WOOD:

Now we're going to reenact for you a scene from one of last Fall's tobacco auctions in Kinston, North Carolina, as described by that ace sports commentator, Dick Fishell, and his roving microphone.

(MUSIC UP - THEN OUT - CROWD NOISE - SOUND OF HAND TRUCKS B.G.)

FISHELL:

Hello, everybody, this is Dick Fishell. I'm standing at the entrance of a big tobacco warehouse, and past me the warehouse employees are hauling big baskets of tobacco to be placed in rows on the warehouse floor. (VOICES B.G.) Over here by the doorway a lot of farmers are gathered together joking and talking. Now let's go inside. (VOICES UP AND FADE OUT) The sale's about to begin for the day. And an excited hush is spreading over the entire warehouse as the auctioneer takes his stand by the first basket of tobacco. Each basket is sold individually, you know, because the baskets vary widely in grade and quality. Listen, the warehouseman's about to call out the price of the opening bid.

WAREHOUSEMAN: Gentlemen, here's a basket of the best center cutters.

Start 'er at 251

(CHANT)

FISHELL:

Does that chant of the auctioneer sound like mumbo-jumbo to you? Well, it's a kind of telegraph-English every tobacco expert follows perfectly. What you're listening to is the auctioneer calling out the opening price of 25 - 25 dollars a hundred pounds - which was bid right away by the buyer for an export company. A digarette company makes it 26 - and Lucky Strike 27 - and now a leaf company buyer signals 28 - 28. Hear it? This is fine mild tobacco and they all want it. Just while I said that, the bid's shot up to 31 -31 dollars bid by Cigarette Company A but Lucky Strike tops that with 32. WOOD:

Now here's Andre Baruch ... with a word of explanation.

BARUCH:

Yes, Barry, I want to explain one point about the Kinston, "orth Carolina tobacco auction that was described a few minutes ago. Now you no doubt recall that we heard a basket of tobacco "Sold American" at 32 - 32 dollars a hundred pounds. Well - right beside it on that warehouse floor might have been another basket of tobacco which was sold to another buyer for, say 23 dollars. That's a difference of nine dollars per hundred pounds. And, of course, the question you'll all be interested in is: what made the tobacco Lucky Strike bought worth so much more money?
