My father auctioneered for forty-five years. I marked tickets behind my father five years before becoming an auctioneer. I have been selling tobacco at auction for twenty-four years on the big markets. I have sold as much or more than any other auctioneer living. My family has been in tobacco since 1825 - one hundred eighten years. My grandfather and my father were farmers and producers. I operated a warehouse at Kingstree, South Carolina for five years.

I use three voices to sell tobacco. When you are selling from 350,000 to 400,000 pounds of tobacco a day, if you change the tone of your voice it takes all the pressure off and your voice is just the same as when you began the day's sales. The change in tone relieves the tiredness. When I begin to feel tired I change my voice to another tone. That is one of the arts in selling tobacco. *

So far as I know I am the only suctioneer in the three belts who does not have a warehouseman with him who starts the bid. I do this extra job myself with my regular job of auctioneering. Now an auctioneer has to know tobacco and a warehouseman who starts the bids has to know tobacco, but when you combine these two jobs in one you've got to know a great deal about tobacco. It takes a tremendous amount of training and knowledge of tobacco. I have sold as much as 11,000,000 pounds in one season, doing both of these jobs at the same time. I once sold 6,000,000 pounds in twenty-five selling days. This is the most tobacco that has ever been sold in that length of time in the whole South by one auctioneer.

Having been in tobacco all my life you might say that I know tobacco from "A" to "Z". Now the kind of tobacco that Lucky Strike buys is what we call the "center cutters", which means the center leaves of the tobacco plant. The type of tobacco that Lucky Strike uses embodies, to my mind after twenty-four years experience, the very finest "center leaves" that can be
