A PROGRESS REPORT

To the Broadcast Pioneers of America:

Is this a progress report?

You bet it is!!!

In the ten months which have elapsed since the publication of the "Fourth Progress Report," a great deal has been accomplished. This edition of the "Historical Inventory and Industry Reference Library" has added forty-eight categories, each of them a sinnificant listing, but more important, the flow of material has resulted in the expansion of many of the previously listed 457 categories. So steady has been the stream of additional data that, even when it became necessary to close the forms on the pages, it seemed advisable to list the added material in an

"Addendum," with its own index.

This report is being issued at a time when a new era dawns for the Broadcast Pioneers History Project. Within a few months the project will be moved to Washington, where it will be housed in the new building of the National Association of Broadcasters. The Association has generously set aside space on the first floor of the building for the "Broadcast Pioneers Industry Reference Center." Its location will make it readily available for researchers of all kinds — industry representatives, students interested in the field of communication, historians and other scholars concerned with the sociological and economic impact of an industry which has grown up during the memories of living men.

To make all this possible, the Broadcast Pioners Educational Fund has been established and qualified as a tax-exempt organization. A campaign for funds is currently under way and already many sizeable

gifts have been received or pledged.

A committee of outstanding broadcasters has been appointed by G. Richard Shafto, President of the Broadcast Pioneers Educational Fund, to serve as money-raisers. The co-chairmen of the Fund Committee are Ward Quaal, President of WGN-Continental Broadcasting Company and Roger W. Clipp, former chief executive officer of the Triangle Stations, head-quartered in Philadelphia.

The goal of the drive is \$750,000, which, thanks to the generousity of NAB, will be adequate to equip, staff and operate the Industry Reference Center for

a period of from five to seven yaers.

Few industries in the history of the world have had a more profound influence upon the lives of the people of a nation, than broadcasting. It has far exceeded its original purposes of providing entertainment in the homes of the American public. It is now the prime medium for bringing the news of the world to America. In the field of education, broadcasting is making tremendous strides. In addition,

broadcasting is assuming an increasingly important

role as the purveyor of culture.

In performance of these tasks, broadcasting has been criticized for undue emphasis on violence by many of those unable to face up to the realities of a frightening situation. There are those who acknowledge the necessity of exercising editorial judgment in the exposure given to a minority group of dissidents. But there are likewise those who believe that the American public is entitled to the facts, in order that well-thought out decisions may be made.

All of this is history in the making. It is vital material for the record of what is happening in broadcasting. It is essential to the welfare of the industry and the public it serves, that a constantly replenished source of information be available so that the industry may profit from a knowledge of the successes of the industry as well as from the failures.

Special acknowledgement for the great assistance in the compiling of historical material given the Broadcast Pioneers History Project is due the Columbia Broadcasting System, the Radio Corporation of America, the National Broadcasting Company, and for the continued aid given by Broadcast Music, Inc., NAB, AWRT, IRTS, and the Westinghouse Broadcasting Company, WGN-Continental Broadcasting Corporation as well as the many men and women and other organizations who have helped in building the Broadcasting Industry Reference Library to its present great proportions.

The History Project has been exceedingly fortunate in the assistance given during the past five years; first by the late Edwin Lewis Dunham and during the past year by Mrs. Kathryn S. Cole, former Manager of the Information Department of the National Broadcasting Company, who is now serving the project as Associate Director. She has brought to the project an extensive knowledge of many facets of the industry and an enthusiasm for doing a unique job

for the industry.

Extensive as this new inventory is, nevertheless it must be recognized that there is a vast area of untapped information about the lives and contribution to the industry of scores of Pioneers in the development of broadcasting as the world's most potent medium of mass communication. It is our hope that with the resources of the new facilities in Washington, operated on a professional basis, will further develop the Library as a source of knowledge and information, through which broadcasting can fulfill its highest aspirations as a means of education, information, culture, enlightenment and entertainment for the benefit of the entire population of the nation. Yes, this is a progress report and we look for greater progress in the years to come.
