officials in Hervania, Italy say the prosecutor there is drawing up legal proceedings against the former Army Lieutenant and Sergeant, accused by the Pentagon of murdering OSS Major William Holohan. Extradition proceedings may be instituted this Fall they say.

Jay Peters, once the head of the Communist underground in this country told Whittaker Chambers that Frederick Vanderbilt Field and Joseph Barnes were members of that underground. So testifies Chambers in today's open hearings of the Senate Internal Security Committee.

The name of Abner Longie Zwillman, missing Senate Crime Committee witness came up again at the crime hearings today.

Jules Endler, a businessman from Orange, New Jersey testified that Zwillman used the New York Attorney Arthur Carfield Hayes as a trustee to cover up several legitimate investments. The same House Sub-committee which recently uncovered improper practices at the Detroit Army Tank Arsenal, reports another case today of what Chairman Porter Hardy calls highly irregular conduct. That charge he levels at Procurement Officers at the Rossford Army Depot in Toledo.

And the Department of Justice revealed by filing a petition in the Fairfax, Virginia Circuit Court, that it seeks to regain one hundred thirty six thousand dollars from Air Force Warrant Officer Kenneth Roverson. He's accused of making a profit by exchanging government money on the Turkish Black Market.

And there's no official confirmation yet, but it's reported that a jet fighter pilot in trouble shot up the town of Groveport near Columbus, Ohio today while trying to jettison his ammunition. Several residents claim their houses were hit by machine gun fire.

Two men were killed, at least seven others seriously hurt when a tremendous explosion ripped several big tanks apart at the Standard Oil Company Refinery near Baton Rouge, Louisiana. It's an area described as one of the most important concentrations of war industry in the country.

From London comes more word on that trip to the moon. The British Inter-Planetary Society sees such a trip as possible within twenty five years, and today announces that its scientists are hard at work on plans for an artificial planet to be fired into space as a stepping stone for lunar journeys.

Late word on the mass English Channel swim. Three Egyptians are in the lead who were only a mile off the coast of Dover at last report. Now here's John Laing.

HIGBIE

Eleven persons stand indicted in New York today, in the most recent basketball fix scandal. Three of them are Bradley University players, Gene Melchorie, Bill Mann, and George Gianacos. They're accused in the indictment of taking five hundred dollars apiece to throw the Bowling Green-Bradley game in New York in March 1949. The other indictments were handed down against eight persons accused of being the fixers.

In Washington, Chairman Herbert O'Conor of the Senate Crime Committee completing its fifteen months of dramatic hearings today, says he doubts that his investigators will catch up with missing witness Abner "Longy" Zwillman, before the committee expires September 1st.

Fanatical Iranian Nationalist clashed with police in Teheran today after their attempt to stage an anti-British demonstration was foiled. Eight persons were injured.

British delegates to the oil talks are said to be ready now to go home unless there is an agreement by tomorrow.

White House advisor W. Averell Harriman, a former ambassador to Moscow, sends a message to Washington, just made public, in which he sharply disputes MacArthur hearing testimony that we sold out to Russia at the Yalta conference in 1945.

Had Stalin honored these commitments, says Harriman, Eastern Europe would be free today, and the United Nations would be a truly effective organization for world security.

There'll be no official report from the Senate committee which conducted the lengthy MacArthur hearings. The Senators voted 20 to 3 against filing a formal summary of its findings, but will permit individual views to be printed in the record.

At the Pentagon a new estimate of enemy casualties in Korea is released - total Communist losses now stand at one million two hundred thirty seven thousand.

The Korean truce talks resume at Kaesong tonight, in an informal and more hopeful atmosphere - although no official pronouncements are being made, while the subcommittee wrestles with the armistice line problem.

Some late headlines from the Washington wires. Senate Banking Committee votes permission for filing of two reports on RFC investigation. Price Chief, Michael Di Salle orders immediate drive to enforce price ceilings on cattle. Chief Mobilizer Charles E.Wilson reveals that we are dipping into our emergency copper reserves to meet the needs of military production.

President Truman's recent veto of a bill to boost veterans pensions for disabilities not incurred in the service was overrode in the House today, 318 to 45. The Senate must override too, with a two thirds vote, to make it law despite the White House rejection.

In Trieste, refugees from Yugoslavia tell British authorities that Marshal Tito narrowly escaped assassination a few weeks ago.

Legal experts at the U.S. Embassy in Rome are studying the bizarre CSS murder case with Italian officials, seeking to find out whether two former American CSS agents

Not one American city is free from the threat of atomic attacks. A series of atomic attacks could cause a million casualties. Russia has more atomic bombs than we expected, and they are more powerful than our experts previously believed. Those four points are underscored in Washington on the floor of the House today, by a member of the joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee, Representative Melvin Price. The Illinois Democrat is appealing to his colleagues to put back those heavy cuts in appropriations for civil defense.

At the Pentagon, Dan Kimball in his first press-radio conference since he took over as Secretary of the Navy, declares that the job we've done in Korea is to make Russia little more wary of starting a war. He sees chances of avoiding World War III slightly improved.

Democratic leaders in Congress met with President Truman at the White House, came out to tell reporters that the President will soon ask Congress for more money to help midwest flood victims, but the President's request for eight and a half million dollars in foreign aid has been set aside by the Senate Foreign Relations committee. Instead the House-approved seven and one half billion dollar measure will be considered. Included in the House bill are six billions for military help, one and a half in economic aid.

A suspended official of the State Department, Oliver Edmund Clubb, handed over to

HIGBIE

the House Un-American Activities Committee, several volumes of personal notes he's accumulated in 23 years in the foreign service. His personal diary reveals, says Clubb, that he met Whittaker Chambers at the office of New Masses Magnine in 1932. A quote from that diary: "This so called revolutionary organ is a horrible rag."

Other Washington headlines - Senate Judiciary Committee delays action on two Illinois judgeships. Salary stabilization board fraizes bonuses for executive and professional employees. House Judiciary Sub-committee announces investigation of securities and exchange commission dealings with New York public utility holding company.

No immediate cause for alarm along the Gulf Coast. That's the late word from New Orleans weather forecasters who are keeping a close track of that tropical hurricans. Some of the kick is gone after the storm's 180 mile trek across the Yucatan peninsula, and its disastrous smashing of lives and property in Jamaica earlier, but Grady Norton, the well known storm watcher in Miami, thinks it will regain its full strength now that it's over water again.

Forty five knot winds are whipping through south and central Korea. The fringe of that Far Eastern version of a hurricane, the typhoon, nicknamed Margie. The storm is not expected to hit Korea head on.

An official of the State Department was set free by the Russians in East Berlin today after 24 hours in custody. East Zone police picked him up yesterday as he walked through the Soviet sector to watch the last moments of the Communist Youth Festival.

Heavy Chinese Communist losses are reported in a spectacular allied sunrise attack in Korea, an attack which sent enemy troops spinning out of mountain positions on the east centrel front near Kumhwa.

One hundred thirty mile an hour hurricane winds are whipping in toward the Mexican coast again from the Gulf, are expected to strike midway between Tampico and Vera Cruz this evening. Tampico is only 270 air miles south of Brownsville, Texas.

Police on the island of Hawaii, biggest of the Hawaiian chain, report extensive damage to highways and stores from that earthquake this morning. No sign yet of any volcanic activity at Mauna Loa, no injuries are reported.

A big forest fire is still burning fiercely on the outskirts of Portland, Oregon as Pacific Northwest timberland authorities say the dry spell has created the worst fire hazard in California, Oregon and Washington since 1922.

Time again for this reminder. Enjoy your digarette but make certain it's out before you throw it away.

A ray of hope is emerging from one part of the Middle East. An Egyptian customs official says in Cairo that rules for checking on ships passing through the Suez Canal will be modified, but in Teheran, British oil negotiator Richard Stokes has suddenly withdrawn his settlement proposals, as London warns that the Anglo-Iranian talks may break down momentarily. Stokes has offered one change to keep the talks going. He says if the Iranians do not accept it, there's nothing left for me but to

go home.

North Korea's General Nam II has forward a blistering new protest rejecting the UN rejection of his charges of a Kaesong neutral zone violation, stirring up new speculation that the Korean truce talks may also be on the verge of collapse.

At the advance truce camp, one UN spokesman describes the Reds today in this manner. They're immune to military logic, obdurate in their politically tainted demands, inscrutable in presenting them, and adament to any adjustment.

The White House indicates that President Truman may shortly ask Congress again for tougher economic controls to fight inflation.

Chief Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson swore in a new assistant, Clay P. Bedford with this mouth filling title: Chairman of the Production Executive Committee of the Defense Production Administration and Deputy Chief of DPA. Translated, his job is that of a bottleneck buster to speed up production of tanks, jet engines, and other military items.

There's good news for radio hams across the country. The National Production Authority sends its assurances that they'll receive priorities on electronic equipment to keep them on the air.

Most Congressional hearing rooms are quiet today, but Senator Pat McCarran's Internal Security Investigators revealed that they'll call the former Communist editor, Louis Budenz, to testify tomorrow and Thursday.

The compromise Defense Housing Bill was passed today by the House, and sent on to the White House.

President Truman signed into law a measure authorizing payments of \$1,000 each to 1600 Ute Indians in Utah, in payment for lands taken from them many years ago.

The U.S. Court of Appeals in New York upset his perjury conviction in a unanimous decision, the case is sent back to the lower court for a new trial.

New testimony on the Institute of Pacific Relations is given to the Senate Internal Security Committee in Washington. One time Daily Worker editor, Louis Budenz, says the IPR was a captive organization completely under the control of Communists.

More testimony today too on the Richard Sorge's spy ring in Japan from Major General Charles Willoughby, former Intelligence Chief at Far East Headquarters. The same kind of Red espionage, Willoughby tells the House Un-American Activities Committee is going on in the United States right now.

Other late Washington Meadlines -chairman Tom Connally of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee comes out for a one billion dollar cut in the foreign aid bill.

The White House announces that President Truman's new request for more rigid economic controls will go to the capitol on Friday.

Indiana's Republican Senate Homer Capehart slipped and fell while rushing to answer a quorum call at the Capitol today, injuring his back.

He's been taken to the Bethesda, Maryland Naval Hospital for examination.

Farm authorities in Albuquerque, New Mexico are girding for an all-out battle against two giant hoards of crawling caterpillars converging on that city from two directions.

Dispatches from Kingston, Jamaica now report one hundred forty six lives lost in the disastrous hurricane of last Friday. The fringe of the same storm today struck Tampico, Mexico.

In the Far Pacific, Tokyo forecasters say the typhoon "Margie" is expected to hit the west coast of Korea in a few hours.

More details are in on that big South Korean victory at the eastern end of the Korean battle line. A briefing officer at Eighth Army headquarters says the enemy suffered frightening casualties.

Tomorrow may be the next big turning point in the armistice talks. U.N. sources at the advanced truce camp below Kaesong, say a note will soon go to the Reds, which may make or break the entire conference.

On a central Korean front, a bad non-combat accident is reported. A truck has crashed down a steep embankment killing ten American soldiers, injuring twenty others.

United Press reports this late word on the oil crisis, received by telephone from Teheran. Iranian officials have handed the British delegates a new proposal designed to keep the oil talks going. They were on the verge of collapse.

Navy divers are making an underwater inspection of the battleship Wisconsin's hull following her brief run-aground in New York's Hudson River this morning. No damage is apparent says the Nevy.

HIGBIE:

Top level Chinese and North Korean Communist officials have sent a message to U N Supreme Commander, General Matthew Ridgway, that all truce talks are suspended. Earlier broadcasts from radio Peiping indicated that only today's sub-min-committee meeting was called off.

The White House in Washington says President Truman has no comment to make on the break-off of either the Kaeasong or Iranian oil talks. Mr. Truman holds his regular news conference at four o'clock this afternoon and the subjects, undoubtedly, will be pursued further then.

On those Anglo-Iranian oil talks, by the way, this official announcement is just made in London. Britain will remain in Abadan, site of the big refineries, until Iran allows the production of oil to resume. London officials are pinning their hopesfirm renewal of the oil talks on another effort by White House trouble shooter, Averill Harriman.

More testimony is given Senate Internal Security investigators in Washington by former Daily Worker editor, Louis Budenz. Says the ex-Red, a Daily Worker article in 1942, critical of anti-Reds in the State Department was prepared through arrangement with White House aids, Lauchlin Currie, and official reports he received when he was a leader in the American Communist hierarchy, also Budenz, convinced him that career diplomat, John Carter Vincent, was a Communist.

On the other side of the Capitol, the House Un-American Activities Committee

HIGBIE(CONT'D)

receives from the former Far East Intelligence Chief, Major General Charles Willoughby, summaries of messages he says were sent by Russian spy, Richard Sorge, to Moscow in July, 1941. Those messages informed the Kremlin that Japan would push forward her policy of expansion to the South. Moscow did not know, adds Willoughby, the date or the place of the attack.

That special message from the President to Congress, urging tougher eriomic controls, will go up to the Hill today, but the House is not waiting for it.

Adjourning instead for a vacation until September 12th.

The Joint Senate Acted Services and Foreign Relations Committees have approved an amendment to the Foreign Aid Bill, which makes the White House, not the State Department, the arbiter of conflicts on spending the money.

Another increase in the number of polio cases across the nations is reported in Washington. 1,765 new cases last week, says the Public Health Service, and that's 16 percent more than the week before.

In Boston, Dr. Roy F. Feenster, Director of the Massachusetts Division of Communicable Diseases, says that for every case of polic reported, there are another 150 harmless cases. By the time you're 21, he adds, the chances are almost 100 per cent that you've had a light case of polic and didn't know it.

Along the Texas Gulf Coast. prisoners from state institutions have been rushed into the cotton fields to harvest crops, threatened by squalls on the fringe of that dying hurricane in Mexico.

HIGBIE:

United Airlines has just announced in Chicago that 50 persons, 44 passengers and six crew members, were killed in the flaming crash of that DC-6B airliner at Dekoto, California this morning. The pilot had made his last radio report, was only 10 minutes away from a scheduled landing at Oakland. An eyewitness report, 39 year old Quail Collinson, says apparently the gas tank exploded.

A new proposal from U.N. Supreme Commander General Matthew Ridgway is expected some time in the next 36 hours. He may suggest, according to this late report from Tokyo, that the Korean truce talks be resumed at some other site than Kaesong. Sources close to Supreme Headquarters add that it's virtually certain after the current spate of charge and counter charge is over, the talks will be resumed, possibly as soon as next Monday.

A renewal of enemy air action on a large scale has occurred up in MIG alley, northwest Korea, with 24 American Sabre jets tangling with 40 MIG-15 jet fighters. The result - two Communist planes shot down.

From Hong Kong come unconfirmed reports that two Chinese Nationalist air attacks against the China mainland port of Swatow, have been carried out this week in defiance of President Truman's request of June, 1950, that all air and sea operations cease against the mainland.

A new rise in the cost of living is ennounced in Washington by the Bureau of Labor

Statistics. Its latest cost of living index for the period mid-June to mid-July is up two tenths of one percent. And that's enough to give a million auto workers a penny an hour wage boost. The index now stands at an all time high of 185.5%.

At the midwest Democratic Party rally in French Lick, Indiana, price boss Mike DiSalle comes out today for direct price controls. It's the only way, he says, to lick the worst inflationary situation any country ever faced.

In Nashington a government official was fired from his job today. The assistant Production and Marketing Administrator, Jack Cowert, was discharged, according to a spokesman for the Department of Agriculture for irregularities involving personal conduct.

The State Department announces delivery to the Czech Communist government in Prague of a blistering note on Czech stifling of freedom. Inferentially it complains anew about the trumped up charges against American correspondent William Oatis.

American Military Police have flown to the scene of that train wreck near Metz, France this morning to check up on unconfirmed reports of sabotage. Two American G.I.'s on their way to Paris on leave were among ten persons killed. They're identified as Alphonse McLaughlin of Durham, North Carolina and Everett Whalen of Norwich, Connecticut.

In Hawaii, there are ominous underground grumbles at the famous Mauna Loa volcano but scientists say they don't know yet whether there'll be a new eruption from the uneasy giant.

An official state of siege is declared today in Bolivia. The ruling military hunta issues that order at Ia Paz.

At Nice, France, the mystery of those two missing British diplomats deepens

HIGBIE:

Three British ships loaded with tanks and troops moved into the Shat-el-Arab River about 60 miles from Abadan, Iran today, heading toward Basra, Iraq. This report comes from Iranian sources at Abadan. An Iranian Nationalist leader declares - if British troops land in Iran, even though we're short of weapons we will defend ourselves with our bare hands.

In London, earlier, a possible new approach to the Anglo-Iranian oil crisis was forecast. Some quarters suggest U.S. management of the industry on behalf of both Britain and Iran.

Another bellicose rejection of the latest message from U.N. Supreme Commander Ridgway is broadcast by Radio Peiping. It's entirely unsatisfactory, says the Red High Command. The Red leaders do not, however, make a complete break-off of the truce talks but demand instead that U,N. officers be ordered back to Kaesong again for another investigation of the area they allege was bombed by U.N. airmen.

General Ridgway himself is back in Tokyo from a quick trip to Korea where he is presumed to have talked with field commanders about the threat of an all-out Red assault.

In Washington Nevada's Senator Pat McCarran pleading for more money from Congress for his Internal Security Committee says he thinks all-out war is inevitable. Does that mean with Russia, he was asked. "With the Communist enemy," he replied, "call it Russia if you will."

At the White House Press Radio Secretary Joe Short says "no comment at this moment" on the possibility of Presidential intervention in the copper strike.

The Senate Judiciary Committee has approved Minnesota's Governor Luther Youngdahl to be a Federal Judge in the District of Columbia.

Chairman Walter George of the Senate Finance Committee predicts a decision by that group this afternoon on corporation and excess profits levy sections of the new tax bill.

The Federal Reserve Board reports a drop in the nation's industrial production. For the month of July the figures show U.S. production at the lowest point in ten months.

At Bangor, Maine, Republican Congressman Frank Fellows died today at his home at the age of 61. He had represented the Third District in Maine since 1941.

Four persons were killed in the crash of a small plane in the heart of the Vandalia, Illinois business district. The victims have not been identified but the Fayette County Sheriff's Office says they are believed to be from Arizona.

Atlantic Pact military leaders are hailing the arrival in England of the first squadron of American sabre jet fighters as the biggest morale booster since General Dwight D. Eisenhower assumed Supreme Command of Atlantic Pact forces. Arriving today at Shepherd's Grove, England, the 119th Fighter Squadron, a National Guard outfit from Spokane, Washington.

And the verdict is in at Ft. Bragg, North Carolina on the result of the big war games just concluded. It was a complete victory, said the umpires for American forces. Troops of the 43rd and 28th Infantry Division knocked out the enemy aggressors.

A bulletin from Washington.....The F.B.I. announces the arrest in Hawaii today of seven alleged Communist party leaders in the islands. Among the seven, thirty six year old Jack Wayne Hall, who, the Justice Department says is a representative of longshoreman leader Harry Bridges.

Fifty million dollars in economic help to Yugoslavia will be forthcoming soon from the United States, Britain, and France. ECA announces a first installment allocation of Just under thirty million to back up Marshal Tito's role in Western security.

At the Capital today, four leading Democrats are notifying their Senate colleagues that they'll hold out for the full eight and a half billion dol'ars in foreign aid requested by the President this year. The AF of L has pulled out of the United Labor Policy Committee; urges the C I O to work toward an eventual merger with the AF of L.

Radio Peiping is stepping up on its propaganda barrage against the United States commenting today that the Kaesong Truce Talks have come to a serious crisis.

Earlier in Tokyo General Ridgway's headquarters charged the Reds with using a Communist airplane to fake that alleged bombing of Kaesong.

New efforts to solve the Anglo-Iranian oil crisis are in the making. Dispatches from Teheran today say U.S. Ambassador Henry F. Grady will call on the Shah tomorrow to persuade him to use his influence in promoting a settlement.

In London, White House trouble shooter Averill Harriman says he still thinks a settlement is possible; warns that Iran is now fertile for Communist penetration. Says the next move is up to Iran.

U.S. Ambassador to Moscow, Allen G. Kirk reveals that he's returning to the United States in October. Reports persist that he'll be succeeded in Moscow by Doctor Ralph Bunche.

Help is arriving in the Pacific north-west for weary fire fighters, struggling against a series of timber blazes. Light rains are moving in from Canada; the first in Portland, Oregon since July 5th. Again a reminder, be careful with fire

President Truman has personally ordered the burial in Arlington National Cemetary of Sgt. John R. Rice, a Winnebago Indian, who was killed in action in Korea.

A bulletin from Washington - announced U.S. battle casulaties in Korea reached 81,422 today, an increase of 416 since last week.

It's unofficial but definite now! Former Governor, Hugh White is the winner in the Mississippi run-off primary for Governor.

Good news for housewives. Dun and Bradstreet report a decline in the wholesale food price index for the third week in a row. It's down four cents to \$6.89.

The Senate Finance Committee, still working on the new tax bill, decides to levy income taxes on the big cooperatives, but leaves exempt most small farm co-ops.

Secretary of State Acheson tells Washington reporters he'll give this warning to the new Ambassador from Communist Czechoslovakia this afternoon. There is strong sentiment for a complete halt to all U.S. - Czech trade relations until American reporter Bill Oatis is set free.

A wild exchange of pistol shots has occurred in Berlin. West Berlin police shot it out with an east zone Communist agent suspected of promoting kidnapings in the western sectors. The Red agent escaped but he's believed to be wounded.

At the Hague, Netherlands, the International Court of Justice asks Britain to submit full details, a complete statement of its case in the Iranian oil dispute by October 10th.

Enemy rail lines in northwest Korea have been brought under heavy allied air attack in new blows simed at interfering with the Communist buildup.

Storm warnings are lowered again in Southern California, as that tropical gale, spotted earlier south of San Diego, wears itself out in the deserts and mountains of Mexico's lower California peninsula.

On other subjects, Mr. Truman said, that the case of American reporter Bill Oatis imprisoned by Czech Communists will not be considered closed until Oatis is set free. The proposed cut in foreign aid he regards as a very serious situation, an example of misplaced economy. President Truman also spoke today at the formal signing ceremonies of the U.S.-Philippines mutual defense pact, calling the treaty a strong step towards security and peace in the Pacific. Philippine President Elpidio Quirino announced

Government price officials in Washington say a new order just issued should force a rollback of some meat prices. The new rolling is aimed at preventing they say, the offering of new or unusual cuts of lamb and mutton so that dealers can sell them at over-ceiling prices.

Reports persist in London that the strange disappearance of two British diplomats last Spring will soon be solved. This in spite of an official foreign office denial of a published report that British intelligence had located the men.

Vincent Trotta, a veteran of many years in judging the Miss America Beauty Pageants at Atlantic City, hands in his resignation today with this blast at contest rules. Feminine beauty he says, is a great talent in itself. It should not be marred by rules that require contestants to sing, dance, or bake a cake.

A seventh expelled West Point Cadet has been restored to duty. Robert Daru, Chief Counsel of the Bar Association Committee investigating the dismissals makes that assertion in today's hearings in New York.

Britain's sleek jet bomber, the Canberra, has landed at Gender, Newfoundland on that trans-Atlantic hop, setting a new speed record of four hours and nineteen minutes for the 2,072 mile trip.

In Washington the Senate hears this solemn warning from Connecticut's Brien McMahon: We'd better be on the alert for the next thirty days for possible new war moves by Soviet Russia.

That warning comes during debate on the foreign aid bill. Final approval of the bill is expected by nightfall. The administration wins the first major test...a 41 to 31 vote against cutting another half billion from economic aid to Europe.

Tennessee's crime busting Senator, Estes Kefauver, says in Chicago that the final report of his Senate crime committee recommends establishment of a national commission to help local agencies in the battle against crime. Members of the committee, says Kefauver, believe that the New York City crime syndicate has been dealt a severe blow, but not crushed entirely.

Emergency rations, ammunition and medical supplies are being dropped from the air to UN forces fighting heavy Red counter attacks at the eastern end of the Korean battle line. The Communist radio at Peiping is pouring out more vitriol, adding new charges of UN violations of the Knesong neutral zone.

French authorities at Saigon, Indo China announce establishment of a six mile bridgehead on a small island off the Anam coast by French paratroopers.

Averell Harriman made a personal report to President Truman and the Cabinet on his efforts to mediate the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute. To reporters who met him on his arrival in Washington he warned that Iran may go Communist if the dispute is not settled.

Two notes on copper in Washington today: A quick end to the paralyzing copper strike is forecast by both union and federal officials as President Truman awaits a report next week from his fact-finding board.

And a copper shortage due to heavy defense production requirements, together with a scarcity of pennies in circulation, brings a new plea today from Director of the Mint, Nellie Tayloe Ross. She's calling on all Americans to break open piggy banks and put the pennies back into circulation.

Frank C. Bingham, a U.S. District Attorney in Alaska, who attended a legal conference in Washington last spring, then went to Montana and began a private law practice, was fired from his Alaskan job today by President Truman.

A bulletin from Washington: The Senate Crime Committee's final report has just been released. The document sums up 15-months of investigation. It puts special emphasis on probes in Maryland, Northern New Jersey and several other medium size cities.

Economic Stabilizer Eric Johnston, pleading with the Senate Banking Committee to make changes in the controls law, engaged in this fiery exchange with Committee member John Bricker of Ohio. Declared Bricker: Why not try out the new law and find out if it will work, instead of bellyaching down here before Congress.

Replied Johnston: I don't have to jump off the Washington Monument to know I'm going to get killed.

The actual number of highway killings at last report was 336, with the big homeward rush of traffic still to come this afternoon and evening. From all causes, 471 persons have lost their lives since Friday.

A new hurricane.....fifth of the season......has churned up some eleven hundred miles east of the Windward Islands, even as hurricane number four, (micknamed DOG by the storm forecasters in Miami,) heads westward across the Caribbean. Latest position reports on Hurricane Dog put its center 300 miles southeast of the Dominican Republic.

The Labor Day holiday in Washington is interrupted by at least one official action -an ultimatum from the Pentagon to striking crewmen on Lake Michigan Railroad ferries.

Assistant Army Secretary Karl Bendetsen tells the crewmen they must return to their
jobs by five o'clock this afternoon, Eastern Daylight Time, or be dismissed. The
railroads have been under nominal army operation since August 1950.

President Truman is flying across the nation near-stop to San Francisco, working on the final draft of the speech he'll deliver to the opening session of the Japanese peace treaty conference tomorrow night. The White House plane Independence is due to land at San Francisco about 6:30 this evening, New York time.

From Taipeh, nationalist capital on Formosa, Chiang Kai-shek's government announces that the Japanese treaty to be signed this week will not be considered binding on the nationalist regime.

It's nighttime in Korea and for the fourth night in a row, UN officers offer no explanation for the series of mystery lights floating over allied lines. The chandelier-like luminescence eye-witnesses say, appear to be carried by a balloon or a helicopter. Appropriately, they're red-colored lights!

A heavy Communist ascault by an estimated six thousand troops has been hurled at UN lines in the east central sector -- the same region where Red airpower has been thrown at our ground troops for the first time since last summer. One of the enemy aircraft which bombed and strafed front-line units is identified as a propeller-driven, Russian-built Yak 9.

UN officers are still saying they think the truce talks will resume. At the UN advance truce camp below Kaesong some preparations (perhaps significant) are reported today: winter heaters have been ordered for the camp.

Opening in New York today, the diamond jubilee meeting of the American Chemical Society, which brings 18 thousand distinguished scientists from 43 countries, for five days of discussions on the theme: chemistry and "the man of 2026 AD." It's described as the most important meeting of chemists ever held.

Late word is in on the Caribbean hurricane. It lost force during the night, says the Miami weather bureau. Jamaica now appears out of danger, but caution should be continued since it may regenerate.

An American ship identified only as The Anthony is reported burning some 350 miles southeast of Cape Race, Newfoundland. A Coast Guard cutter 100 miles away is racing to her assistance.

In Washington the Senate stretched the Labor Day weekend one extra day today and in so doing set a new unofficial speed record-a Senate session that lasted just 8 seconds

The State Department announces the arrival tomorrow in Washington of U.S. German High Commissioner John J. McCloy, U.S. Ambassador to London Walter Gifford, and U.S. Ambassador to France, David Bruce. They'll take part in next week's Big Three Foreign Minister talks.

President Truman passed up his customary morning walk in San Francisco this morning because of the chill weather, as the world awaits his address opening the Japanese Peace Treaty Conference tonight, an address to be broadcast over the Mutual network at ten thirty PM, Eastern Daylight Time.

John Foster Dulles, principal architect of the treaty, speaks out in its defense today, denying Russian charges that it puts Japanese militarism back in the saddle.

A new allied note to the Communist high command is in preparation at Supreme Headquarters in Tokyo. General Ridgway is represented as hoping it may break the current impasse over the truce talks. Again today there are indications he may suggest a new site for the talks, somewhere else than Kaesong.

New cutbacks in materials for civilian goods are announced by National Production

Administrator Manley Fleishmann. On October first there'll be less steel for

refrigerators, home washers, household appliances, television and radio sets,

furniture and other items. Copper supplies available will be cut 60 to 54 percent,

aluminum 50 to 46 percent. And, says Fleishmann, the situation will become desperate if the copper strike continues.

A bulletin from Denver on the copper strike. Federal attorneys have just asked U.S. District Court in Denver for a Taft-Hartley injunction to end the crippling copper tie-up for at least 80 days.

At least 23 persons have been killed in the past 24 hours in five air crashe." in this country.

Seven Navy Airmen perished when their patrol bomber crashed 57 miles at sea off Quonset Point, Rhode Island. A jet fighter pilot lost his life when he smashed up on the desert north of Sentinel, Arizona. An Air Force pilot died when his plane and another collided over Portsmouth, New Hampshire. Seven crewmen on a B-29 were killed in a crash near Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho. Two persons died today near E' Monte, California when a small private ship crashed into a house and burned. Five more lost their lives in Alaska's 12th crash in six weeks, a twin engine liaison plane spinning into a busy residential area at Anchorage.

The Miami weather bureau has its hands full just now watching three tropical storms, two of them hurricanes, the other a former hurricane. A brand new disturbance is now spotted in the eastern Atlantic 1400 miles due west of Dakar, Africa.

Residents of Topeka, Kansas are breathing a little easier, the forecast of more rain proving erroneous, the swirling waters of the Kansas River now leveling off.

The latest Dun and Bradstreet wholesale food price index is off seven cents, now stands at its lowest level since last December 19th.

Thousands of Cleveland residents are giving General of the Army Douglas MacArthur a royal welcome. Tonight diplomats of the 52 nations represented in San Francisco will be tuned in to the Mutual network broadcast of the former Far Eastern commander's speech outlining his views on the treaty. Gibson files this late dispatch from the Korean western front: "Dazed and so tired they could hardly talk, a detachment of United States infantrymen arrived safe back in their own lines tonight, bringing their dead and wounded with them, after battling their way for 16 hours through encircling Chinese Communists."

The western front is quiet again, but in the east-central sector G.I.'s and Marines have seized new strategic heights protecting their capture of Bloody Ridge.

At the Pentagon in Washington, Defense officials announce an increase in the October draft quota. 44,600 will be called instead of 41,000. November's quota, also announced, will be 33,700.

Britain's chanceller of the exchequer, Hugh Gaitskell, is conferring in Washington

today with Treasury Secretary John Snyder and Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer, preliminaries to next week's meeting of the Big Three foreign ministers.

The nation's defense production program, Chiof Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson tells Washington reporters, is approaching the quantity production stage which means, he says, that "the pinch is here now" for the civilian economy.

Eric Johnston, his economic stabilizer, confirms at last those reports that he'll soon quit that post.

And a CHO official confirms in Washington that Philip Murray wants to step down from the CHO presidency because of ill health.

Latest figures from the U. S. Public Health Service show 1,709 new cases of polio across the nation during the last week. 1,734 were reported the week before and "this suggests" say health officials, "that the peak has been reached."

The fifth hurricane of the season, with winds up to 135 miles per hour, is heading toward Florida today, but storm forecasters in Miami say it's still three days and 1300 miles away, could easily change its course.

At the Pentagon, the Navy announces some damage, but no casualties after three direct enemy hits on the U.S. destroyer escort Seiverling off Wonsan.

Also at the Pentagon, the Air Force says yesterday's report of a B-50 bomber in trouble over the North Atlantic was false. The report is now traced to an airman on duty at Tinker Field, Oklahoma City.

Hurricane number five, nicknamed Eesy, is still a threat to North Atlantic shipping lanes today. Last word from the Miemi weather bureau locates the 75-mile an hour winds some 550 miles northeast of Bermuda. They're heading in a northeasterly direction.

President Truman opens the annual meeting of the World Bank and International Monetary Fund in Washington, declaring that both the Bank and the Fund are "part and parcel of the same great effort as the United Nations - an effort to maintain peace."

Czechoslovakia's delegation has just been beaten in an attempt to prevent Nationalist China from attending the meeting. The vote was 48 to 2.

The White House announces that New York's Governor, Thomas E. Dewey, will go to Mr. Truman's office Thursday morning this week to report on his recent Far Eastern tour.

At the Capitol, Chairman Burnet Maybank of the Senate Banking Committee, announces a rebuff to the President on his request for repeal of the Capehart Amendment to the present Price Control Law. Voting 8 to 5, the committee turned down outright repeal.

The Department of Agriculture issues a new forecast on this year's cotton crop. The estimate is for 17,291,000 bales. That would be the third largest in our history.

United Press quotes informed sources in Washington as saying those fantastic weapons referred to recently by President Truman and others are guided missiles complete with electronic brains, better power plants, and high explosive or atomic warheads.



It was due to a pilot's navigational error, says Vice Admiral Turner Joy and he promises "disciplinary action" against him.

The Reds, meantime, send UN Supreme Commander General Ridgway, a sharply worded note, rejecting officially his proposal for a new truce talk site.

The aire and ground fighting fronts are more active. Four F-84 thunder jets tangled with sixteen Soviet-built Mig 15's over North Korea; one enemy plane was probably destroyed. 25th Division G.I.'s seized another hill below Pyonggang in the central sector. A two thousand men Communist force was pushed off high ground north of Inje on the eastern front.

San Diego's Florence Chadwick can claim a real triumph. Her swim across the English Channel against heavy tides is called by channel experts the greatest channel swimming feat since Captain Matthew Webb first made it 76 years ago. Miss Chadwick became the first woman in history to make the rugged crossing from England to France.

Another false distress message -- the second in two days--is under investigation by Coast Guard authorities. An SOS report early this morning ostensibly from the oil tanker Gulfray off Key West is now discovered to be a hoax.

Immediate repercussions come today from Britain's economic crackdown on Iran. The Black Market dollar rate is up 20 percent in Teheran. There's mounting talk of an Iranian financial crisis.

President Truman dedicated the new 25 million dollar General Accounting Office Building in Washington this morning, and in a speech reminiscent of his 1948 campaign style, he defended administration financial policies saying, the country is stronger economically than it has ever ween before.

Britain's foreign secretary Herbert Morrison has completed another round of discussions in Washington with Secretary of State Acheson, discussions centering today on the effect of higher prices on western rearmament.

Other Washington Headlines...Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson expresses shock at winter steel prospects, demands a million ton increase for the first three months of next year.

Defense Production Administrator Manley Fleishman warns of peril to Defense Program unless scrap metal collections pick up.

Jake Guzik and Rocco Fischetti plead not guilty to contempt of Congress charges.

Lovely Kay Hutchins, Miss America of 1952, met reporters at a breakfast news conference in New York, wearing a white turtle-neck sweater, a Navy blue skirt and a gold and white stole, answering all questions but one. She doesn't know the Utah state flower. Her beauty formula, says Miss Hutchins, is to be yourself, get plenty of rest, and don't lead a fast life.

In Brantford, Ontario, Alexander Graham Bell's hometown, the citizens have voted against an increase in telephone rates.



Washington observers say Defense Secretary George Marshall handed in his resignation today because of concern for his wife's health. The sudden announcement although expected for some time because of Marshall's known desire to retire, is followed by a shuffling of several top Washington jobs.

Secretary Marshall's Deputy at the Pentagon, Robert A. Lovett, will be the new Secretary of Defense. ECA Chief William C. Foster, succeeds Lovett as Deputy Defense Secretary. Richard M. Bissell is named Acting Administrator of ECA.

President Truman also named former OPA Administrator Chester Bowles to be the new U. S. Ambassador to India.

The Army announces in Washington that two more National Guard Divisions will be called into active Federal service early next year: the 37th Division from Chio, the 44th from Illinois.

The latest Defense Department summary of American battle casualties in Korea shows an increase of 596 since last week's report. The overall total now stands at 82,362.

The Pentagon reports two new air battles over North Korea. Ten F84 Thunderjets tangling with 15 Migs. One Mig destroyed. And an unknown number of F80's fought eleven Migs up in Mig Alley, destroying one Mig, but we also lost one of our planes.

Late word is in from 8th Army Readquarters on the ground fighting -- U. S. Marines have opened a new "killer" offensive, ramming the enemy back with bayonets and flame throwers.

Radio Peiping is hinting that the Communists may reject the UN expression of regret about the attack on Kacsong. A Communist correspondent calls the allied explanation "absurd" for saying the attack was a mistake. He charges that it was "deliberate".

At the Capitol in Washington, Chairman Brien McMahon of the Joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee, tells reporters that the destructive power in America's atomic stockpile now is truly fantastic.

The Iranian Premier, Mohammed Mossadegh, said the ultimatum to Great Britain has been sent to Averell Harriman in Washington for retransmission to London. It's reported in Teheran, too, that the Shah of Iran made a last minute attempt to dissuade him from sending it, but failed.

The nationwide search for confessed police briber Harry Gross continues. Police looked over all the passengers on board a non-scheduled Westbound airliner when it landed at Winslow, Arizona a short time ago, but say none could be identified as Gross.

Thomas E. Dewey got sidetracked on his way to the White House again today, this time literally. His driver turned into the wrong driveway on the White House grounds, making the New York Governor four minutes late for his appointment with President Truman.

To reporters outside the President's office, after a 40 minute talk, with Mr.

Truman, Governor Dewey says he urged much closer political and military alliances among non-Communist nations in the Pacific area. "We should take firm steps," he declares, " to help our friends in that area."

Another hint is broadcast by radio Peiping today about possible enemy terms for resuming the suspended truce talks. The talks could start again immediately says the Red Radio, if the Americans admit responsibility for all the Communist charges of neutrality violations.

UN troops are engaged in some of the bloodiest fighting of the war, according to late word from 8th Army Headquarters. U. S. Marines, GIs, South Koreans and other allied troops carving out gains up to 5 miles in several sectors.

Two late announcements in London: Britain reveals the signing of a contract with Russia to procure one million tons of grain. And the London Government also officially prohibits all British ships from taking any more cargoes to Iran.

A bulletin from Washington - the big 3 Foreign Ministers are near a final agreement on their peace contract for West Germany.

State Department spokesmen leave no doubt that the allied ban on Czech airline flights over West Germany is directly linked to the campaign of pressure on the Prague government to force the release of American reporter Bill Ostis.

A frank forecast at the department today: "Other things will be coming along soon."

The former treasurer of the American Lithofold Corporation, E. J. Toole, tells Senate investigators in Washington that the head of that company asked him in 1949 to "call the White House in an effort to get some high influence," favoring an RFC loan for the firm.

Another witness, RFC examiner J. Frank Williams, testifies that neither Democratic National chairman Bill Boyle, nor anyone else tried to pressure him on RFC loans for the same company.

The Senate Armed Services committee votes unanimously to confirm the appointment of Robert A. Lovett as the new Secretary of Defense, succeeding General George C. Marshall.

Administration leaders at the Capital are again hopeful they can get final action today in the Senate on the big 61 billion dollar military spending bill.

Eighth Army Commander, General James Van Fleet, meanwhile, comments on a possible enemy ground offensive at an air base near Seoul. "This is the full moon", says Van Fleet, "tonight, tomorrow night and the following night are extremely critical."

Two Senate investigations produce headlines in Washington. Eugene Dooman, formerly Assistant chief of the Far Eastern Affairs division in the State Department tells Internal Security Committee men that work was undertaken to eliminate the capitalist class in Japan after Dean Acheson became Under secretary of state in 1945.

Meanwhile, apparently contradictory testimony is given the Senate committee investigating the American Lithofold Corporation. The former treasurer of that company, J.E. Toole, says Democratic National chairman Bill Boyle did intervene directly on behalf of the disputed government loan to the St. Louis firm.

The Office of Price Stabilization has just announced official authorization for automobile dealers to pass on to new car purchasers, price increases at the factory.

Also in Washington - New York Governor Thomas E. Dewey and Representative
Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, former Republican National chairman, confer on
General Dwight D. Eisenhower as a 1952 presidential candidate.

The Department of Justice discloses that the federal income tax returns of Governor William S. Beardsley of Iowa are under study for possible prosecution on tax evasion charges.

A communique is due at mid-afternoon in Washington from the final session of the big three foreign ministers. They're talking today about the effects of inflation on the cost of western rearmament.

In Peoria, Illinois, the Peoria county grand jury has handed down indictments for Bradley University's all-American basketball player Gene Melchiorre and six New York gamblers. The charge: "fixing" the Bradley-Oregon State game of last December 7th.

At the Pentagon, the new chief of naval operations, Admiral William Fechteler reveals that the Navy now has ship and plane crews on carriers who are trained in the tricky business of handling atomic bombs. Admiral Fechteler calls also for an increase in strength for the Marine corps.

Also at the Pentagon, Robert A. Lovett is sworn in officially as Secretary of Defense.

At the Capitol, the Senate Judiciary Committee rejects two of President Truman's nominations for Illinois judgeships, nominations opposed by Senator Faul Douglas.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee has decided to hold hearings on the nomination of Dr. Philip Jessup as a delegate to the United Nations, and also to study the appointment of Chester Bowles as Ambassador to India.

Senators investigating RFC loans to the American Lithofold Company heard a former RFC official, Frank Prince testify today that he received from the President of the company a camera, a bottle of perfume and food.

President Truman has covered both international and domestic problems in two Washington speeches. At the Library of Congress ceremony in which the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution were placed in new hermetically-sealed cases, Mr. Truman noted that the freedoms included in those two documents are spreading everywhere except the Soviet Union where the people, he said, are held in terror and bondage.

Later in Constitution Hall, before the "ational Association of Postmasters, the chief executive lashed out at those who "are trying to make political capital" by attacks on government workers' loyalty. That, said the President, is "a contemptible way to get votes."

Italian Premier Alcide De Gasperi called for a broad revision of the Italian peace treaty in a secret session of the North Atlantic Council in Ottawa this morning.

And in Moscow, western diplomats are quoted as saying the Russians may try to seize the initiative in Germany, proposing elections to unify the country and an international conference to talk about a German peace treaty.

A top ranking Iranian military leader says he thinks the reported threat of an anti-Mossadegh rebellion in Teberan is a "Yake."

In Tokyo, General Ridgway's latest visit to the Korean battlefront is described by public information officers as "routine." He's back at Supreme Headquarters in Tokyo waiting an answer from the Communist high command on his new offer to resume the truce talks.

It's the home stretch of the classic contest between gasoline and steam - the cross-country race between a 1913 Stanley Steamer and a 1911 Stoddard Dayton.

In a speech to the Senate in Washington, the Connecticut lawmaker calls for all-out mass production of atomic weapons, for the spending of some 6 billion dollars a year on an atomic Army, Navy, and Air Force.

In Korea, heavy fighting in the western sector is reported again - and some of the fiercest combat of the war, say those on the scene, is taking place between Chorwon and Kansong on the east coast.

A new turn in the suspended truce talks may develop soon. UN and communist liaison officers will meet at a town below Kaesong tonight - a meeting suggested by the Reds.

A medical bulletin just issued in London...a series of examinations of King George reveal, say Buckingham Palace physicians, "structural changes" in one of his lungs.

Three elderly residents of a Nursing Home for the Aged at Colesville, Maryland, just outside Washington, were burned to death today in a general alarm fire. More than twenty others - rushed from the blazing ruins - are in suburban area hospitals.

Senate internal security investigators in Washington hear this testimony from former Voice of America writer Alice Widener. Julian R. Friedman, once an employee of the State Department in China, was described to her by a New York radio producer as "one

of the top brains of the Communist Party".

The Senate has added its approval to House overriding of a White House veto on that bill boosting pensions of veterans for non-service-connected disabilities. Thus the measure now becomes law despite President Truman's veto.

The big 5 billion 800 million dollar military construction bill cleared Congress today, has been sent to the White House for signature.

The French high commissioner for Indo China, General Jean de Lattre de Tassigny, tells reporters in Washington that the Chinese Reds could hurl 80 to 150 thousand troops at his forces at any time. The general was the victim today of a common Washington mishap - he got lost in the Pentagon!

From the Vatican comes word of an official decree of excommunication by Pope Pius the 12th for every Romanian who took part in the Iron Curtain-type trial and conviction of a Catholic bishop.

And there's speculation in London that Frime Minister Attlee's visit to King George today may be to ask a Royal dissolution of Parliament prior to a general election.



In Tokyo, UN Supreme Commander General Matthew Ridgway is expected shortly to send his acceptance of the communist proposal for resuming the Korean truce talks.

At the battlefront, Lieutenant General William M. Hoge, Commander of the 9th Corps, says Chinese Communist troop morale is weakening. He reveals that enemy surrenders and desertions are occurring at an unprecedented high rate.

In Washington, the Senate Benking Committee has just voted 9 to 4, a drastic revision of the new economic controls law, giving the administration greater power to hold down prices and profits.

Some other highepots from the President's weekly news conference. Mister Truman defended Democratic National Chairman Bill Boyle again, said he has Boyle's word that he did not take fees for helping people make contacts with government agencies. Helping out-of-town people make those contacts, the President told reporters, is part of the National Chairman's job. On political matters, Mister Truman declared that his political opposition has no issues on which it can attack his administration, that therefore it's using misrepresentation and smear.

Again today, the chief executive declined to say whether or not he'll be a candidate next year.

On the Senate Judiciary committee's refusal to approve his nominations for two Illinois Judgeships, nominations opposed by Senator Paul Douglas, Mister Truman said he does not intend to submit new names for Senate approval.

Earlier in a letter to Vice President Barkley, Mister Trumen appealed to the Senate to vote higher taxes than the five and a half billion dollar proposal now under debate.

In Belgrade, Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito charges that Russian bombers painted with Yugoslav colors and markings are sitting on satellite airfields ready to attack Yugoslavia. "Anyone who thinks," he says, "anyone who thinks he can take us by surprise will make a great mistake."

Five and a half weeks of seesaw fighting in East Korean hills, 8th Army announces today, have resulted in 58-thousand enemy casualties killed or wounded.

Allied infantrymen got some help in their battle for those hills today when the mighty battleship New Jersey turned its 16-inch guns to blasting enemy positions. Says one enthusiastic air observer, "They knocked three feet of real estate off one hill."

UN liaison officers meet with their Red counterparts at Pan Mun Jom, below Kaesong again tonight, amid indications that General Ridgway will send his truce negotiators back to Kaesong again only very reluctantly.

Italy's Premier Alcide de Gasperi received a state welcome at Washington's Union Station where he was greeted by President Truman and most of the cabinet. Later de Gasperi told a joint session of Congress that his countrymen will be up front fighting for freedom if war comes again.

New York Internal Revenue job, tells Senate investigators that the American Lithofold Company paid him \$750 a month for drumming up printing business while he was on the federal payroll.

A former Air Force civilian official says the same company gave him \$3,000 in loans, a camera, a ham, a turkey, a television set, and finally a \$25,000 a year job when he quit his Air Force post.

The Senate Elections Committee has again considered and reached no decision on that resolution looking toward ousting Wisconsin's Joe McCarthy from the Senate. The committee meets again this afternoon.

The Senate is beginning another week of debating the new tax bill as Majority Leader Ernest McFarland now concedes that it may be a little bit after October 1st when Congress adjourns.



No word from General Ridgway's headquarters in Tokyo yet on the Communist proposal for another meeting of Allied and Red liaison officers tonight.

A strike by 13,000 office and production workers at the Woodridge, New Jersey plant of the Wright Corporation has stopped production on the Sapphire J-65, most powerful jet engine in the world.

For tonight's featherweight title fight in New York, Sandy Saddler, the champ, weighs in at 125½; Willie Pap, the challenger, at 125.

Reports from Montevideo, capital of neighboring Uruguay, say the rebels are demanding that President Peron resign, but the Peron controlled Argentine radio claims the rebellion has been put down. Washington observers say it may be the real thing or it may be a staged affair to build support for Peron in his forthcoming election campaign.

The powder keg tension continues in Iran. Britain's Ambassador to Teheran after an interview with the Shah says he expects no change in the expulsion order.

A more optimistic view in New York from the recently retired U.S. Ambassador Henry F. Grady. A just and amicable settlement, he thinks, will be worked out soon.

New developments in the crisis are under discussion in Washington between British Ambassador Sir Oliver Franks and the State Department.

Senator William Benton kicked off his campaign to kick Joe McCarthy out of the Senate as the election sub-committee at the capital opened its doors to the public for the hearings on the Benton resolution. The Connecticut lawmaker handed the committee ten case studies which he said support general charges of perjury and deception of the Senate and of the American people against the controversial Wisconsin Senator.

A standing vote of the Senate has just defeated a proposal to levy a federal tax on pari-mutuel betting at race tracks which are licensed by the states.

Canada's Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent, told President Truman at the White House today that his government will build the St. Lawrence Seaway Project. Mr. Truman says he'll support the offer if a joint U.S.-Canadian development plan is not soon approved by Congress.

That six billion dollar military construction bill was signed into law by the President today. It includes money for secret American air bases in several parts of the world.

The Pentagon issues a new estimate of enemy casualties in Korea - one million, three hundred twenty-five thousand battle and non-battle casualties and captured since the war began.

The nation's top active military strategist, General Omar Bradley, and the State Department's expert on Russia, Chip Bohlen, are conferring with U.N. Supreme Commander General Ridgway in Tokyo as the Reds launch heavy ground attacks in Korea and show no disposition to accept Ridgway's proposal to move the truce talks to Songhyon.

Headline names today: Army Secretary Frank Pace rules that those 90 expelled West Point cadets are eligible to re-enter the Academy if they receive new appointments.

Franchot Tone and Barbara Payton announced in Minneapolis they'll be married as soon as possible.

National League President Ford Frick slaps heavy fines on Roy Campanella, Preacher Roe and Jackie Robinson for, quote, "the scenes they put on in the runway of Braves Field at Boston after yesterday's game."
